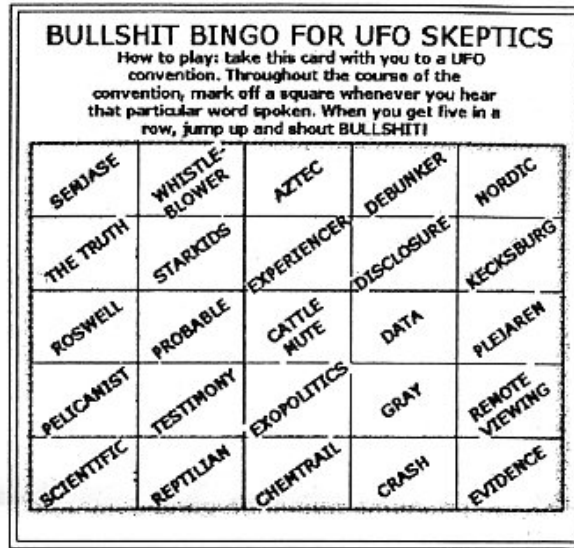

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## **EDITORIAL: THE GOVERNMENT ONLY CARES ABOUT NATIONAL SECURITY, NOT MYSTERIOUS UFOS!**

We are out of tune with researchers who believe the Government knows the answer to the UFO mystery and is deliberately hiding it from the public.

In the early years, starting in 1947, their fear was unidentified Russian craft, not interplanetary saucers. When it gradually became clear that the UFOs were not

Russian, and probably not any other kind of threat, they lost interest.

People exaggerate the "fear of ridicule" factor regarding UFO witnesses coming forward with their stories, but this is indeed a legitimate factor. A lot of people don't want to risk public embarrassment, especially, if they have sensitive jobs. We believe this problem was gradually decreasing, until 9/11/01.

Now it's not the Russians but the evil Arabs that the Government fears, and this is a very legitimate fear indeed. Let's consider the recent well-publicized sighting at Chicago's O'Hare Airport. It's no wonder that pilots and airport employees did not want to grapple with interrogations by (gasp!) Homeland Security. We wouldn't either!

We're all back to "Square One", whatever that means. We just hope the alleged aliens never try to land on the White House lawn. They would never survive!

We think the Government strongly suspects that something extremely weird - like aliens maybe - really is going on, but they just sit there and hope it goes away. The loyal Bushites are not intellectuals, by any stretch of the imagination, but they do take seriously their mandate to keep our country as safe as possible. Hopefully, they will succeed.

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## MISCELLANEOUS RAVINGS

- We of "Smear" are always on the lookout for Fortean mysteries that are new (to us) and interesting. The April 2007 issue of England's "Fortean Times" contains an article entitled "Toad in the Hole". It tells of dozens of instances in recent centuries when living toads (i.e., frogs) have been found trapped inside ancient hunks of rock or stone. These entombed little animals often appeared to be not only alive, but in good health!

The author, one Jan Bondeson, appears to be an authentic British physician of some sort. We are very impressed by the unusually firm and definitive conclusion to his long article:

"The entombed toad is an anomaly in the true sense of the word. The phenomenon is not only irrational but completely inexplicable. There appears to be no reasonable explanation for this remarkable series of observations of toads and frogs discovered inside blocks of stone. The counter-arguments...are hardly sufficient to exorcise these prematurely buried toads, which have led their own slumbering, accursed half-life outside the boundaries of biology for several centuries..."

"Fortean Times" is available in the United States, but the price is high (80 pages per issue!) and the method of subscription is confusing. We receive our copies for free, as we exchange with them, and also because we are on very good terms with the editors - having lectured twice at their annual "UnConventions", in London, England...

- Next, we have another Fortean phenomenon which we've commented on once before, a few issues back. You have heard, of course, of UFOs, and the more "scientific" term "UAOs", but have you heard of, or even imagined, UFHs - Unidentified Flying Humanoids?

It's the lead article in the March 2007 MUFON Journal. Apparently all these UFH sightings have been videotaped in Mexico (of course!), and our old pal Mexican saucer authority Jaime Mausaan has a hand in this. The whole article is devoted to explaining why there is probably no terrestrial "rocket belt" or the like that could explain these sightings.

However, there is no detail about any of them. Five incidents, all from the year 2000, are listed, but there are no individual descriptions of the cases - just a general statement of what a UFH incident looks like, or whatever.

The implication is that these are extraterrestrials who somehow forgot to bring their spaceships. Honestly, folks, we believe in the possibility of almost anything - but our offhand opinion is that the endlessly-hibernating frogs have a much better chance of being real. However, we could be wrong, and often have been, in the past...

By co-incidence, there is one other UFH item in the latest batch of Net items from Vince Ditchkus. It is from "UFOexperiences", dated March 5th, 2007, and entitled "Flying 'Man' in Black in Russia". Supposedly, in the winter of the year 1936, a woman named E.E. Loznaya was walking to school on a lonely country road when she witnessed "a manlike fig- ure dressed in black, in profile, moving rapidly through the sky....I saw no hands or feet. There was, behind his back, an oval thing like a ruck sack...As he came closer, I heard an increasing rumble as if it was a flying mechanism and not a living man." At its closest point, the UFH was only about forty yards from the frightened school girl, then 15 years old.

I guess we can't blame Jaime Mausaan for this one!...

- And then there are human mutilations, presumably done by the same evil aliens who mutilate animals. In a recent Net article called "Human Mutilations: The Sum of all Fears", well-known ufological writer Scott Corrales goes into this grizzly topic. All the cases are from South America. The link to outer-space predators is weak at best, the cases are old, and they lack enough detail to be worth repeating. Ain't the Internet grand?

### SEVENTEEN PAGE UFO VIDEO ANALYSIS FOR SALE AT "SAUCER SMEAR" HEADQUARTERS

We quote here the first two paragraphs of the 17-page Net item described above:

"The Nellis Range UFO video is virtually unique among those in the public domain, in that an unidentified anomalous flying object was not only captured in close-up by a military camera, but also included overlaid tracking data and a time stamp, permitting precise calculation of the trajectory and flight characteristics, such as velocity and acceleration. In addition, the video also has voices of various military range operators discussing the object and trying to identify it without success.

"Among anomalous characteristics, the calculated data indicates that the object was capable of flying from 30 to 700 miles per hour, yet it is a rotating, multi-lobed, non-streamlined object. How the craft could fly at such high speed without streamlining is not clear. It also displays multiple bursts of high acceleration/deceleration. The high speeds and accelerations also rule out many conventional flying objects such as balloons, helicopters, or propeller driven aircraft. Furthermore, the object shows no evidence of a propulsion system, such as external engines or a trail that might be expected from a jet or rocket-propelled aircraft capable of such high speeds and accelerations. Finally, the object was highly maneuverable, executing a right-angle turn and going into steep climbs."

This analysis, obviously done by a very professional person, is incredibly detailed, with many many charts and graphs, etc. The only issues not made clear are the name of the author and the date. The date appears to be some time in 1994, as the video was shown on TV's "Hard Copy" in February of 1995.

We have no space in this zine for further details, but we think you will find it well worth your while to send us ten bucks for the entire 17-page rant. We have never seen a UFO case where it is so clearly proven that the object in question is not a conventional object of any kind whatever.

The title of this tract is "The Nellis Range UFO Video". The rant was most recently updated on February 21st, 2007.

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## NEWS BRIEFIES

- Britain's Nick Redfern seems to be grinding out saucer and Fortean books faster than anyone else these days, in addition to the Web blog which he runs together with his friend Greg Bishop.

Now Nick appears to have hit paydirt, as the rights to one of his books have just been sold to Universal Pictures. The unlikely title of the book is "Three Men Seeking Monsters: Six Weeks in Pursuit of Werewolves, Lake Monsters, Giant Cats, Ghostly Devil Dogs, and Ape-Men." It concerns a trip Nick made around Great Britain with two buddies, and is listed as non-fiction....

- On May 8th of last year an English woman, who wishes to remain unidentified, snapped this photo of what looks like a "greyish figure" running or walking through the countryside. The picture was taken from her mobile phone. She saw nothing, and all of her other photos that afternoon turned out normally. Her husband says that the picture is a "digital fault" and shows nothing more than a small child or a Jogger. You be the judge, dear readers of "Smear". We feel that it is at the opposite end of the credibility scale from the above-mentioned Nellis AFB video...
- The earliest flying saucer crash of the modern era - many years before Roswell - is said to have occurred near the tiny town of Max, Nebraska, on June 6th, 1884.



A group of cowboys was startled by a terrific whirring noise over their heads, and saw a blazing object falling like a shot to Earth. One of the herdsman was burned as he approached the craft.

A later newspaper story reported: "One piece of it looked like the blade of a propeller screw, made of a metal in appearance like brass, about 16 inches wide and 3 1/2 feet long. ...A fragment of a wheel with a milled rim, apparently having a diameter of seven or eight feet, was also picked up. It seemed to be of the same metal and had a remarkable lightness."

No one knows what happened to the debris. In those days there was no U.S. Air Force around to whisk the evidence away! Our Net write-up on this incident does not make clear whether or not the writer thinks that the story is a hoax...

- France has just become the first major nation on Earth to open its official UFO files to the public, and we are very pleased indeed to learn about this. There are over 1,600 cases, involving about 6,000 witness accounts. About 25% are admitted to be unexplained. A spokesman said: "We do not have the least proof that extraterrestrials are behind the unexplained phenomena." But then he added: "Nor do we have any proof that they aren't."

The sensational 1954 "flap" in France, which we have referred to before, is well covered. Apparently this is what caused the National Center for Space Studies to begin collecting data, though the oldest case in the file is from 1937. Then there is the 1981 Trans-en-Provence landing, which famed UFO researcher Jerry Clark swears by (though others have found flaws in it.)

A typical highly unexplained sighting might be the one in August, 1967, when two children tending a herd of cows outside a village in central France reported seeing "four small black beings" fly from the ground and slip head-first into a sphere that then shot skyward in a flash of light. In those days the unknown entities appeared in all sizes and shapes - not the dreary greys we are accustomed to hear about in recent times.

Yes, fellow saucer fiends, something weird is surely going on. But what is it?...

- Famed cryptozoologist Loren Coleman is in deep but unspecified financial troubles, according to a recent Net article we have read. We only met him once many years ago, but Loren seems like a careful & honest researcher, and is the author of several well-known books. - The only thing we really enjoyed about the March 2007 issue of (ugh!) UFO Magazine was not seeing researcher Don Ecker listed as "Director of Research". Apparently he has joined his charming wife Vicki in leaving the UFO field for other pursuits. (We have a 55-page Net rant in which Don egotistically describes his twenty years in the Field.)

We wish the Eckers all the best in their retirement. Maybe they will open a "Mom and Pop" laundromat where hopefully they will wash all their dirty linen in public!...

Bob Luca Jr. and his father Bob Luca Sr. continue to spar with each other on the Net about the famous "Andreasson Affair". (See Page 3 of our last issue.) This was and is one of the strangest abduction cases on record. Junior still sounds a little strange, but the bottom line is that Senior has raised some irrelevant issues, and refuses to take twin lie detector tests together with his son. Stay tuned!...

- This is a black & white rendition of a recent painting by contactee/abductee/artist David Huggins of Hoboken, New Jersey. It depicts a complex scene from one of his trips, many years ago, into Another Realm of some sort. Here David is falling over backwards and yelling, "Whoa' Ladies!?" after a very tense situation in which he wrongfully thought he had accidentally killed a hybrid baby he had fathered with one of the two alien women seen at the top of the picture. Everything was straightened out when he later had Sex (again) with one or both of the ladies.



The other creatures, including the two insectoid beings at the top left, are just watching what's going on.

We have known David Huggins for quite a few years. He seems sane, and we believe that he believes what he is reporting. He has never gone out of his way to cash in on his alleged experiences, though he is willing to lecture if asked. David is unique among the abductees we know about...

- An article from Horseshoe Bend, Arizona (a real swinging town!) tells us of a local politician named Ruth E. Parks who lost re-election because of courtroom testimony that she had been abducted by aliens. Her husband supported her claim by testifying that there was a scar on her neck caused by

Mrs. Parks claimed a "conspiracy", but the 8th Circuit Court ruled that she had no constitutional right to be elected...

Of the eight listed speakers, the only one we have heard of is Stephen Bassett of the "Disclosure Project". Another speaker, named Nicholette Pavlevsky, will actually channel various ETs to speak through her vocal chords about their intervention in human affairs. - A recent (February 1st) UFO sighting in an English town called Archway was rather easily solved, in an interesting way. In this incident, pedestrians stared skyward, people screamed, and oars came to a standstill when a group of about fifteen orange glowing lights travelled southward overhead.

It was all very mysterious until a reader of the local newspaper alerted the editor to a party held not far away, at the exact time of the sightings. This gala event included sky lanterns. These lights, also called "UFO balloons", can be bought online for use at parties. They cost very little and can rise as high as 3,000 feet or so.

Not everyone was convinced by this explanation, however - especially as there were several planes and a helicopter buzzing around the periphery of the lights!

We are under the impression that several other recent British and American UFO cases could be solved by referring to sky lanterns...

- We have written for Fate Magazine off & on for over fifty years, and we receive it free from the editor in exchange for "Smear". The April 2007 issue has an excellent article by veteran offbeat writer Brad Steiger, who over the past forty years or so has written endless books and articles on paranormal subjects including UFOs.

The title is "60 Years of UFO Research - And we're still arguing over whether they come from outer space or inner space". The article touches on just about all the various theories of UFO origin, and includes a long quote from your humble "Smear" editor - plus a really terrible photograph of him! We are sincerely flattered that Steiger felt that our opinion, expressed in a 1998 issue of "Smear", was worth quoting. Steiger is a nationally-famous author and a long-time "Smear" non-subscriber.

Says he: "After 60 years of serious investigation, we UFO researchers can't even agree among ourselves if the enigma originates from outer space or within ourselves - or if it is some metaphysical combination of the two."

Further on, Steiger states: "Today I answer interviewers' questions regarding my conclusions about the UFO enigma by stating that I believe in the reality of the phenomenon, but I have 17 different theories as to what the UFOs might be...I cringe whenever well-intentioned researchers, abductees or channelers tell me that they know exactly what UFOs are..."

A truly wise man is aware of how little he really knows!...

- Two more hard luck stories from the UFO field: Bob Girard is giving up his Arcturus Books headquarters in Florida and moving north within the next few months, probably to the Boston area. Meanwhile, he is having a "50% Off" sale. See the Net for details...

And, CSI (formerly CSICOP) is having financial troubles and (sob!)they had to dip in- to their line of credit at the bank, in order to meet the current payroll. This in spite of their self-proclaimed success in ridding this planet of the curse of superstitious beliefs. We won't give their address here, as we doubt that any of our loyal readers will want to send donations...

- On March 22nd of this year, Robert Todd of Pennsylvania died of cancer at the age of 53. Todd's name may not be known to most ufologists, but for a few years his little zine "Cowflop Quarterly" gave us a lot of exclusive negative information about the infamous Roswell Incident in particular.

It was Todd who obtained Major Jesse Marcel's military records from the government, and learned that this key Roswell witness both exaggerated and lied about various aspects of his educational and military background. This strongly suggests that he may have grossly exaggerated the mysterious properties of the Roswell debris that he handled back in 1947.

Even if the debris were as unconventional as Marcel claimed, it is very hard to imagine that a craft built with it could ever have made it to Earth from another planet or star system. (See Karl Pflock's definitive book on this subject.)

Yet Marcel's son, Dr. Jesse Marcel (Jr.), who was only 11 years old when he briefly handled the debris, has cashed in on the Roswell Syndrome. He lectures at UFO conventions, and last year he wrote a book called "Roswell - It Really Happened". We have not read it.

Back to Todd - He was deliberately abrasive, and had very few friends in the UFO field. One of the few was Matt Graeber, who was the person who contacted us about Todd's death. Robert Todd was a very private person, and no one in the Field ever actually met him, as far as we know. He was a strange man indeed, but he had integrity and perseverance, and made his mark on ufology.

Robert Todd is gone, but the Roswell Incident lives on, as it always will.
