it evaluated in that it was a very unique design and was extraordinarily lethal in World

War II at the end of the war.

I conducted some tests and furnished them the results.

Then I had a very good friend whose name is mentioned in your work, Miles E. Goal.

Well that's very interesting because I have tried for years to find out anything I could

Then when Goal came back rather than going to his old engineering assignment he stayed

in the June of 41 and an earlier time and I don't remember when it really was it might

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00:03:49,800 --> 00:03:56,880

have been in the junior year or possibly senior year that Wright Field sent a recruiting team

around and then gave us a story about Wright Field and asked for those that might be interested

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00:04:04,080 --> 00:04:10,080

and I guess I signed up as a matter of interest and I say I guess because I honestly have

no recollection well when I was on duty with the coast artillery a message came in from

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00:04:16,920 --> 00:04:25,000

Wright Field and asked if I would consider a transfer to the Army Air Corps engineering

My regimental commander was a reserve officer and engineer and he said son you get you get

He said you have an opportunity here to see some really great engineering in the air corps

and prepare you for a later career.

So I followed his advice and we accepted the offer and then I was immediately transferred

Went into the armament laboratory and that's a story in itself how I was chosen to go armament

but when they asked a certain group who'd ever been up in an airplane and I was one

of the few to raise my hand they said well you go to bombing so that's how I went to

I was supposedly the first non-rated not having any wings non-rated reserve officer who was

I was working on a directed project on the bomb site but they would never let me get

I don't think things have changed much have they?

They sort of do that over and over again.

Something led to another I ended up in the B-29 program went with that on the remote

I checked out the first airplanes accepted by the Air Force at all of the B-29 factories

in mind at the moment.

But after the B-29s and I went into the gun unit with Chief of that and got out of military

I believe in May of 46 came back in September in tech intelligence as a civilian.

Back in September of 47 or 46?

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00:07:01,360 --> 00:07:02,360

46.

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00:07:02,360 --> 00:07:07,720

Let me ask you a question about when you were out on the west coast and that were you involved

I was in the Fort Lewis area we were the only mobile anti-aircraft outfit on Fort Lewis

friend of mine who was an engineer at Bremerton at the time said we had no defense at Bremerton

A lot of historians have always wondered about that big battle that went on right over Los

So I feel very fortunate that I didn't join those because some of them we never heard of

But I remember one fantastic story out of San Francisco where I was told that they had

Well in the meantime the sun came up and as you all know the balloon expanded and lifted

the car up and then the car went dancing down the street and then one of my buddies was

in on that and he told me that story I always enjoyed.

But I flew B-17s into Seattle with the air defense balloons up you know for your career

flew in between the balloons you know and then streaked in on the on the runways there.

There was no Seattle international as CTAC as they know it now and then later as I mentioned

I first air plane out of Everett as well the first B-29 out of not the Everett plant

the the Rinton plant first one out of the new Rinton plant.

It was quite a you know quite an experience being on those acceptance teams.

Speaking of B-29s there was a man in the Air Force named Captain Edward Ruppelt.

Well I know Ruppelt well yeah.

113

00:10:23,320 --> 00:10:26,440

He knew him well and he was involved I guess in the B-29.

114

00:10:26,440 --> 00:10:31,720

Yeah he went to India and then stayed with him and you know you you've got that in your

115

00:10:31,720 --> 00:10:34,800

history on the Tinian and all.

116

00:10:34,800 --> 00:10:46,080

And I was slated to join the outfit in the Marianas as the as the wing Air Force Armament

117

Officer or something like that and my answer to my orders were canceled by the engineering

118

people that said I was too vital to their program.

119

They wouldn't let me go.

Well one of the things that I've always been curious about Captain Ruppelt was that he

121

was very highly decorated for a bombardier but we have no information on what he did

122

00:11:11,480 --> 00:11:15,520

to gain so much commendation.

123

00:11:15,520 --> 00:11:22,720

Well usually the bombardier and I was as you as I mentioned I was acquainted with bombing

124

00:11:22,720 --> 00:11:31,560

and installed bomb sites on a number of various new airplanes and I did some test drops but

125

00:11:31,640 --> 00:11:39,200

I never went into combat but I had a lot of friends in combat and you really you you got

126

00:11:39,200 --> 00:11:48,080

your reward your decorations on the achievement of the mission as well as on the performance

127

00:11:48,080 --> 00:11:50,160

of the individual.

128

00:11:50,160 --> 00:12:00,760

Now for instance if the first bombing mission out of India was down into into China it was

129

00:12:00,760 --> 00:12:03,440

not on on to Japan.

130

00:12:03,440 --> 00:12:06,720

First missions went down to Rangoon.

131

00:12:06,720 --> 00:12:12,320

You're scraping my memory that's pretty lame you know after all these years but first missions

132

00:12:12,320 --> 00:12:21,600

went to Rangoon and they didn't do too well and nonetheless there was some engagements

133

00:12:21,600 --> 00:12:24,280

for Jab Zeroes.

134

00:12:24,280 --> 00:12:32,840

There were airplanes shot down and so forth so easily some air medals would be awarded.

135

00:12:32,840 --> 00:12:39,800

Now later of course when the missions ran out of Japan and the low level in particular

136

00:12:39,800 --> 00:12:47,880

where they really dropped tons of incendiaries at very low altitudes and those people again

137

00:12:47,880 --> 00:12:54,080

were decorated because of their bombing achievement.

138

00:12:54,080 --> 00:13:02,200

Sometimes they would also have a engagement like a head-on engagement with fighters that

139

00:13:02,200 --> 00:13:12,680

were dedicated to crashing the B-29's head-on on a suicide and the bombardier would take

140

00:13:12,680 --> 00:13:19,840

over the forward firepower and he could shoot down an airplane or two.

141

00:13:19,840 --> 00:13:21,840

Consequently you get decorated.

142

00:13:21,840 --> 00:13:27,240

I have no idea what I root out citations were I'm just telling you that's some of the way

143

00:13:27,240 --> 00:13:30,960

he seemed to be a pretty quiet fellow.

144

00:13:30,960 --> 00:13:32,960

What's quiet fellow?

145

00:13:32,960 --> 00:13:39,040

Well from what I understand he didn't talk about himself much but I guess he was an

146

00:13:39,040 --> 00:13:41,840

extremely dedicated worker.

147

When he was in the organization I certainly encountered him in meetings and what not he's

148

00:13:51,840 --> 00:13:55,000

on one side of the aisle I'm on the other.

149

00:13:55,000 --> 00:13:58,840

I don't remember him as a fireball.

150

00:13:58,840 --> 00:14:04,120

We also had some rather well frankly drunken parties.

151

00:14:04,120 --> 00:14:07,120

I don't remember him in them at all.

152

00:14:07,120 --> 00:14:14,120

The whole gang raises all kinds of cane and people do things that they wouldn't do normally

153

00:14:14,120 --> 00:14:21,320

and what not but I do not remember root out in any one of those joining in or making a

154

00:14:21,320 --> 00:14:24,240

scene or anything you know.

155

00:14:24,240 --> 00:14:30,440

Some of the younger guys just didn't choose to join in on that kind of thing.

156

00:14:30,440 --> 00:14:39,600

The old World War II types were more likely to be doing that.

157

00:14:39,600 --> 00:14:46,200

Unfortunate Christmas party that were in the empty cases and bottles were counted by the

158

00:14:46,200 --> 00:14:53,320

base police and we were asked to leave out of building 11.

159

00:14:53,320 --> 00:15:02,600

The analysis then went over to area A alongside of the headquarters of the technical service

160

00:15:02,600 --> 00:15:10,240

command or material command and we went into a building there I think it was something

161

00:15:10,240 --> 00:15:13,920

like 867T or something like that.

162

00:15:13,920 --> 00:15:18,400

But it was one of the logistics buildings and we got the second floor of it and that

163

was before we moved to before the whole thing moved to the huts fronted by 263 and the role

164

of well they were actually a special kind of building for storage and handling issue

165

of documents books like technical manuals.

Remember Kios?

167

Sure.

Km's and that sort of thing.

Sure.

That was the operation that was in there.

171

The building was vacated and we got it and it had like the head house of concrete block

172

and then like eight transverse wings maybe seven and a central hall going down the whole

So these weren't necessarily quats at that step?

175

No, no.

Not at all.

It's just a way called euphemism or expression.

And you know we always had a real big problem with our driving business.

When we were over in that area B party that I spoke of one of the people that's in your

Yeah, but I've never seen a photo of him or know anything about him at all.

A rugged looking individual.

184

So John answered to that was oh I always leave my car keys on the desk and everybody uses

185

00:17:23,640 --> 00:17:25,800

a car any time they want.

186

I didn't drive through any gate you know.

187

Where's your proof who was driving it?

188

He didn't deny it was his car but he didn't get stuck with it.

189

We just all added to the color of our escapade.

190

I remember another time one of the guys of all things he hit the guard house on the way

191

out.

192

00:17:47,280 --> 00:17:48,280

Oh no.

193

00:17:48,280 --> 00:17:52,600

And you'd be an ex-military you know that don't go over very good.

194

00:17:52,600 --> 00:17:58,480

No, not the guard house proper, no.

195

00:17:58,480 --> 00:18:10,040

Well I was there from the time I reported in September 46th till I retired on June 30th

196

00:18:10,040 --> 00:18:11,040

1973.

197

00:18:11,040 --> 00:18:15,800

At the time I retired I was GS-15.

198

00:18:15,800 --> 00:18:24,400

My military career ended at the end of the Korean Recall in 53 when I went out on active

199

00:18:24,400 --> 00:18:28,200

duty reserve, active reserve status.

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00:18:28,200 --> 00:18:37,240

But they did some kind of a program at that time to re-establish your reserve standing

201

00:18:37,240 --> 00:18:43,760

and I chose to resign because it had cost me considerably for my recall.

202

00:18:43,760 --> 00:18:52,200

I was a 14 when I was recalled and went back to my World War II grade of major.

203

00:18:52,200 --> 00:18:56,080

General Garland wanted me to stay on as he did some other people.

204

00:18:56,080 --> 00:19:04,360

He not promised me but he pretty much assured me that I could get assistant air out of Shade

205

00:19:04,360 --> 00:19:07,880

Paris which was a real attractive idea.

206

00:19:07,880 --> 00:19:14,960

But I had a family then, girls in school, my wife and I decided that we would go civilian

207

00:19:14,960 --> 00:19:16,960

from there on.

208

00:19:16,960 --> 00:19:19,720

So you know things could have been a lot different.

209

00:19:19,720 --> 00:19:21,560

What was General Garland like?

210

00:19:21,560 --> 00:19:25,000

Garland was just a fine general officer.

211

00:19:25,000 --> 00:19:32,400

He was a classic man, had bearing and class, looked like a general, talked like a general.

212

00:19:32,400 --> 00:19:38,600

He was certainly a man whose intelligence was admired.

213

00:19:38,600 --> 00:19:41,480

I never heard a bad word about Garland.

214

00:19:41,480 --> 00:19:45,320

He was close friends with Colonel Don, wasn't he?

215

00:19:45,320 --> 00:19:46,800

That I could not tell you.

216

00:19:46,800 --> 00:19:49,000

I have no recollection of it.

217

00:19:49,000 --> 00:19:54,160

I have a really terrible, terrible Xerox photograph of him and Colonel Don together.

218

00:19:54,160 --> 00:20:03,840

They very well might have been in the same picture at various times when we had get-togethers

219

00:20:03,840 --> 00:20:10,720

and I'd have to look at the, I don't have any of the military stuff at the desk I'm

220

00:20:10,720 --> 00:20:11,720

at now.

221

00:20:11,720 --> 00:20:20,120

I have a biography of Don and of Garland and it might indicate where there may or may not

222

00:20:20,120 --> 00:20:21,600

have been overlap.

223

00:20:21,600 --> 00:20:27,880

But Don went on to be a real big time intelligence operator in Vietnam.

224

00:20:27,880 --> 00:20:28,880

Oh he did?

225

00:20:28,880 --> 00:20:29,880

Yes.

226

00:20:29,880 --> 00:20:31,880

Oh, well I didn't know that.

227

00:20:31,880 --> 00:20:32,880

Hell.

228

00:20:32,880 --> 00:20:40,080

I remember talking to him at a reunion we had in Dayton, down at the convention center.

229

00:20:40,080 --> 00:20:45,720

I could give you the year and Don came to it.

230

00:20:45,720 --> 00:20:58,480

I had been in Vietnam just before I got out and consequently we shared some Vietnam business.

231

00:20:58,480 --> 00:21:03,880

I was chairman of the Joint Services Battle Damage Assessment in Vietnam.

232

00:21:03,880 --> 00:21:07,280

Oh, you went in and checked everything out then, huh?

233

00:21:07,280 --> 00:21:08,280

Hell.

234

00:21:08,280 --> 00:21:09,280

Well I was thinking-

235

00:21:09,280 --> 00:21:13,200

Well, Graham, I did not get, well I did get shot at.

236

00:21:13,200 --> 00:21:20,920

At least we understood our airplane was under fire one time but I did not go out in the

237

00:21:20,920 --> 00:21:23,280

jungle or anything like that.

238

00:21:23,280 --> 00:21:30,080

I was the type that was in the hotel on the outside of the gate of Ton Sinout and watched

239

00:21:30,080 --> 00:21:32,520

the helicopters come in, nose to tail.

240

00:21:32,520 --> 00:21:35,160

I'll never forget that, you know.

241

00:21:35,160 --> 00:21:42,800

I want you to know that when I heard you were coming in June, the last of June, Rosengarten,

242

00:21:42,800 --> 00:21:46,680

I talked to him about it and I talked to Tolles about it.

243

00:21:46,680 --> 00:21:54,120

I had been told by Rob Young that you were coming and he said to make contact on your

244

00:21:54,120 --> 00:21:58,760

arrival through them, which I talked to them.

245

00:21:58,760 --> 00:22:02,280

I went down last yesterday, I think it was a day before.

246

00:22:02,280 --> 00:22:10,880

It's been almost all day digging into a huge box of summaries of various time histories

247

00:22:10,880 --> 00:22:14,600

that were written and notes and whatnot.

248

00:22:14,600 --> 00:22:17,840

The Red Honaker was a real character.

249

00:22:17,840 --> 00:22:25,000

He started at Wright Field in high school years working as a high school student with

250

part-time on the base and used to fly and more or less maintained the galley on airplanes

251

00:22:32,640 --> 00:22:38,120

so equipped and poured coffee and all that kind of stuff made sandwiches.

252

00:22:38,120 --> 00:22:47,880

Eventually he took a job full-time and then he became Mr. You Are, unsatisfactory reports

253

00:22:47,880 --> 00:22:51,000

from the field in maintenance.

254

00:22:51,000 --> 00:22:55,000

He became very, very well-known.

255

00:22:55,000 --> 00:22:58,120

He was a very colorful figure.

256

00:22:58,120 --> 00:23:06,480

Red described himself as five foot seventeen and an eighth of a ton.

257

00:23:06,480 --> 00:23:09,000

I think you can convert that.

258

00:23:09,000 --> 00:23:15,320

419

00:34:48,480 --> 00:34:49,480

Well, actually...

420

Commander, I was chief of analysis when I arrived.

421

00:34:52,480 --> 00:35:05,480

From what I understand, and from what I'm seeing on the organizational charts, Colonel McCoy held the position as chief of analysis real early in 1946 after he returned.

422

Yeah, he and Seashore both did.

423

00:35:07,480 --> 00:35:10,480

Yeah, and then Miles took over.

424

00:35:10,480 --> 00:35:11,480

Yeah.

And that, but then just very shortly thereafter, Colonel Klingerman stepped in.

426

And just from a historic point, was this a demotion for Miles?

No, what had happened was that Miles was a right-hand type of guy to put out of old engineering division.

He had no friends out of engineering.

And as I told you earlier, Miles went over to Germany with Putt, and on the Putt team.

431

Right.

All right, when he comes back, Putt, of course, was delighted that he chose to stay in tech intelligence rather than go back to his armament job, armament engineering.

433

So Putt rewarded him with his chief of analysis.

434

Okay.

435

Okay.

Seashore, McCoy, McCoy, of course, was an engineer that had been in engineering school, may have actually been in with Putt.

438

But Putt certainly was not too keen on Seashore, and he wasn't on Watson.

439

00:36:28,480 --> 00:36:29,480

But why is that?

440

00:36:29,480 --> 00:36:30,480

Don't know.

441

Oh.

442

00:36:31,480 --> 00:36:50,480

But I do know that, and this is a fact that very few people know, that Watson was actually let out of tech intelligence and went to Washington in his first tour as chief of the collection division.

443

A very few of Watson's histories pointed that out.

444

00:36:54,480 --> 00:37:05,480

And I stuck it in in the time of Ashcroft, putting what was probably the best of the orderly histories, you know.

445

And I figured out what Watson's earlier years were, and I had some reference dates and whatnot.

446

And I know when Watson left and went to Washington, and then of course we had him coming back as chief of attic.

447

And that's in the picture that I'm going to be sending you.

448

And, you know, that's one of the only things I can remember about him.

462

Now, he has signed my travel orders and I sat in and talked to him.

463

He was in goal, shared the office.

464

And I was in that office quite a bit being seen, you know, traveling with goal on right pool.

465

00:38:46,480 --> 00:38:49,480

We'd get together before we leave, you know.

466

And I often had to sit and wait for him to finish up.

467

00:38:54,480 --> 00:38:57,480

Was Colonel Hymstreet always involved in the big parties?

468

I can't remember that.

469

Honestly, I'm not trying to avoid it.

470

No, I understand.

471

No, I don't remember Andy partying.

472

00:39:07,480 --> 00:39:11,480

I have another mystery name here that I don't know very much about.

473

And that's Colonel Hossman.

474

Oh, Gordon.

475

00:39:16,480 --> 00:39:19,480

Gordon Hossman, nicknamed Bubblehead.

476

Bubblehead.

477

00:39:22,480 --> 00:39:28,480

None of the electronics people had any respect for him whatsoever.

478

00:39:28,480 --> 00:39:31,480

And he was a alcoholic.

479

00:39:31,480 --> 00:39:38,480

Unfortunately, the poor man died down in Florida literally in the gutter.

480

00:39:38,480 --> 00:39:41,480

Fell off the curb, you know.

481

00:39:41,480 --> 00:39:48,480

I was at a party one night where he fell all the way down the stairs, you know, just terrible.

482

00:39:48,480 --> 00:39:54,480

And when he took over electronics and the people said,

483

00:39:54,480 --> 00:39:59,480

we're going to the AIWE meeting, he said, what's that?

484

00:39:59,480 --> 00:40:08,480

You know, he had no background in electronic technical background at all.

485

00:40:08,480 --> 00:40:12,480

Did you ever meet a Dr. Charles Carroll?

486

00:40:12,480 --> 00:40:16,480

No, no, that name I did not.

487

00:40:16,480 --> 00:40:22,480

I don't remember if I ever did encounter him, but I saw the name in the write-up

488

00:40:22,480 --> 00:40:26,480

and Mike asked me about him and I don't remember him at all.

489

00:40:26,480 --> 00:40:28,480

How about Major Boggs?

490

Boggs is up in Washington.

491

I have a very close friend that knows Boggs very well.

492

I just, I think I went to lunch with Boggs when I went up.

493

I was on the anti-aircraft working group in FNYN and I went up almost weekly to,

494

well, let's see, bi-weekly or something like that,

495

00:40:54,480 --> 00:41:00,480

but I frequently went up to sit in on the anti-aircraft intelligence working group.

496

We wrote the Air Force position for the national estimates and so forth.

497

And at that time I met Boggs.

498

As I did, Patton, Steve Posoni and Rosenschweig.

Rosenschweig?

Yeah.

501

00:41:22,480 --> 00:41:23,480

Never heard of the name.

502

00:41:23,480 --> 00:41:30,480

They, the Patton, Posoni and Rosenschweig were the three,

503

00:41:30,480 --> 00:41:36,480

scientific advisors to the Deputy for Intelligence at CORE USEP.

504

00:41:36,480 --> 00:41:41,480

Now that's interesting because I have searched for a long time on Dr. Posoni,

505

00:41:41,480 --> 00:41:47,480

but it was just recently that I recovered some information on him.

506

00:41:47,480 --> 00:41:51,480

And that's, well, I'll tell you, some of these guys you knew,

507

00:41:51,480 --> 00:41:54,480

I don't know where they hide, but try to find them.

508

00:41:54,480 --> 00:42:01,480

Rosenschweig was a, if I remember right, and he has been guest at my home and what not,

509

00:42:01,480 --> 00:42:05,480

I really liked him, we spent a lot of time together.

510

He was an OSS guy and had a really a terrific deep root in intelligence.

511

Dr. Patton was also a general in reserve and he used to have his general's uniform

512

hanging on his clothes rack alongside his desk.

513

00:42:25,480 --> 00:42:29,480

And at the drop of the hat would go on active duty for the day, you know.

514

Oh, wow.

515

00:42:30,480 --> 00:42:31,480

The Pentagon.

516

00:42:31,480 --> 00:42:36,480

And he finally let go of the intelligence business, got a promotion to major general

517

and was head of the Air Force Reserve Program, if my memory serves me right.

518
