All right, those particles are minute, cannot be seen by a naked eye.

144

Yet sometimes, somewhere, they must in some way or another, associate with one another.

145

Once two particles associate with one another, what happens?

146

150

161

Well, naturally, softest elements, so to speak, like metals,

162

00:11:40,000 --> 00:11:44,000

softest elements will begin to melt first under the lightest heat,

163

00:11:44,000 --> 00:11:46,000

and those are gold and silver and stuff like that.

164

We today mine, we find veins.

165

00:11:48,000 --> 00:11:52,000

The veins are not just veins that have become grown, that way they flow on that way.

166

00:11:52,000 --> 00:11:58,000

When there were liquid forms, when the cavity began to form, and the gases naturally had to escape,

167

00:11:58,000 --> 00:12:04,000

condensation was taken in some degree that water formation began to take place,

168

00:12:04,000 --> 00:12:10,000

and the other gases escaped through the pores of this eye-collar ball-headed earth.

169

00:12:10,000 --> 00:12:14,000

It had to, because there's nothing so solid once it's not porous.

170

00:12:14,000 --> 00:12:19,000

And the pressure to intense pushed itself out in the ball-headed earth for the first time started sweating.

171

00:12:19,000 --> 00:12:21,000

What do you call a sweat?

172

00:12:21,000 --> 00:12:23,000

And as it started sweating, the more sweat came out of there,

173

00:12:23,000 --> 00:12:27,000

the greater the boiling particles going on there, and the second place within the center of the earth,

174

00:12:27,000 --> 00:12:31,000

the greater amount of it, through its revolving, began to evaporate into space,

175

00:12:31,000 --> 00:12:35,000

which finally created the clouds that did not exist before.

176

00:12:35,000 --> 00:12:36,000

See?

177

00:12:36,000 --> 00:12:41,000

So it finally was not washed up there, it finally had to come back and fall back first rain.

178

00:12:41,000 --> 00:12:47,000

And even the evidence are showing here that the dinosaur, which was in the early days,

179

00:12:47,000 --> 00:12:53,000

the vegetarian was a big monster that he just turns up on tons of vegetation per day.

180

00:12:53,000 --> 00:12:58,000

You have to do that, and in order to keep the atmosphere clear from poison.

181

00:12:58,000 --> 00:13:02,000

If all of that had fallen back to decay, our atmosphere would have been poisoned

182

00:13:02,000 --> 00:13:04,000

not suitable for human beings.

183

00:13:04,000 --> 00:13:09,000

But after it's miled down and got to normalcy, then the dinosaur vanishes,

184

00:13:09,000 --> 00:13:12,000

and the smaller animals come in when things begin to take on order.

185

00:13:12,000 --> 00:13:15,000

That's the only way I can see this whole thing has happened.

186

00:13:15,000 --> 00:13:18,000

And it happened the same way on another planet.

187

00:13:18,000 --> 00:13:21,000

Then we take our earth and consider, see what it has reproduced.

188

All right, we take a system, like a solar system of ours,

189

00:13:24,000 --> 00:13:27,000

and isolate it from the rest of space.

190

00:13:27,000 --> 00:13:29,000

Like we isolated an ocean from an ocean.

191

Anything that's born within that system then must be born of the same elements.

192

00:13:34,000 --> 00:13:36,000

Then it should reproduce the like of that it did.

193

00:13:36,000 --> 00:13:39,000

Of that is only minor one in comparison to the others.

194

00:13:39,000 --> 00:13:43,000

So if ours reproduced what it did, the others must have reproduced the like.

195

The society set up in a situation in there,

196

00:13:47,000 --> 00:13:50,000

sure we have such conditions in this world.

197

We have conditions in this world, we find that some part of the world's civilization

198

00:13:54,000 --> 00:13:57,000

has learned certain things and are top-centered.

199

00:13:57,000 --> 00:14:00,000

While another one is doing something else in their top-centered.

200

00:14:00,000 --> 00:14:02,000

We have learned, what we have learned,

201

00:14:02,000 --> 00:14:05,000

it became the top-centered in the world, mechanically and advanced

202

00:14:05,000 --> 00:14:07,000

beyond all nations of the world.

203

00:14:07,000 --> 00:14:09,000

See, yet it's the one same world.

204

00:14:09,000 --> 00:14:13,000

You might say, lay that out into a system of planets the same way.

205

00:14:13,000 --> 00:14:17,000

So there'd be some advanced set of us, some maybe not as far as us.

206

00:14:17,000 --> 00:14:20,000

We're not the poorest, but we're not the best either.

207

00:14:20,000 --> 00:14:22,000

See, you gotta look at the picture straight.

208

00:14:22,000 --> 00:14:28,000

And we ourselves are actually planning to go to the planet Mars or Venus.

209

00:14:28,000 --> 00:14:33,000

And I am sure that we are blessed without a war for a while,

210

00:14:33,000 --> 00:14:36,000

say for the next ten years, that we will do it.

211

00:14:36,000 --> 00:14:38,000

Oh, I'm from a good institute.

212

00:14:38,000 --> 00:14:42,000

Yeah, well, we will do it. We're almost on top of it now.

213

00:14:42,000 --> 00:14:47,000

And the only thing we'll have to change is about what we talk to some individuals

214

00:14:47,000 --> 00:14:51,000

from the conveyor that have much on the drawing board and that line already.

215

00:14:51,000 --> 00:14:53,000

And probably even further than that.

216

00:14:53,000 --> 00:14:56,000

But there's only one thing we have to learn.

217

And we have to learn it before we can make a successful flight to any planet,

218

00:15:01,000 --> 00:15:03,000

even outside of our own system.

219

And that is, we have to give up air dynamics of present day

220

00:15:07,000 --> 00:15:10,000

and go back to new line altogether.

221

Because in air dynamics, we work on stresses, all sorts of things like that.

222

And we have to build our ships accordingly.

223

All right? But in nature, as far as the Earth is concerned, there is no such a thing.

All right? Our people that have asked this question at one time, as we should have asked,

228

well, the Earth is revolving 18.5 miles per second, steadily.

229

We don't even know we're moving.

230

00:15:50,000 --> 00:15:53,000

What makes this Earth move on its orbit?

231

00:15:53,000 --> 00:15:59,000

Not only is it moving in its orbit, but it's also moving on a 24-hour basis

232

00:15:59,000 --> 00:16:02,000

and then orbit up 365 days in the meantime, wobble stage.

233

00:16:02,000 --> 00:16:05,000

Three stages. And it's operating in three stages.

234

00:16:05,000 --> 00:16:08,000

Yet we know nothing about it. We're living right on it.

235

00:16:08,000 --> 00:16:10,000

In other words, we're really writing the spaceship.

236

00:16:10,000 --> 00:16:12,000

That's so-called nature mail.

237

00:16:12,000 --> 00:16:17,000

See, at 18.5 miles per second, we're writing that.

238

00:16:17,000 --> 00:16:20,000

And don't know nothing about it. So, oh, there's your clue.

239

00:16:20,000 --> 00:16:22,000

They have asked that question.

240

00:16:22,000 --> 00:16:26,000

No jet engine like we say it today? No wings on it? What makes it move?

241

00:16:26,000 --> 00:16:28,000

This started investigating.

242

00:16:28,000 --> 00:16:31,000

Maybe we can build a satellite, what we call it today, a satellite,

243

00:16:31,000 --> 00:16:34,000

that'll operate the same way only man's made.

244

00:16:34,000 --> 00:16:36,000

And they have substituted that.

245

00:16:36,000 --> 00:16:38,000

So there's really no mystery involved.

Because the air, what we call the atmosphere,

it began just that fast. It began just that fast.

252

And we died in the lack of air.

253

And if it continued to stay standing still,

254

then the energy within the Earth itself would exert itself to stop breaking it up.

255

Just like a pilot may go up so high without a pressurized ship.

256

00:17:11,000 --> 00:17:15,000

And lighter air, he hasn't got the support for his body from the outside in the morning,

257

00:17:15,000 --> 00:17:18,000

begins to expand. The same idea.

258

00:17:18,000 --> 00:17:22,000

Okay. So what they have really learned is this.

259

00:17:22,000 --> 00:17:26,000

They utilize this magnetic force as a call to magnetic force in our early days,

260

00:17:26,000 --> 00:17:29,000

who is non-counter-esthetic, electricity producing our lightning.

261

We must admit that when there's a flash of lightning for two, three hours,

262

go without like it does in California sometime, that seemed last year very remarkably,

263

that only all the power plants hooked together would only produce one flash like that

264

00:17:43,000 --> 00:17:45,000

and that would be the end of the power.

Yet here it goes on for hours. There's plenty of it there.

266

Okay. They realize that. They hope down to that power.

267

So they have power where they want to go. They have access partly to this point.

268

They only utilize 10% for propulsion. 90% they must dissipate.

269

What do they do? They dissipate it from the skin of the ship.

270

Say what we call the skin of the ship, the surface.

271

All particles in space are negative to space. Space is possible.

275

277

In a wavelet system like you drop a table in a still pool of water

278

280

So the ship is right in cobble, right on through. They don't even know when to make a turn.

288

I use this illustration and explanation. You take eight, everybody knows what an eight is like.

289

All right? The yolk of an eight is the solid part of that egg.

290

The view of the heart of a white of an egg is just like air with the around the earth.

291

All right? The shell of the egg is the fringe of the egg, which is the crust.

292

If we were to put a man on the yolk of an egg, he is submerged in the white of an egg, is he not?

293

Then we throw him, throw the whole world. Would he know he'd be thrown? No.

And static electricity we already know in the military setup, that once you load a ball, how a ball is static electricity,

302

the darn things start to open up. They, alright. So they're condensers.

303

The ship, they can cut one off or the other. See? Whichever that they cut off, that's the way the ship is going to go.

It doesn't make no difference. To us it looks like they make right angle turns, but they don't.

307

They really don't. It is very funny. You see, Captain Mantell got caught.

308

He would never get hurt. Had this ship been a fuselage alone without the wings.

309

Because you like taking two piles of magnets, I think you've got some magnets here.

310

00:21:21,000 --> 00:21:26,000

I'm sure you do. Yeah. And two piles of magnets. They're for the like.

311

00:21:26,000 --> 00:21:29,000

So they attract you like that. That's what would have happened.

312

But having a wing, you would have caught this way, start to listen to that wing.

313

You got caught in this power that was radiating, protecting the major ship, this radiation they're all talking about,

314

repelling force. He got pulled in by the wing and started twisting.

Well, I've heard Miller that day. Now, he had some good sound logic. Let me put it that way.

366

Logic that could work in very nicely.

367

Well, when a man comes out and says there's 3,500 Martians ships, he will save humanity, I say to him and anybody else, that's a lot of the loamy.

368

Well, I talked to Miller out there at the convention for quite a while. He's the only one I talked to actually, very long.

369

That's right. I've seen that they had those two little gadgets up there.

371

What that is, I don't know. That's an invention or discovery, or whatever you may want to call it, of John Otto.

372

In some way or another, I don't know anything about it, but John Otto picked it up on some great magazine at one time published in the Wismannam.

373

That part, I don't know whether it's true or not. That's what I have heard.

374

It's not this infrared machine. I don't know how it works, but there is also supposed to be or anything as my own analysis.

375

If the thing was that good, our government would be long using it.

376

Because we have technicians, I'll tell you boys something, and guided missile men, I'm not mentioning their names.

377

I never mention names of men in any government beam.

378

00:28:29,000 --> 00:28:38,000

The only time I mention names to you, when I wrote you into pictures when you were at the base, by Mr. Thompson, he told me to use them.

379

But otherwise, I don't mention names at all.

380

But I had four guided missile men of California that interviewed me on the question of this nature.

381

382

383

384

I don't know just what takes place. Do you mean that I've been in the ship and I should know?

385

We don't know. They wouldn't commit themselves. Why do they have the other?

386

Well, then I told them just what the result is.

387

I mean, it was good. It's good for defense. So from there on, I won't go into the cloud.

388

And that's good for defense. Then they asked me, if I couldn't become a consultant to the guided missile job, I said, no mechanic.

I did play around with radio's only first-class crystal sets. Well, that's all.

So I do know that we have men that can do most anything. See?

We've got men that can do anything that you tell them. All we do is want your ideas.

395

00:29:57,000 --> 00:30:00,000

I said, that calls for wages, doesn't it, you know?

396

00:30:00,000 --> 00:30:06,000

I don't want to become a wage burner from the government side because if I did, I couldn't be talking like I'm talking now.

397

00:30:06,000 --> 00:30:11,000

I said, I know that. I put in quite a bit of time and a service myself. I know how it works.

398

So I said, I won't get tangled up there, but I'll give any information that the government wants free without charge.

399

That's right. But I do know, as they told me, that anything that we might conceive mentally that

sounds logical can be done.

Well, not try to colonize, let's say, but try to go out and, well, what would we do if we, well, I mean, they've done this.

They tell me I was about to use the word loaded because if I go to England and they say loaded, they think you're drunk.

Well, anyway, so just as I got through lecturing and already through the question period,

445

about ready to break up, there was a lady there that had me on a radio station, too.

And three men come up on the stage also.

448

And they come up to me on the show and he says, I'm so and so and so and so.

They finally got to the point that they didn't give a dime,

00:34:28,000 --> 00:34:30,000

whether they probably knew or they didn't.

They got out to meet themselves.

452

No one to the public.

453

00:34:33,000 --> 00:34:36,000

There were ones I was talking about that happened in Canada.

454

00:34:36,000 --> 00:34:37,000

This lady took him up right away.

455

00:34:37,000 --> 00:34:41,000

Next day, I guess after I left, they had him on the radio.

456

00:34:41,000 --> 00:34:47,000

But there was one, there's a big businessman, got several jewelry, big jewelry stores.

457

00:34:47,000 --> 00:34:51,000

He got his in a hardware business, also with a number of stores.

458

00:34:51,000 --> 00:34:58,000

And this man of the Air Force that was in the end of the Air Force in Canada doing the war.

459

So they were men that had to be careful as to what they were going to say or hurt their business.

460

Yet after they'd come out that body, come right out, and they repeated the same thing.

But, well, you were down in Mexico, and you talked to this one man that had also contact with you.

which must have been a concussion, a helmet, that's all.

Well, flight, while in flight, had an armament head to come in to be in contact with mothership or whoever he was in contact with.

So they establish a mental communion with you because every human being has a different frequency.

511

There's no two or like.

So how do you get it from a person? You know it's coming from the megan because it's identical in the way it alerts you.

So on the second contact, I got out of the ship there, he started talking English.

514

I was very much disturbed because he would talk English to me in the beginning.

515

So I can say two words in Polish.

Well, I have received some in there.

563

Now, our scientists say, from a spectrum analysis of the different planets and the atmosphere of the different planets,

564

that, well, I can't keep it straight, but one of them has a carbon dioxide.

565

00:41:27,000 --> 00:41:29,000

Yeah, Venus, both of them have that.

566

00:41:29,000 --> 00:41:32,000

Well, I'll tell you, we reason along their lines.

567

00:41:32,000 --> 00:41:36,000

We're not going to hurt them or we're not going to try to discredit them.

568

00:41:36,000 --> 00:41:38,000

There's reason along their lines.

569

00:41:38,000 --> 00:41:41,000

Spectrum is a wonderful thing, wonderful invention.

570

00:41:41,000 --> 00:41:45,000

You can put it on a piece right here and actually know the weakness of your iron

571

00:41:45,000 --> 00:41:47,000

or anything that you might want to analyze.

572

00:41:47,000 --> 00:41:49,000

That's very good.

573

00:41:49,000 --> 00:41:54,000

But since astronomers also admit that space is full of called space debris,

574

00:41:54,000 --> 00:42:00,000

meteorites, particles of dust, as we stated before, and gas pockets of all sorts,

575

00:42:00,000 --> 00:42:06,000

let us then say there's 60 million miles distance between us and planet Venus.

576

00:42:06,000 --> 00:42:11,000

We're going to register all of that before we hit the target.

577

00:42:11,000 --> 00:42:16,000

Since we don't know what percentages of interference there is between us and that body,

578

00:42:16,000 --> 00:42:18,000

how are we going to get the correct answer?

579

00:42:18,000 --> 00:42:19,000

I'll teach you.

580

00:42:19,000 --> 00:42:20,000

You see?

581

00:42:20,000 --> 00:42:24,000

So therefore, what they say, like the monoxide gas on Venus,

582

00:42:24,000 --> 00:42:27,000

could have registered anywhere in between,

583

00:42:27,000 --> 00:42:30,000

and being a layer there all the time, anytime they try it,

584

00:42:30,000 --> 00:42:33,000

no matter how many times they get the same answer.

585

00:42:33,000 --> 00:42:39,000

We will not know the truth until we have, and I think we are working along that line,

586

00:42:39,000 --> 00:42:46,000

invent what I call an electronic stick that can go out foot by foot into outer space

587

00:42:46,000 --> 00:42:53,000

and register each foot separately and then register all of that, then hit the target,

588

00:42:53,000 --> 00:42:58,000

then deduct all the interference that's been registered prior to the hit in the target,

589

00:42:58,000 --> 00:43:03,000

and we have exact percentages, and then we can actually know what's on the planet.

590

00:43:03,000 --> 00:43:09,000

So that's the only answer we have, and then we're working along that line,

591

00:43:09,000 --> 00:43:15,000

and I think, according to my information from France, I have a paper on it in French,

592

00:43:15,000 --> 00:43:17,000

and also a letter.

593

00:43:17,000 --> 00:43:22,000

There's an instrument in France going into operation this month, coming month,

594

00:43:22,000 --> 00:43:26,000

it's a different instrument than what we have down here, like the 200-inch.

595

00:43:26,000 --> 00:43:30,000

It's electronic type. They don't say what it actually is, right,

596

00:43:30,000 --> 00:43:33,000

but it costs one tenth of what this one costs,

597

00:43:33,000 --> 00:43:39,000

and actually, as they are speculating on it, the moment that will give us the answer

598

00:43:39,000 --> 00:43:45,000

on the conditions of each planet, that will give us the answer on the forest, water,

599

00:43:45,000 --> 00:43:49,000

and everything else upon the planet, or bodies that we might hit,

600

00:43:49,000 --> 00:43:54,000

as well, they say, in the course of two years, if it works out that they are planning,

601

00:43:54,000 --> 00:44:00,000

that if there was a show going on on planet Venus, they could transmit it to our present TV set.

602

00:44:00,000 --> 00:44:06,000

That's how good the instrument is supposed to be, or speculating on it to be.

603

00:44:06,000 --> 00:44:08,000

That will be something.

604

00:44:08,000 --> 00:44:12,000

But you see, our instruments are good so far as they go,

605

00:44:12,000 --> 00:44:18,000

but we do know that even the 100-inch telescope down here only goes out one billion light-years,

606

00:44:18,000 --> 00:44:23,000

and one billion light-years in the universe that has no beginning or an ending is really nothing on it.

607

00:44:23,000 --> 00:44:24,000

Not really.

608

00:44:24,000 --> 00:44:25,000

That's right.

609

00:44:25,000 --> 00:44:26,000

That's right.

610

00:44:26,000 --> 00:44:29,000

Because, like people say, well, it must be in some place.

611

00:44:29,000 --> 00:44:31,000

Well, let us say there was a man.

612

00:44:31,000 --> 00:44:35,000

There was something supporting that end, which was greater than the end of cell.

613

00:44:35,000 --> 00:44:39,000

And so it goes on that way. You could argue that for not the doomsday.

614

And I think the word eternity expresses it very well.

615

So you see, that's where our astronomy is today.

616

See, for instance, we sometimes ignore, and this is an unfortunate part,

we ignore our people that hadn't had much education,

618

00:44:56,000 --> 00:45:01,000

excluded totally from any important job.

619

I'm going to give you something that I happen to hit some astronomers on,

620

00:45:05,000 --> 00:45:10,000

and then need to do it in the harming them, or anything, but I just have to question them.

621

00:45:10,000 --> 00:45:15,000

And as our gentleman, the 48-inch telescope, or Mount Paloma down here,

622

00:45:15,000 --> 00:45:21,000

is endeavoring to make an atlas of the sky, something that had never been done for the Geographic Society.

623

00:45:21,000 --> 00:45:26,000

And it's been in operation for quite some time, and it's not getting very far.

624

00:45:26,000 --> 00:45:29,000

And yet, this is the finest instrument ever made.

625

00:45:29,000 --> 00:45:33,000

But supposing that a man come to you, there were four of them,

626

00:45:33,000 --> 00:45:38,000

supposing a man come to you and lay down a map to come there, the atlas of the sky.

627

00:45:38,000 --> 00:45:41,000

What would you say? We'd say he was a genius.

628

00:45:41,000 --> 00:45:45,000

I says, but in the end, you'd ask him, why he got his education, wouldn't you?

629

00:45:45,000 --> 00:45:47,000

Yes, we would do that.

630

00:45:47,000 --> 00:45:50,000

Supposing he told you he could write his own name.

631

00:45:50,000 --> 00:45:51,000

Well, would you say then?

632

Well, there would be ways, now, don't we? Just throw the map in the wastebasket.

633

I said, that's what I thought you would say.

I said, let me say something without any harm,

according to your present statement that you have made,

founded on what is today, in modern times, termed colossal ignorance.

What do you mean by that, why you all spoke up?

I says, just a minute.

640

Isn't astronomy founded on the Zoliac?

641

Ancient Zoliac?

642

00:46:25,000 --> 00:46:26,000

Yes, it is.

643

00:46:26,000 --> 00:46:28,000

It's founded on ancient Zoliac.

644

00:46:28,000 --> 00:46:32,000

Who constructed the ancient Zoliac, according to history?

645

00:46:32,000 --> 00:46:35,000

It was a bunch of sheep herders,

646

00:46:35,000 --> 00:46:39,000

living by night, watching the sheep, having nothing to do,

647

00:46:39,000 --> 00:46:42,000

they had no education, the schooling system was unknown in those days,

648

00:46:42,000 --> 00:46:44,000

and the way it is to date.

649

00:46:44,000 --> 00:46:50,000

But they observed the sky so well that they marked out its constellations, and so forth,

650

00:46:50,000 --> 00:46:55,000

and of course, anybody can make a mark like a circle in the cross, and name it,

651

00:46:55,000 --> 00:46:57,000

if they know what they're doing.

652

00:46:57,000 --> 00:47:01,000

Because I can take a child, three years old, put him in a sandpile, or a younger,

653

00:47:01,000 --> 00:47:05,000

he would too make all sorts of figures with his finger,

654

00:47:05,000 --> 00:47:09,000

and if he wanted to name them for symbology, for symbioticness,

655

00:47:09,000 --> 00:47:14,000

he could do it, and that's what these fellows done, that's the best they could do.

656

00:47:14,000 --> 00:47:19,000

Yet, at this date, you have not disproved them from your founded on them.

657

00:47:19,000 --> 00:47:23,000

Yet, in modern times, because you got so far ahead of the natural laws,

658

00:47:23,000 --> 00:47:26,000

you would condemn a man because he had no education,

659

00:47:26,000 --> 00:47:28,000

and it would be impossible for him to get something like that.

660

00:47:28,000 --> 00:47:30,000

Yet, on the first hand, you admit it.

661

00:47:30,000 --> 00:47:32,000

You were the genius.

662

00:47:32,000 --> 00:47:36,000

I said, let's get down, I said, to basis of some common sense,

663

00:47:36,000 --> 00:47:39,000

and work from a common sense angle, and we make it some more.

664

00:47:39,000 --> 00:47:40,000

I said, do them that.

665

00:47:40,000 --> 00:47:41,000

They say a word to that.

666

00:47:41,000 --> 00:47:43,000

And that's about the situation.

667

Just like I say, I really tell you to go through it,

668

00:47:46,000 --> 00:47:51,000

my heart is aching for a lot of the scientists in the United States that are good men,

669

good men, the heart and soul of the United States is then their being.

670

All right, and then the states.

671

00:47:59,000 --> 00:48:04,000

Okay, yet I tell you, we important foreign scientists,

672

give the right of their works, and they become ritual gods from God's science,

673

while our science are ignored.

674

00:48:12,000 --> 00:48:14,000

Yeah, let me ask you this question,

675

and I'll tell you a bunch of reports from San Francisco,

676

who built up the United States to the greatness that it is today,

677

00:48:21,000 --> 00:48:24,000

was our own men, our own fulfillment.

678

Indiepidance are outstanding that we were desires, truthful, forward going peoples,

679

00:48:30,000 --> 00:48:34,000

because we have gone beyond all the rest of the world.

680

Now if these foreign scientists are smart, why didn't they go beyond us?

681

00:48:38,000 --> 00:48:42,000

Then if I ignore our own, and they have been ignored.

682

Foreign names.

683

00:48:43,000 --> 00:48:46,000

Yeah, that's unfortunately the truth.

684

A foreign name in science seems to me an awful lot to a lot of people,

685

I don't exactly...

686

00:48:51,000 --> 00:48:56,000

I just like some wealthy lady who varies a baron or a baroness,

687

00:48:56,000 --> 00:48:58,000

there's something like that right away something else.

688

00:48:58,000 --> 00:49:02,000

You see, that's our unfortunate side, I think.

689

00:49:02,000 --> 00:49:08,000

I might say right here too, that as far as space platform is concerned,

690

00:49:08,000 --> 00:49:11,000

well, there's a man, I got the magazine someplace,

691

00:49:11,000 --> 00:49:15,000

I can give you his name, he's a scientist, German scientist,

692

00:49:15,000 --> 00:49:18,000

that works under von Braun and others,

693

00:49:18,000 --> 00:49:24,000

and when Kali's magazine published the first article on space platform,

694

00:49:24,000 --> 00:49:26,000

he didn't find it the second one.

695

00:49:26,000 --> 00:49:32,000

I read him both, I didn't like it, I don't like it today, because of this.

696

At that time, it cost four billion dollars, while later on this game too,

697

00:49:37,000 --> 00:49:41,000

we could build a spaceship with less money than that,

698

00:49:41,000 --> 00:49:44,000

and go to the real space platform, which would be the moon.

699

So this fellow was in debt,

700

00:49:46,000 --> 00:49:51,000

with the magazine, put his name on the front cover and all,

701

00:49:51,000 --> 00:49:55,000

to ask my opinion, so I hid it,

702

but I was to write my opinion to the Kali's magazine,

703

which I did, I have this script here,

704

and I give my reasons for not liking the idea of the space platform,

705

and so on and so forth, and explain it in various angles,

706

which is nothing but the truth in the center.

Well, they finally kept it for six months,

708

and the same back and I said that everything that's passed on the reference to space platform

is passed by this committee, von Braun and Walleley and others,

or Riddell and others.

Well, that's alright, but I told him in this script,

712

why build a space platform?

713

While we're building a space platform,

714

Russia could be building a ship,

715

00:50:35,000 --> 00:50:38,000

and as she's moving towards the moon,

716

00:50:38,000 --> 00:50:41,000

she could drop a small egg on us, and where are we?

717

00:50:41,000 --> 00:50:43,000

Well, she's at the moon,

718

00:50:43,000 --> 00:50:47,000

why not build a ship and go to the moon and get a real space platform?

719

00:50:47,000 --> 00:50:49,000

That's what I really told him,

720

00:50:49,000 --> 00:50:51,000

because I explained it in different angles,

721

00:50:51,000 --> 00:50:53,000

and so forth and so on,

722

00:50:53,000 --> 00:50:55,000

because that was a little bit too much truth,

723

00:50:55,000 --> 00:50:57,000

and we couldn't build a space ship for a lot less money.

724

00:50:57,000 --> 00:50:59,000

We have the means,

725

00:50:59,000 --> 00:51:01,000

we even have a sphere,

726

00:51:01,000 --> 00:51:04,000

could build a space ship without this excess power,

727

completed the circuit of electrical machine to the ground,

1034

You can get a hold of a hot wire here,

1036

if you're not grounded, right?

1037

And they can hold it.

1038

But brother, when you go to work,

1039

you can get a hold of it and complete the circuit. You're true.

1040

And that's what would have happened there.

1041

He's like turned on light and you stand in the bathroom.

1042

That's right.

1043

So you see, that was the reason that was down.

1044

And that from them, that was the reason.

1045

why do they shoot the ray at a person like that?

1048

He says, well, if they had not,

1049

the man would have been dead.

1050

They just frightened them enough away from there

1051

to save his own life.

1052

That's what happened there.

1053

And when you analyze it yourself,

1054

then you have to do some work yourself.

1055

We analyze yourself on the laws that we know.

1056

Well, I say, you don't think you could do so,

1057

save them because the machine is electrical.

1058

Let us stay in there. You have completed the circuit.

1059

I answer all of them because a lot of them

1069

1070

And I'd like to get more on some of them.

1071

I get mail from all types of scientists

1072

01:04:37,000 --> 01:04:39,000

and everything else.

1073

01:04:39,000 --> 01:04:41,000

So, really, I'm telling you.

1074

It's killing because it's costumists

1075

01:04:43,000 --> 01:04:45,000

on 100 to \$150 a month

1076

01:04:45,000 --> 01:04:47,000

for stamps and paper.

1077

01:04:47,000 --> 01:04:49,000

No, we don't.

1078

01:04:49,000 --> 01:04:51,000

We can't answer all of them.

1079

01:04:51,000 --> 01:04:53,000

We even got a form letter

1080

01:04:53,000 --> 01:04:55,000

that we sent out to kind of

1081

01:04:55,000 --> 01:04:57,000

satisfy some of them.

1082

01:04:57,000 --> 01:04:59,000

Still does more coming in.

1083

01:04:59,000 --> 01:05:01,000

How many different languages is your book commodity now?

1084

01:05:01,000 --> 01:05:03,000

It's now in about

1085

01:05:03,000 --> 01:05:05,000

eight or twelve.

1086

01:05:05,000 --> 01:05:07,000

I think it's about twelve now.

1087

01:05:07,000 --> 01:05:09,000

And it's still a contract for eight more.

1088

01:05:09,000 --> 01:05:11,000

I see.

1089

01:05:11,000 --> 01:05:13,000

That hasn't been published.

1090

01:05:13,000 --> 01:05:15,000

But there's not a spot in the world

1091

01:05:15,000 --> 01:05:17,000

that something hasn't been said about it.

1092

01:05:17,000 --> 01:05:19,000

You need a pro-acquan now.

1093

01:05:19,000 --> 01:05:21,000

I'd just like you to be hearing this.

1094

01:05:21,000 --> 01:05:23,000

So I'll give you the straight out.

1095

I went to Mexico.

1096

01:05:25,000 --> 01:05:27,000

I went on a visit there just for a rest.

1097

01:05:27,000 --> 01:05:29,000

And I'd never been there, so I thought I'd enjoy

1098

going to different places to see some wonderful things.

1099

They had a lot of wonderful things there.

1100

01:05:33,000 --> 01:05:35,000

Well, the first thing that happened was

1101

there's also a club down there that's been established

1102

by pretty wealthy people.

1103

Well, they said, would you give us

1104

01:05:41,000 --> 01:05:43,000

a conference, which is a lecture?

1105

01:05:43,000 --> 01:05:45,000

I helped us out a little bit.

1106

01:05:45,000 --> 01:05:47,000

I said, well, I'd be all right. I came here for

1107

01:05:47,000 --> 01:05:49,000

vacation, not to work.

1108

01:05:49,000 --> 01:05:51,000

And I said, I haven't even got that kind of permit.

1109

01:05:51,000 --> 01:05:53,000

I knew that you had to have a permit for it.

1110

01:05:53,000 --> 01:05:55,000

They said, we'll tend to that.

1111

01:05:55,000 --> 01:05:57,000

Citizens of Mexico.

1112

01:05:57,000 --> 01:05:59,000

So I said, okay, you see that

1113

01:05:59,000 --> 01:06:01,000

might permit everything for the lecture job

1114

01:06:01,000 --> 01:06:03,000

here? What the exact?

1115

01:06:03,000 --> 01:06:05,000

I said, you people are going to charge, aren't you?

1116

01:06:05,000 --> 01:06:07,000

Yes, we're going to charge to kind of get our club

1117

01:06:07,000 --> 01:06:09,000

a go. By peso, that's 40 cents.

1118

01:06:09,000 --> 01:06:11,000

I said, okay, when you get everything ready

1119

01:06:11,000 --> 01:06:13,000

and everything is okay, well, I'll give you a talk.

1120

01:06:13,000 --> 01:06:15,000

So I did.

1121

01:06:15,000 --> 01:06:17,000

First thing, the papers, there's a funny

1122

01:06:17,000 --> 01:06:19,000

setup in Mexico that way.

1123

01:06:19,000 --> 01:06:21,000

When a reporter comes to see, or

1124

01:06:21,000 --> 01:06:23,000

what he calls press conference,

1125

01:06:23,000 --> 01:06:25,000

you can give him all the drinks you want.

1126

01:06:25,000 --> 01:06:27,000

He can get a cockey drunk and eats and everything

1127

01:06:27,000 --> 01:06:29,000

else. He still wants 25 or 30

1128

01:06:29,000 --> 01:06:31,000

pesos on the side.

1129

01:06:31,000 --> 01:06:33,000

There's 70 of those reporters.

1130

01:06:33,000 --> 01:06:35,000

Well, that didn't happen.

1131

01:06:35,000 --> 01:06:37,000

So they were men in the first place.

1132

01:06:37,000 --> 01:06:39,000

So finally, the next day, which is on

1133

01:06:39,000 --> 01:06:41,000

a Tuesday, a winter worker says

1134

01:06:41,000 --> 01:06:43,000

that our lecture's without permit.

1135

01:06:43,000 --> 01:06:45,000

So then the paper down here, or the papers

1136

01:06:45,000 --> 01:06:47,000

were in the, against me there,

1137

01:06:47,000 --> 01:06:49,000

and the way they blasted it,

1138

01:06:49,000 --> 01:06:51,000

the whole thing, they said, I come to promote

1139

01:06:51,000 --> 01:06:53,000

my book, and I want to get a penny from that

1140

01:06:53,000 --> 01:06:55,000

book every time it sells.

1141

01:06:55,000 --> 01:06:57,000

Up there, the way the thing was written up

1142

01:06:57,000 --> 01:06:59,000

and the contracts were made.

1143

01:06:59,000 --> 01:07:01,000

So they don't want to promote that book.

1144

01:07:01,000 --> 01:07:03,000

So anyhow, that's what they said,

1145

01:07:03,000 --> 01:07:05,000

which was not true,

1146

01:07:05,000 --> 01:07:07,000

but they took that out as a kind of revenge.

1147

01:07:07,000 --> 01:07:09,000

But in spite of that,

1148

01:07:09,000 --> 01:07:11,000

the guy sold out all the books you couldn't buy

1149

01:07:11,000 --> 01:07:13,000

another one.

1150

01:07:13,000 --> 01:07:15,000

In spite of that, they were

1151

01:07:15,000 --> 01:07:17,000

pausing it, and in the meantime,

1152

01:07:17,000 --> 01:07:19,000

they were saying, well, they bought it,

1153

01:07:19,000 --> 01:07:21,000

and he sold out all the books you couldn't buy

1154

01:07:21,000 --> 01:07:23,000

another one, and they had to say, go neck,

1155

01:07:23,000 --> 01:07:25,000

they got a new edition.

1156

01:07:25,000 --> 01:07:27,000

So I showed them my papers and everything else,

1157

01:07:27,000 --> 01:07:29,000

and everything was all right,

1158

01:07:29,000 --> 01:07:31,000

and the American Council was

1159

01:07:31,000 --> 01:07:33,000

informed about it, and

1160

01:07:33,000 --> 01:07:35,000

they said, okay, so you're innocent,

1161

01:07:35,000 --> 01:07:37,000

and you're just

1162

01:07:37,000 --> 01:07:39,000

an innocent victim

1163

01:07:39,000 --> 01:07:41,000

due to the ignorance of our citizens.

1164

They thought they had everything clear, they didn't.

1165

01:07:43,000 --> 01:07:45,000

So they called in.

1166

01:07:45,000 --> 01:07:47,000

But they did say in the paper

1167

01:07:47,000 --> 01:07:49,000

that I paid 500 pesos,

1168

01:07:49,000 --> 01:07:51,000

fine, which is \$40,

1169

01:07:51,000 --> 01:07:53,000

which I didn't.

1170

01:07:53,000 --> 01:07:55,000

And they said, well, I'll take you on those papers

1171

01:07:55,000 --> 01:07:57,000

and we'll run, which I didn't.

1172

01:07:57,000 --> 01:07:59,000

There's nobody else that did.

1173

01:07:59,000 --> 01:08:01,000

Even those people that did make a mistake

1174

01:08:01,000 --> 01:08:03,000

because that part didn't pay.

1175

01:08:03,000 --> 01:08:05,000

On the following day, I was deported.

1176

01:08:05,000 --> 01:08:07,000

The next day, I was arrested

1177

01:08:07,000 --> 01:08:09,000

in jail.

1178

01:08:09,000 --> 01:08:11,000

Well, I was at a

1179

01:08:11,000 --> 01:08:13,000

Marriott Cristana hotel all the time,

1180

01:08:13,000 --> 01:08:15,000

and you should have seen the fun around there,

1181

01:08:15,000 --> 01:08:17,000

the fellow hops and everything.

1182

01:08:17,000 --> 01:08:19,000

I was like, you did this, nice jail, you're ready.

1183

01:08:19,000 --> 01:08:21,000

Oh, that kind of stuff, you can't even hang on tables.

1184

01:08:21,000 --> 01:08:23,000

The hardest one,

1185

01:08:23,000 --> 01:08:25,000

three reporters had left me at the airport

1186

01:08:25,000 --> 01:08:27,000

and talked to me

1187

01:08:27,000 --> 01:08:29,000

as I was leaving for Los Angeles

1188

01:08:29,000 --> 01:08:31,000

by now eating a dinner.

1189

01:08:31,000 --> 01:08:33,000

That was salient.

1190

01:08:33,000 --> 01:08:35,000

Here, I deliver a lecture

1191

01:08:35,000 --> 01:08:37,000

to all the government

1192

01:08:37,000 --> 01:08:39,000

big boys there

1193

01:08:39,000 --> 01:08:41,000

on a Tuesday in a cocktail party with it.

1194

01:08:41,000 --> 01:08:43,000

And then left Wednesday.

1195

01:08:43,000 --> 01:08:45,000

They had me put a set down

1196

01:08:45,000 --> 01:08:47,000

in Los Angeles eating a dinner.

1197

01:08:47,000 --> 01:08:49,000

So that's how far you can go

1198

01:08:49,000 --> 01:08:51,000

if you're a lot of the days.

1199

01:08:51,000 --> 01:08:53,000

Gai-shell Fisher, you'll never see anything like it.

1200

01:08:53,000 --> 01:08:55,000

But anyway,

1201

01:08:55,000 --> 01:08:57,000

when the government conference took place,

1202

01:08:57,000 --> 01:08:59,000

they had this health figure

1203

01:08:59,000 --> 01:09:01,000

which isn't the government.

1204

01:09:01,000 --> 01:09:03,000

It was probably shouldn't be for the government.

1205

01:09:03,000 --> 01:09:05,000

The government calls them in all of us, you see.

1206

01:09:05,000 --> 01:09:07,000

They're the only people that works with the government.

1207

01:09:07,000 --> 01:09:09,000

They were in that

1208

01:09:09,000 --> 01:09:11,000

and here we are.

1209

01:09:11,000 --> 01:09:13,000

I'm sitting among all these big boys

1210

01:09:13,000 --> 01:09:15,000

and all of that in the center

1211

01:09:15,000 --> 01:09:17,000

and the oldest

1212

01:09:17,000 --> 01:09:19,000

technical organization in the world

1213

01:09:19,000 --> 01:09:21,000

in all of that.

1214

01:09:21,000 --> 01:09:23,000

The pictures were taken about me and the whole works here.

1215

01:09:23,000 --> 01:09:25,000

All of that in us being a paper this Sunday

1216

01:09:25,000 --> 01:09:27,000

as it comes out weekly.

1217

01:09:27,000 --> 01:09:29,000

This Sunday or next Sunday, if they even get it ready

1218

01:09:29,000 --> 01:09:31,000

by this Sunday, then we'll be out next week.

1219

01:09:31,000 --> 01:09:33,000

You're going to send me some.

1220

01:09:33,000 --> 01:09:35,000

I'm wondering now, because that was a scoop for people.

1221

01:09:35,000 --> 01:09:37,000

What they call a scoop in this country.

1222

01:09:37,000 --> 01:09:39,000

We've been scooped for them anywhere there too.

1223

01:09:39,000 --> 01:09:41,000

But you see, because they misbehaved the government.

1224

They ignored them completely.

1225

When this little paper comes out with that stuff,

1226

the hollow is going to be there.

1227

And this is going to stick there next time.

1228

So I'm funny.

1229

01:09:51,000 --> 01:09:53,000

Oh, there are...

1230

01:09:53,000 --> 01:09:55,000

I know newspapers are

1231

01:09:55,000 --> 01:09:57,000

odd and foreign newspapers are

1232

01:09:57,000 --> 01:09:59,000

worse, I think.

1233

01:09:59,000 --> 01:10:01,000

Oh, well.

1234

01:10:01,000 --> 01:10:03,000

I asked some of the newspaper out to us,

1235

01:10:03,000 --> 01:10:05,000

what sort of a journalist school do you go to?

1236

Well, a journalist school.

1237

You learn all about journalism.

1238

I said, it must be pretty dog-gone bad,

1239

I asked some reporters down in San Francisco.

1246

Down there.

And, by the way, this gentleman,

1248

you might know of.

1250

thinking that he might come up there

1251

of the U.S.

1253

01:10:41,000 --> 01:10:43,000

Ordnance Department.

1254

And he says to me, he says,

1255

Joe, don't worry.

1256

01:10:47,000 --> 01:10:49,000

He says, we can support you in the point of blank outside,

1257

01:10:49,000 --> 01:10:51,000

but he says, I'll tell you what,

1258

01:10:51,000 --> 01:10:53,000

the Air Force and the Army is behind you.

1259

This fellow here may be in law.

1260

No.

1261

01:10:57,000 --> 01:10:59,000

No, I don't believe I know him.

1262

No, I know him.

1263

01:11:01,000 --> 01:11:03,000

Yeah, no, I know the San Francisco Ordnance District.

1264

I don't have none of them.

1265

Well, this is the man that can't.

1266

01:11:07,000 --> 01:11:09,000

And he's very nice.

1267

But anyhow, I said to the repotter,

1268

I said, no, look,

1269

who you working for? Russia or the United States?

1270

I says, and I says, your father,

1275

And he says, well, no, we don't.

1277

I said, the heck you don't.

1278

I says, you played that Russia,

1279

if you want to put a finger on a man,

1280

you can criticize him a lot.

1281

By the time he gets to the court, he's already condemned.

1282

The court can't do anything else but convict him.

1283

You do the same thing.

1284

You never should show the outside.

1285

What are you talking about?

1286

I said, who are you working for?

1287

01:11:49,000 --> 01:11:51,000

I got a little rookie.

1288

01:11:51,000 --> 01:11:53,000

Well, but that's the situation.

1289

01:11:53,000 --> 01:11:55,000

Where you going?

1290

01:11:55,000 --> 01:11:57,000

You know, and I got a new Russia,

1291

01:11:57,000 --> 01:11:59,000

some of the men that I met in Mexico.

1292

01:11:59,000 --> 01:12:01,000

Did she go with you down there?

1293

01:12:01,000 --> 01:12:03,000

It's really nice.

1294

01:12:03,000 --> 01:12:05,000

The weather is marvelous.

1295

01:12:05,000 --> 01:12:07,000

Of course, they're expecting green season now

1296

01:12:07,000 --> 01:12:09,000

in the next three months.

1297

01:12:09,000 --> 01:12:11,000

But it was beautiful.

1298

At night, you sleep with just one sheet.

1299

Beautiful, very even planning.

1300

I've been there before, but I really like it.

1301

Here's the gentlemen, some of them,

1302

I hear that you can read who they were,

1303

and here I've got some private cards.

1304

And I even got a pass to go.

1305

my Spanish is absolutely good.

1309

That's Navy and Army, and astronomy.

Air Force.

1312

Very interesting.

Here's some of the cards.

That's the fellow that was a translator for me

1315

01:12:45,000 --> 01:12:47,000

that you saw in the picture.

1316

The Federal man.

1317

And this is the pass, this fellow next to the president.

1318

01:12:51,000 --> 01:12:53,000

That's his pass, see.

1319

01:12:53,000 --> 01:12:55,000

I can take that card any place in Mexico,

1320

01:12:55,000 --> 01:12:57,000

go to any Federal building or any place.

1321

01:12:57,000 --> 01:12:59,000

They really treat you nice, don't you?

1322

01:12:59,000 --> 01:13:01,000

They all have a Federal stamp on their ass.

1323

01:13:01,000 --> 01:13:03,000

And even the private addresses, again, Army.

1324

No, I've met around a lot of nice people in this,

1325

01:13:05,000 --> 01:13:07,000

this fellow is a man.

1326

01:13:07,000 --> 01:13:09,000

That's a general decision in English.

1327

Yeah.

1328

01:13:11,000 --> 01:13:13,000

The other people that are responsible for the lecture

1329

that the rest of you was with, I see.

1330

They should have known better people in that position.

1331

But it really is a rather lot of things

1332

1333

had it not been a mistaken idea.

I have my suit cleaned and dressed

1392

and really wonderful job.

1393

Better than you get through here with 8 cents.

1394

One piece.

1395

Thing like that, you see.

1396

You can live there. You can take a couple of hundred dollars

1397

1398

very nicely and enjoy yourself.

See a lot of things.

1417

Engineering is pretty something.

1418

And then the next thing you go down to the restaurant.

1513

Little ways from the pyramids is this restaurant.

1514

And then the university.

What do they call it?

1516

1517

01:19:31,000 --> 01:19:33,000

And beautiful pictures.

1518

All this type of mosaic work.

1519

On the buildings, library and all of that.

1520

Oh, it's beautiful.

1521

The stadium is the largest in the world.

1522

That's where they had all the doings.

1523

The Pan-American track.

1524

Oh, yeah.

1525

01:19:47,000 --> 01:19:49,000

That's where they had it.

1526

01:19:49,000 --> 01:19:51,000

Yeah, all in there one day.

1527

01:19:51,000 --> 01:19:53,000

And it's the biggest stadium in the world.

1528

01:19:53,000 --> 01:19:55,000

Beautiful.

1529

01:19:55,000 --> 01:19:57,000

Most of that stuff is built of lava rock.

1530

01:19:57,000 --> 01:19:59,000

It's all lava rock.

1531

01:19:59,000 --> 01:20:01,000

So they really got the goods of the earth.

1532

01:20:01,000 --> 01:20:03,000

And they're really building up.

1533

01:20:03,000 --> 01:20:05,000

Very modern.

1534

01:20:05,000 --> 01:20:07,000

And very artistic.

1535

01:20:07,000 --> 01:20:09,000

They built so much art with it.

1536

01:20:09,000 --> 01:20:11,000

Art seems to be the predominant

1537

01:20:11,000 --> 01:20:13,000

in the buildings and all of that.

1538

01:20:13,000 --> 01:20:15,000

Really beautiful.

1539

01:20:15,000 --> 01:20:17,000

The people are very afraid as far as talking.

1540

01:20:17,000 --> 01:20:19,000

They're kind of suspicious in their way.

1541

01:20:19,000 --> 01:20:21,000

Because in Indian is the character that we're even through here.

1542

01:20:21,000 --> 01:20:23,000

He won't talk to the Linos.

1543

01:20:23,000 --> 01:20:25,000

Then when he opens up, he really talks to you.

1544

01:20:25,000 --> 01:20:27,000

He's your best friend.

1545

01:20:27,000 --> 01:20:29,000

He's been in the East for a couple years.

1546

01:20:29,000 --> 01:20:31,000

Yeah, well, it's about the same way you will find up there.

1547

01:20:31,000 --> 01:20:33,000

You get to go out in the outskirts there.

1548

01:20:33,000 --> 01:20:35,000

Now the government can't do nothing with those people at all.

1549

01:20:35,000 --> 01:20:37,000

There are a bunch of Indians

1550

01:20:37,000 --> 01:20:39,000

that are satisfied with one or all beans

1551

01:20:39,000 --> 01:20:41,000

and one or all corn and one or all this

1552

01:20:41,000 --> 01:20:43,000

for themselves and that's all.

1553

01:20:43,000 --> 01:20:45,000

And you look up on them, there's an awfully poor class of people.

1554

But they just don't want to be helped.

1555

Yeah, I understand.

1556

01:20:49,000 --> 01:20:51,000

The government would help with that.

1557

We'd like to develop because

1558

01:20:53,000 --> 01:20:55,000

Mexico is very low in its agriculture.

1559

01:20:55,000 --> 01:20:57,000

We'd like to develop there because

1560

01:20:57,000 --> 01:20:59,000

they're striving for that.

1561

01:20:59,000 --> 01:21:01,000

But the people won't do it.

1562

01:21:01,000 --> 01:21:03,000

There's 33 million people in there,

1563

01:21:03,000 --> 01:21:05,000

only about 7 million people that they're doing anything.

1564

01:21:05,000 --> 01:21:07,000

The rest of them are laying around doing nothing.

1565

01:21:07,000 --> 01:21:09,000

They just want to work.

1566

01:21:09,000 --> 01:21:11,000

But it's really what going in.

1567

01:21:11,000 --> 01:21:13,000

I'm telling you, the Mexico City is really beautiful.

1568

01:21:13,000 --> 01:21:15,000

Plus the other Acapulco now through there

1569

01:21:15,000 --> 01:21:17,000

is still more beautiful, but there are more

1570

01:21:17,000 --> 01:21:19,000

and less our actual resort.

1571

And you see those dog-gone walls.

1572

Walls, 14, 15, 20 feet high.

1573

Whole blocks in case they're...

1574

And some of them look kind of ugly.

1575

The guy you get behind those walls.

1576

01:21:29,000 --> 01:21:31,000

Beautiful homes and vegetation

1577

01:21:31,000 --> 01:21:33,000

that are on their mansion.

1578

01:21:33,000 --> 01:21:35,000

Well, I suppose we have everybody...

1579

01:21:35,000 --> 01:21:37,000

Most everybody talks English.

1580

01:21:37,000 --> 01:21:39,000

Yeah, he's trouble at all.

1581

01:21:39,000 --> 01:21:41,000

No trouble at all.

1582

01:21:41,000 --> 01:21:43,000

I don't understand a word in Spanish.

1583

01:21:43,000 --> 01:21:45,000

I can't say a word in Spanish.

1584

01:21:45,000 --> 01:21:47,000

They've got a long time.

1585

01:21:47,000 --> 01:21:49,000

Only places in the lecture and then I had a translator.

1586

01:21:49,000 --> 01:21:51,000

But otherwise, the guy shouldn't go any place.

1587

01:21:51,000 --> 01:21:53,000

Now, in the drugstore up there,

1588

01:21:53,000 --> 01:21:55,000

there was a chairman crying.

1589

01:21:55,000 --> 01:21:57,000

Old, very clean, slick up the date.

1590

Drugstore, I wanted some shaving cream.

1591

In some razor blades, I would run out of RA.

1592

I went in there and asked for it in the talking dish.

1593

Only one place I went in there and tried to get soap.

1594

And in that civic department store,

and the girls behind it,

1596

1597

1598

1600

1606

It does, no kidding.

1607

Because you have so little on yourself,

1608

01:22:33,000 --> 01:22:35,000

you know that, you're limited to.

1609

01:22:35,000 --> 01:22:37,000

Yet here you get so dog-gone much,

1610

01:22:37,000 --> 01:22:39,000

for every ten dollars that you cash in

1611

01:22:39,000 --> 01:22:41,000

of American money,

1612

01:22:41,000 --> 01:22:43,000

you got a hundred and twenty-four pesos.

1613

01:22:43,000 --> 01:22:45,000

You don't mind, you realize if there's a nice job for you,

1614

01:22:45,000 --> 01:22:47,000

and when you're necessarily getting five,

1615

01:22:47,000 --> 01:22:49,000

ten bucks,

1616

01:22:49,000 --> 01:22:51,000

their money,

1617

01:22:51,000 --> 01:22:53,000

it's only forty or eighty cents.

1618

01:22:53,000 --> 01:22:55,000

And it's nothing for us to drop a dollar

1619

01:22:55,000 --> 01:22:57,000

for a tip here,

1620

01:22:57,000 --> 01:22:59,000

so if you drop a dollar there,

1621

01:22:59,000 --> 01:23:01,000

it's really twelve dollars to them.

1622

01:23:01,000 --> 01:23:03,000

It gives you

1623

01:23:03,000 --> 01:23:05,000

a sort of a

1624

01:23:05,000 --> 01:23:07,000

a satisfactory feeling,

1625

01:23:07,000 --> 01:23:09,000

because they do appreciate their own

1626

01:23:09,000 --> 01:23:11,000

pay-posts.

1627

01:23:11,000 --> 01:23:13,000

And to you, of course, it doesn't mean much.

1628

01:23:13,000 --> 01:23:15,000

You're really not

1629

01:23:15,000 --> 01:23:17,000

going out and being a big shot,

1630

01:23:17,000 --> 01:23:19,000

you're more or less normal.

1631

01:23:19,000 --> 01:23:21,000

In the meantime, they think you're doing

1632

01:23:21,000 --> 01:23:23,000

a lot of favor because they can fill it.

1633

01:23:23,000 --> 01:23:25,000

Well, you go for all day,

1634

01:23:25,000 --> 01:23:27,000

and a taxi, a private taxi, that takes you out.

1635

There's a thousand taxis

1636

of Mexico City or more,

1637

01:23:31,000 --> 01:23:33,000

and they all own privately by individuals.

1638

You spend a whole day, they take you out

1639

01:23:35,000 --> 01:23:37,000

in the morning by nine o'clock,

1640

01:23:37,000 --> 01:23:39,000

by five, thirty, and six, they bring you back.

1641

Thirty pesos.

1642

01:23:41,000 --> 01:23:43,000

Well, I spent a year over in India during the war,

1643

01:23:43,000 --> 01:23:45,000

we all had our own private valets

1644
