155

Did they have zippers or buttons?

157

158

195

What's the thing?

213

Did you say before, Mr. Ademiske, about the population on Venus?

214

00:12:10,000 --> 00:12:15,000

Population? She's pretty heavily populated, but I don't know just what the number is.

215

00:12:15,000 --> 00:12:25,000

Mr. Keen would like to know if they have more houses on Venus than we have on Earth.

216

00:12:25,000 --> 00:12:29,000

Well, everybody seemed to have a dwelling place. Everybody.

217

00:12:29,000 --> 00:12:34,000

They don't bunch up as we do sometimes, and the odd part of it is while there is some buildings,

218

00:12:34,000 --> 00:12:39,000

while there is some buildings, what we call an apartments like, you know, beautifully structured,

219

00:12:39,000 --> 00:12:46,000

I got a stone up there that is very, very decorative, and they make a lot of those buildings of this particular stone.

220

00:12:46,000 --> 00:12:52,000

But most of them got individual dwelling places, see?

221

00:12:52,000 --> 00:12:57,000

And they got quite a bit of land with it where they can spread out, you know, not crowded.

222

00:12:57,000 --> 00:13:02,000

What is their form of transportation? Do they have cars, bikes, but those cars?

223

00:13:02,000 --> 00:13:10,000

Yes, they have, but the cars have no wheels. They ride on the magnetic, a magnetic print of the Earth, of the planet.

See, we have it too. There's a heavy magnetic print that they measured, there is one,

225

an instrument already above the Earth, you know, that if we once learned to do that in any way,

227

Are they on rails?

228

No, they don't go anywhere. She's like we're talking right now, for instance,

229

we're talking about having an instrument and an automobile that you paint the white line with surgery metallic things,

230

and you got a tape recorder and you set it, and she's driving while you keep looking around and so forth.

There's something along those lines, you see?

232

Well, you know, you can go on and on and on with Mr. Adamski.
