What are referring to the radio guidance, which is a very small portion of the total guidance system

of the Atlas?

In fact, I built the only instrument that Pressing Engineering ever made any money on.

Edmund B. Sawyer and Daniel W. Fry started Pressing Engineering.

We built Pressing Engineering for about the first two years that we developed instruments.

122

We were the only people in Pressing Engineering.

123

00:08:02,000 --> 00:08:05,000

When we began to sell these instruments to Convair,

124

00:08:05,000 --> 00:08:11,000

we built a fair-sized plant which still produces a little over a million dollars worth of such instruments every year.

125

How do you say we?

126

00:08:13,000 --> 00:08:15,000

Edmund B. Sawyer and myself.

127

00:08:15,000 --> 00:08:17,000

He is no longer the two of us.

128

The two of you, sir.

And at the time you were with it, it had what, about a dozen or two dozen employees?

130

At the time I left it, it had 135 employees.

It now has 85?

Yes, that's true. It's been going downhill ever since I left.

Where did you get your BA, Mr. Fry?

Well, how can you go to PhD if you don't have a BA and an M?

I have a... this is beyond my understanding.

The PhD, which was given to me, was given specifically as a recognition of the thesis, which is what a PhD requires.

143

But you cannot qualify for a PhD unless you have a BA and an M.A.

144

Yes, I have been through this, these arguments.

145

I have never known it before.

It is not a valid argument. It is the usual route through which sex a thing is achieved.

May we approach another thing?

Some of your associates told me that you had been quite interested in science fiction even before this incident is alleged to have occurred.

Yes, I had never sold pieces on the principle that this was a good place to be when they saw us or lands.

How many plots have you sold?

About 12.

And what is your present source of income? I don't mean to be personal, but are you a practicing electronics?

I do still sell some instruments. Yes, I have some papers in here, discussions in here, which relate to that.

175

There is one patent coming out of the patent office now. I have two more ready to go in.

I do have a laboratory at Merlin, Oregon, where I live, in which I still do some development aside from the development of land there.

177

I have never made a living or attempted to make a living by lecturing or writing books.

178

00:11:33,000 --> 00:11:40,000

Mr. Fry, does the Air Force believe your story about going up in this crap and hearing voices? Does NASA believe this?

179

I have no idea. I have no idea what the Air Force or NASA believes.

180

Don't you care with an incident like this? It seems to me you'd like the world to know about that.

And in fact, a number of other people who say that they have ridden with inclined saucers and talked to spacemen,

never do the spacemen say, do you know Dan Fry or do you know Joe Smith or John Jones that we've given a right to.

How do you account for this? Are each of them coming from a different planet, do you think?

There was a lecture given by a reasonably prominent biocanist about two years ago,

Because while I do carry a camera, unfortunately, recording equipment is really difficult to carry around on your shoulder.

Pre-pond, yes.

Because the pictures do have some interest to the people who see them.

They might not have any interest in the camera.

I understand that your son still works back at Creston Engineering. How long has it been since you've talked with him?
