

UFOs GET YOU BUZZING

OUR postbag was dominated by UFOs last week after our Page One story about the mysterious death of miner Zygmunt Adamski.

Polish-born Mr. Adamski was found dead with unexplained burns in the small Yorkshire town of Todmorden shortly after a remarkable claim that a UFO had been seen by a PC.

Extensive inquiries failed to uncover any reason for his death.

Dozens of readers picked up their pens — or phones — to point out an amazing coincidence about the story.

One of the most famous writers in the history of Ufology was a Polish-born American writer called George Adamski, who died of a heart attack in 1965.

The American Mr. Adamski claimed in his

book Flying Saucers Have Landed that he was taken aboard a spaceship and served refreshments by the crew.

Dozens of readers echoed the thoughts of Mr. Ernie Sears, of Portsmouth, Southampton, who wrote: "That these two should have the same surname is another of those strange 'coincidences' that UFO study abounds in."

Coincidence? An official

at the Polish Embassy in London said: "Adamski is a common name in Poland—not quite as common as Smith or Jones in England—but still widespread."
