

Hypnotized Woman Recalls Abductions by Space Aliens as a Child

I Took Part in Strange Celebration on a UFO

In 1950, selected children born in 1943 were abducted by UFOs, subjected to surgical procedures in which tissue samples were taken, then released with little or no recall of what happened. When they were 16, those same children were abducted a second time, and again tissue samples were taken. It was all part of an alien

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research project, the purpose of which remains a mystery. This is the startling contention of UFO expert Budd Hopkins who has investigated 19 abduction cases involving 37 people. One of these special people is Virginia

Horton (not her real name), a lawyer in a major corporation who prefers to remain anonymous because of her position. Under hypnosis by a psychologist, she gives a fascinating account of her second abduction in this second and final exclusive ENQUIRER installment from Hopkins' new book "Missing Time."

"Virginia, where are you? Virginia!"

The voices of Virginia Horton's parents had echoed through the French woods.

She'd been missing from a family picnic for at least half an hour. Her nose was bleeding and her

blouse spattered crimson when her parents finally found her.

It was June 1960. Virginia was 16.

It had been exactly 10 years earlier to the month, on her grandfather's farm in Canada, when she had emerged from a chicken house with blood on her leg and a mysterious incision that left a life-long scar on her calf.

In each instance, there was no pain — and no recollection of how the "injury" had occurred.

And on that cool spring afternoon in France, Virginia came running out of the woods bubbling over with enthusiasm about a beautiful deer she had seen.

She was totally unmindful of her bloody nose, completely unaware that it — like the scar she got while at her grandfather's farm — was the result of an abduction aboard a UFO.

The mystery had remained locked in her subconscious until 1979 when she had undergone a series of remarkable hypnotic sessions with New York psychologist Dr. Aphrodite Clamar.

In this transcript made from a tape recording of one of those sessions, Virginia relives her fantastic experience in France, when she had gone for a walk in the Alsatian woods:

"It was a day like today,

cool and fresh out. I'm walking through the woods.

"There is a very bright light. And there's a ship just like they have in the movies.

"There's so much light you can't really see clearly.

"And then I hear, almost like a whisper, 'Virginia . . . Virginia.'

"I recognized the call. It was like

somebody I knew, and I went over to it and I went inside.

"I don't remember whether I went upstairs or whether there was a lift. I think it was like a ramp and that I walked up it.

"No, it was like a conveyor-belt ramp.

"I stood on it and it lifted, and there was a celebration.

"It was as though they had finished a research project or whatever — there was an accomplishment that they were very proud of. Everybody on the ship was happy."

(Virginia never actually "sees" anyone. As in the first abduction, she senses their presence on a telepathic level and communicates in the same way.)

"And there was someone who became the deer later, like a younger person, more like my age, a sort of a female friend on the ship.

"I guess they wanted a sample of me to see how I was different. Because I told them I was grown up: 'When you saw me (on the farm) I was a child, and I have done as much growing as I am going to do.'

"And I guess they wanted to know how I was different. I think that they did take some blood from the inside of my nose.

"And they were trying to explain to me what they had accomplished, too. (Chuckles.)

"It seems as though they — I don't think they put it this way — but I think they succeeded into talking somebody into considering us as an endangered species (more chuckles), or something equivalent to that. Not endangered.

"No, I guess . . . umm . . . it was like a precious species . . ."

During this same extraordinary hypnotic session, Virginia spoke of the strange deer she had seen — a deer that talked and somehow, as Virginia indicated, was the embodiment of the female figure aboard the spacecraft.

In the chronology of events as they unfolded on that incredible afternoon, Virginia was returned to the woods after the abduction.

There was only the deer, and the

faraway voices of Virginia's parents calling for her.

Under hypnosis, Virginia related: "They were calling me. And the deer was looking at me and saying goodbye.

"The deer was saying goodbye telepathically to me . . . looking into my eyes.

"The deer. That pretty deer . . . I remember my parents had been calling me.

"And, yes, in fact, that is what the deer had said to me — 'Your parents are calling you.'

"It was as though the deer was a friend and I didn't want it to leave. And it said it had to go. 'Goodbye.' But it wasn't a final goodbye.

"It was more like an — 'I'll see you again.'"
