

Surprise: Little green men are greyish

Lawrence Fenwick's belief in unidentified flying objects took off when, he says, he clocked one outside his window travelling at 38,000 miles an hour last Nov. 16.

"I thought I saw a star — and then it started moving," said Mr. Fenwick, who added that he counted six long seconds before it was gone.

The 46-year-old Toronto resident, who has compiled data on more than 2,000 reported landings of unidentified flying objects, said he saw red, white and blue lights blinking on the object. But international regulations prohibit blue lights on aircraft, Mr. Fenwick said. "And I'm not color blind. I've

had my eyes tested."

Mr. Fenwick said that in one of the cases he has compiled, a UFO reportedly crashed in New Mexico. About six human-like bodies were found inside, he said, but they weren't little green men; they were greyish-white.

Mr. Fenwick's first experience with UFOs took place the same day and the same month as the one outside his window last year, but four years earlier.

"I saw an oblong-shaped object drifting over the trees toward Lawrence (Avenue) and Bathurst (Street)," said Mr. Fenwick, who, as a co-director of the Canadian UFO Research Institute, is attending an

international symposium on UFOs this weekend at Toronto's Westbury hotel.

Public skepticism about UFOs stems from a lack of knowledge, said Mr. Fenwick, who has been reading about the subject for 31 years.

Worse still, he says, government intelligence agencies in Canada and the United States are hiding information gathered from UFO sightings.

One of the most blatant government coverups dates back to 1947 — the reported crash of a 40-foot-wide flying saucer in Roswell, N. M., Mr. Fenwick said.

The object looked like "a crumpled dish pan" and the bodies inside were

4½ feet tall, had greyish-white skin, and four fingers instead of five, Mr. Fenwick said. Autopsies showed their heart and lungs were combined into one unit, as were their livers and kidneys. Their small intestines (six feet long) were empty because they don't eat.

"They don't talk; they communicate telepathically," Mr. Fenwick said, adding that the creatures are "at least a million years ahead of our intelligence levels" and come from a distant planetary system.

Mr. Fenwick said the data he has compiled are based on information from United States military intelligence agencies.
