

FLYING SAUCERS ARE MADE IN AMERICA

FLYING saucers originate on earth and are piloted by humans, not eerie creatures from outer space, claims an American physicist.

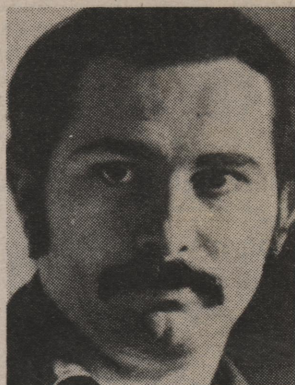
What's more, he insists they've been rolling off top secret assembly lines in the U.S., Russia, Britain and France for almost 40 years.

"There's nothing mysterious about UFOs," declares Warren York of El Paso, Texas. "The basic theory has been around 70 years.

"In fact, Germany launched the first saucers near the end of World War II. We called them 'foo fighters' or 'Kraut Meteors' when they appeared over Europe in 1945."

York, who is both an engineer and a pilot, says the entire history of flying saucers is contained in official documents and reports avail-

able from the American government under the Freedom of Information Act.

flying saucers," he says, was a young Romanian engineer named Henri Coanda.

Working independently, this brilliant young man discovered that liquid or gas flowing along an object tends to stick — which led him to the conclusion that bending a stream of air around a vehicle would actually lift and propel it.

"He also learned vehicles shaped like saucers worked best," York says. Coanda tried to interest a number of

countries, including the U.S., in his ideas in the early 1930s. Incredibly, the French built a working model — and then declared it had no practical value.

Coanda then took his plans to Germany in 1938, and development of the flying saucer became a priority with the Nazis.

York says they immediately established underground research centers in super-secret locations around the country. "And at the end of World War II," he adds, "the U.S., England,

France and Russia moved in and found a number of them.

"In fact, I'm told Russians surprised one unit and captured the crew. The complex was then moved to a location somewhere deep in Russia."

York says proof for his astonishing claim comes from FBI memo and CIA report 00-W-27452 — which he obtained legally under the Freedom of Information Act. What's more, he adds:

"The United States secret-

ly started to develop a Coanda-powered craft of its own right after the war.

"Now I'm convinced Russia and the U.S. have highly advanced versions of the flying saucers first built by the Nazis.

"In fact, our current model is far superior to the Space Shuttle.

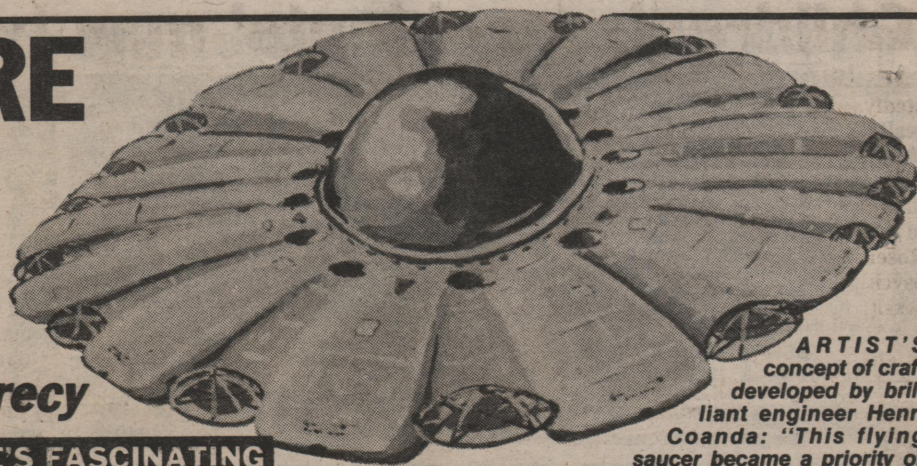
"It can operate in the Earth's atmosphere as well as achieve orbit."

The government is able to keep UFOs secret because components are ordered separately from many manufacturers and shipped via complicated routes to top secret assembly sites, York says.

But why not tell the world?

"The secret is not in the shape of the vehicles," he explains, "but in the advanced propulsion systems, which make the drive developed by Coanda and the Nazis look like a wind-up motor."

Pentagon sources contacted by GLOBE admit, the government is intensely interested in and actually working on development of saucer-shaped aircraft — but they steadfastly deny having knowledge of any experimentation based on the Coanda Effect.

Mystery of giant circles in the UFO capital of the world

A HUGE alien spaceship which apparently touched down near Warminster, England, has convinced experts that the little village is the "UFO capital of the world."

A giant 50-foot circle appeared overnight in a cornfield in the Warminster Triangle, a tiny group of old English villages where more than 400 sightings have occurred over the past two decades.

The circle was surrounded by four smaller circles as though a spaceship had landed. But no tracks or footprints were found.

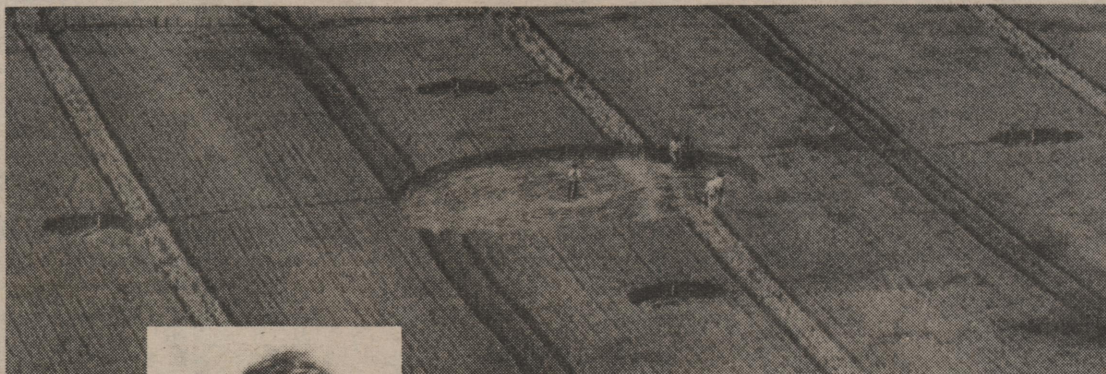
"It cannot be a hoax," says farmer Jack Woodall, who discovered the circles. "The rest of the corn in the field was standing straight, so no one could have got in there to create the circles."

The discovery marks the latest in a long series of eerie events in Warminster:

- In 1964, soldiers were awakened in the night by a crashing sound like thunder, followed by a loud humming noise and lights in the sky which did not fade for more than three hours.
- A year later, a flock of pigeons suddenly fell dead

from the sky over Warminster's main street. People who went to pick them up dropped the birds in horror when they discovered they were all mysteriously ice cold. Authorities examined the dead birds but could find no cause of death.

- Two years later, dead mice were found in a school playground with what looked like radiation burns on their bodies.
- Other dead mice were discovered with needle-like puncture marks in their skulls.
- In 1974, all the cats and dogs in Warminster ran cowering and whimpering under chairs and tables as bright green and red lights zigzagged overhead, then circled and flashed beams at

each other across the night sky.

- In 1979, a group of wives at a women's social evening screamed in terror when a brilliant white light suddenly shot in through a side window. Several witnesses were temporarily blinded.

Dozens of villagers claim

MYSTERIOUS circles in English field: "It cannot be a hoax"

to have seen spacecraft.

"I have seen a flying saucer hovering over my farmhouse at dawn," Woodall told GLOBE. "I called my wife, but before she got there, it shot upward at a tremendous speed.

"But this latest thing is more mysterious than anything else."

Farmer's son Francis Sheppard says: "If anyone on this earth is going to meet aliens from outer space, I'm sure it will be us."

Police Chief Bernard Jackson adds: "People around here are too sensible to make up these stories."

The British UFO Association has reported a total of 430 sightings in the triangle over the last 15 years.

Lord Clancarty, chairman of the UFO Investiga-

tion Group in the House of Lords, says: "I am certain from checking the photographs that a craft landed there.

"There are lines of electromagnetic energy which we believe guide alien craft like radar. Warminster is on one of these lines — and there are just too many incidents for it to be coincidence."

A Royal Air Force spokesman at a nearby base told GLOBE: "We all know about the Warminster triangle and some of the pilots are so superstitious they fly around it rather than through it.

"We have picked up the odd, mysterious objects on radar but they have always disappeared by the time we have got a plane up to have a look."
