IT was dusk when coalman Tom Schofield's day suddenly turned to terror . . . as two silver-suited aliens loomed up behind him.

He had just arrived home from work in the village of Crawshaw Booth — overlooking the eight-mile Rossendale Valley running between Burnley and Todmorden.

He told me: "I was closing the garage door when I saw something from the corner of my eye. I looked over my shoulder and they were there."

Tom, 48, leaned forward, his hands tightening their grip on a mug of tea.

"I can still see them clearly," he said. "There were two figures in silver suits—like the chrome of a car bumper, brilliantly polished and without a crease.

"I just kept looking at them. Then suddenly I realised they didn't have any features. They didn't have faces.

Probed

"Their heads seemed to be covered with helmets. "One of them turned towards me and I heard their clothing rustle.

"They were carrying something between them. It looked like a metal bar."

Tom looked away for just a second. When he turned back, the visitors had gone.

The case of the silver aliens is one of 32 hair-raising sightings from UFO Valley being probed by the Defence Ministry.

"Other people had seen things, too," said Tom, who joined friends in setting up a flying-saucer spotting group.

THE CASE of the Eerie Egghead.

He said: "There was a bright light in the sky between the branches.

Said Mark: "It was like a tall man. A shining black gown covered him from head to foot but the thing I most remember is his large forehead.

"We stood for only a second. The figure didn't move. It was blocking our path through the woods so we just turned and ran."

THE CASE of the UFO Hedgehopper.

Sandra Philips, 16, and her 12-year-old friend Tracey Brown were out in the meadows at Bacup leading their ponies back to their stable.

Suddenly a bright light appeared in the sky.

Said Sandra: "It came lower and I could see other lights — blue red and green. It was only about 30 ft above us.

"The horses were so frightened that they bolted to the stables.

"We ran after them. But the faster we ran the faster the lights came after us.

"I've never been so frightened. I shouted 'Come on, Tracey, run.'

Bacup tailor Mike Stacks was intrigued by talk of "things in the sky."
