

Soviets blow a friendly UFO out of the skies

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HORRIFIED expert says attack on alien starship was "a wanton act of murder."

The cruise-type missile that violated Finnish territory several weeks ago was actually a slick diversionary tactic that allowed Russia to carry out a secret mission in space — to incinerate a UFO with an orbiting nuclear satellite!

A Soviet submarine in the Berants Sea fired the vintage SN-3 rocket on a computer-guided course that deliberately took it over Norway and Finland to draw NATO's early warning radar tracking system on a wild goose chase, according to a top secret Pentagon report.

The devious ploy worked like a charm. NATO's radar tracking system homed in on

the missile as it went roaring through the arctic heavens on its evil mission.

With deep space left unwatched, a Soviet scientist pressed the button that then launched a nuclear rocket from a Star Wars-type satellite

the way around it," Anderson reported. "It was brightly lighted inside but had only three revolving red and orange lights on the outside.

"My vessel drifted in the water with the engines off while we watched it for about 10 minutes. Then it just shot into the sky like a comet. It didn't make a sound... it just vanished into space."

He said he and his crew could see the spaceship only a few yards away and they are certain they could see what appeared to be crewmen on board.

"It was shaped like a boomerang with large portholes all

orbiting the Earth. The target was a boomerang-shaped UFO that the world's scientists had been tracking for more than a year.

The UFO — sighted by dozens of arctic fishermen during its many low-altitude flights to Earth — was vaporized when the nuclear rocket scored a direct hit.

The Russians' sneaky mission of death probably would have gone undetected had the blast not been seen by French astronomers studying the recently discovered black hole in the Milky Way.

Although U.S., British and French government officials have not commented on the UFO kill, a dissident physicist at the Soviet Academy of Science in Moscow has confirmed that the vicious attack did take place.

"It was a totally unwarranted and unprovoked act of aggression against what appeared to be a non-threatening starship from some distant planet," the scientist declared. "I am horrified to know that my country could carry out such a hateful deed.

"Destroying that space craft is no different than a child with a new BB gun shooting helpless birds just to test the killing power of his weapon.

"Scientists throughout the world had been observing the starship for months and believed it to be here on a friendly mission.

"It wasn't a very large craft, but we were convinced that it was manned by some form of alien beings.

"Attacking that ship was a wanton act of murder."

During 1984, the starship had made 68 low-level flights in the Barents Sea coastal areas of Sweden, Norway, Finland and Russia.

The most recent came only 10 days before it was blasted into oblivion.

Fishing boat skipper Karl Anderson said he raced his craft directly toward the craft as it hovered only inches above the sea.
