



UFO crashes into army plane

Two servicemen were killed and at least 35 more were injured when an army transport plane crashed after a midair collision with a UFO!

The spectacular accident south of an air force base in Tanela, Peru, occurred on November 28 but was not confirmed until December 6, said newspapers.

Gen. Jorge Revoredo told reporters that the deadly encounter with the starship was unavoidable.

The 65-foot black and silver ship "appeared out of nowhere," he added, and clipped the tail fin off a DC-9 transport seconds after it took to the air.

"The plane broke up but didn't catch fire and that's why so many survived," said Gen. Revoredo, who heads a military task force investigating the encounter.

"There was no evidence of damage to the UFO whatsoever," he continued. "After it grazed the plane it stopped in midair, hovered for a few seconds and then disappeared over the horizon."

came on the heels of a reported UFO blitz over Peru, Uruguay and Colombia. Eerily, the Peruvian incident occurred in broad daylight and was witnessed by 150

transport passengers and air base personnel.

But the mysterious starship didn't even show up on military radar.

"The ship apparently had

some kind of masking device that made it invisible to our electronics," said Gen. Revoredo.

"But eyewitness descriptions of the ship matched those of dozens of reports that have been coming to us since September. There is no question that UFO activity is picking up.

"Even stranger, all the ships appear to be similar and might even belong to the same fleet."

Gen. Revoredo refused to identify the servicemen who were killed and injured in the September crash.

He did say that visual surveillance of Peruvian air bases and military installations has been stepped up "to

prevent a similar tragic occurrence" in the future.

"Our investigation will continue," he added. "We'd certainly like to have some answers."

Investigators from Brazil, Colombia and Argentina have been asked to help in the probe.
