

Lid off the secret UFO world

**Above Top Secret by Timothy Good
(Sidgwick and Jackson £16.95)**

SOMETHING strange is going on in the skies and no-one is quite sure what it is.

Strange craft — and sometimes their humanoid pilots — have been seen by thousands of people worldwide, claims author Timothy Good in his book *Above Top Secret*.

But for some reason, the governments of the world are united on one thing: the public must not be told — officially — that UFOs exist.

Above Top Secret relates to the importance officialdom gives to the subject; UFOs are classified higher on the American secrecy scale

than the hydrogen bomb.

But Good — who is also a professional violinist — has been picking away at this scab on the flanks of authority with some determination.

He has collared scores of utterly believable witnesses and like-minded souls — some of whom have a lot to lose — who back up his claims.

The forward of the book, for example, is by Lord Hill-Norton, chief of defence staff from 1971-73.

He has also managed to lay his hands on countless classified documents and first-hand accounts of UFO sightings. Jitter this massive 590-page tome.

Sad to say, however, that he has overdone it. Case after convincing case begin to numb the reader's sense of amazement.

A big book, and an expensive one at £16.95; it would have been more readable — and would have reached a far wider audience — if it were a



little more modest in size. — HW.
