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FLYING SAUCERS' MYSTERY

Mystery objects have been spotted in the skies over Guernsey by a holidaymaker.

Mr. Graham Tell, of Small Heath, Birmingham was walking with his wife Edith when (he claims, he saw a cluster of four spinning objects off the islands west coast.

The couple say they watched them for "a good five minutes" and described them as silvery and spinning like flying saucers.

Mr. Tell said they hovered for more than a minute, climbed higher and changed formation before making off northwards at a high speed.

Earlier this week, Mr. Bernard Dorey, of Castel, Guernsey, said he and his wife had watched a UFO hovering in the sky for almost a minute.

They described it as a black ball with a bright orange tail which increased in brightness and length as the object suddenly began to climb away at high speed.

Mr. John Renfrey of St. Peter Port, said that on Wednesday night he saw one bright object which was accompanied by five smaller ones.

Soviet viewers in TV 'close encounter'

MILLIONS of Soviet viewers last night saw for themselves the space aliens that created a cosmic sensation with their purported landing in the Russian town of Voronezh. But they saw it through the eyes of a child.

The Soviet nightly news programme "Vremya" showed a drawing by a child who claimed to have witnessed the landing of a glowing two-legged sphere containing a smiling stick figure.

The news report from Voronezh also showed the spot on the ground where, according to the government's official news agency Tass, an unearthly

craft had touched down amid the yellow-leaved birch trees in a city park.

Tass made a worldwide splash on Monday with its report on towering, pin-headed aliens who emerged from a spaceship that landed in Voronezh, 300 miles south east of Moscow.

Since then, scientists have disparaged the report and attributed it to rising sensationalism in the Soviet press under glasnost.

The Vremya report, although more skeptical in tone than Tass, offered without comment an interview with a purported witness to the "close encounter

— schoolboy Vasya Surin.

"We were scared," said Vasya, who appeared to be about 11-years-old. "The craft hovered over this tree. Then the door opened and a tall person of about three meters looked out.

"He didn't have a head, or shoulders either. He just had a kind of hump. There he had three eyes, two on each side and one in the middle."

The Vremya report concluded with a list of the many factors that detracted from the credibility of the sighting including the fact that no adult witnesses could be found, even though a large block of flats overlooked the area.

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
