

# THE 'BEST FLYING SAUCER YET'

A PHOTOGRAPH of a flying saucer, claimed to be the most authentic so far, has been taken by two young women, one the granddaughter of the first Earl Jellicoe.

They saw the object while motoring in West Waterford, Eire, on Boxing Day.

Miss Jacqueline Wingfield, who is an official of the Victoria and Albert Museum, London, said: "It was like a large silver bullet, with a bright plume behind it.

"It seemed to be moving quite slowly. What struck me most was that it made no noise.

"My friend, Miss Mortens n and I watched it for about a minute. She just had time to

get her camera out to take a snap."

Later Miss Wingfield handed the roll of film to Mr. Charles H. Gibbs-Smith, the aviation historian.

Mr. Gibbs-Smith said: "I have seen scores of saucer photographs, but this is the first in which I can guarantee the integrity of everybody concerned.

"I don't see how the object could have been a meteorite or fireball. These things don't travel horizontally.

"I don't see what else it could have been but some kind of interplanetary flying machine."

To account for the silence Mr. Gibbs-Smith said that the "saucer" might have been powered by some kind of anti-gravity motor not understood by scientists.
