

LIGHTS IN YORKSHIRE SKY, TOO

SIR.—IN a recent issue, a reader, Mr. David Marlowe, of Hayes, appeals for witnesses of an unusual orange-coloured light seen over Northolt on July 26 and in March of this year.

I thought he might be interested in the following item that appeared in the current news-letter (just to hand) of a research association to which I belong.

At 8.30 p.m. on March 28 at Conisborough, in Yorkshire, four people saw a slowly moving bright "throbbing" orange light in the sky which was considered to be so unusual that one witness photographed it.

To their surprise the resulting print contained three objects, each shaped like an inverted saucer with a dome on top, silhouetted against the light. None of the witnesses had seen the objects—only the light.

An attempt was made to evaluate the Conisborough photograph; using one frame of reference the objects were estimated to be of a vast size and using another to be microscopical.

If the light seen in Yorkshire on March 28 was seen at the same time at Northolt, then it can be fairly assumed that it was standing a long way out from earth and the three objects must have been of colossal proportions.
