The astonishing results of a survey done at Indiana University reveal that a staggering 81 percent of students and faculty questioned believe in life on other worlds — and an incredible 15.2 percent say they've actually sighted a UFO.

And these findings reflect the beliefs of the entire U.S. population within a 5.5 percent margin of error, according to the computerized study.

"The survey means that people are starting to realize that we aren't as unique as we always thought we were — that there is more to this universe than just us and we may not be alone," declared student Barry Klein who conducted the study.

The 20-year-old biology major surveyed a random sampling of 343 people.

Surprisingly, when he tabulated the results by age and sex, he found that the percentage of believers in extra-terrestrial life was about the same for both sexes and for those over and under 21 years of age.

Age and sex didn't make a significant difference on the question about UFO sightings, either.

"This leads me to believe these sightings are real," said Klein. "You would expect either the young or the old, or either male or female, to have more sightings if this was a matter

"These things are more likely to be real because there is no specific segment of the population either believing in or seeing them."

Incredibly, Klein also found that those who said they had sighted UFOs gave remarkably similar details.

"The UFOs sighted were typically oval or cigar-shaped and made no sound at all," he said. "They carried red, orange or green lights, and sometimes these lights were flashing.

"They all mentioned that the UFOs

were capable of making 90-degree turns in flight, which no conventional aircraft can make."

Dr. Hollis Johnson, professor of astronomy and former head of the university's astrophysics program, carefully checked Klein's work.

"With a variation of 5.5 percent, one way or the other, this study would be applicable to the general popula-
