Many thanks for the very interesting material. I spent several hours with Archie Jarmon, who wrote that totally distorted review of THE AIRMEN WHO WOULD NOT DIE, and I found him to be a mirror image of Martin Gardner. Both are prime candidates for the 32-floor drop test I've devised.

At least Gardner has nice things to say about Elizabeth's proverbs. (He quotes two: "No one religion has a corner on God; He owns the whole block." And: "Step down an inch to help a friend and raise yourself a foot.")

I think he should have taken to heart a couple of others that came to her through automatic writing:

Men of few words should be.

Stand behind your convictions but next to your opinions.

He who believes himself to be well-educated has learned little.

Incidentally, I'm enclosing a copy of Liz's POOR ELIZABETH'S ALMANAC which tells the story of how she got over 100 proverbs at 10,000 feet in ^{at} tent in the Himalayas. No matter what you think, I think you'll enjoy the way she writes the story--and the proverbs themselves. She's never written a proverb before or since. Searches by the entire Reader's Digest research staff and several professors of English indicate they've never appeared before --and yet they are as pithy and witty as Franklin's. The Franklin Institute in Philadelphia was amazed. Liz has tried writing more proverbs consciously, and can't come up with a single one.
