In addition to communicating directly with others who share their specific interests, VIE correspondents receive (and are encouraged to contribute short articles to) a free newsletter, published irregularly and distributed only to VIE correspondents.

Please note: research and information-sharing are the sole purposes of the VIE. It neither requires nor prohibits any occult beliefs or practices on the part of its correspondents, and it is not a dating service.

At present, participation in the VIE is free. To join, answer the following questions on a separate sheet(s) of paper and mail to Dorothy Nixon, Box 6459, Rochester, NY 14627. Please enclose a stamped, self-addressed legal-size envelope (or an International Reply Coupon if outside the United States).

1. In what aspect(s) of the subject of vampirism are you especially interested?
2. Is there any particular kind of information you are seeking, or are there any specific questions that you would like, if possible, to be answered by other VIE correspondents?
3. What relevant books have you read? Please list as many as you can remember, especially non-fiction.
4. To what, if any, other sources of information (magazine subscriptions, membership in organizations, contacts with researchers, etc.) do you have access?
5. Briefly describe any original research you have done on vampirism and related matters. (You will not be disqualified from participating in the VIE on account of not having done original research.)
6. Comment briefly (no more than 3 pages) on at least one of the following: (a) some original thoughts you may have on a particular aspect of vampirism; (b) your reasons for being interested in the subject; or (c) some book you have read, movie you have seen, etc.
7. Do you give the co-ordinator permission to relay your answers to this questionnaire, especially questions 5 and 6, to other VIE correspondents?
8. Do you give the co-ordinator permission to reveal your mailing address to other VIE correspondents? (Note: the VIE does not sell its mailing list to advertisers, etc.)
9. If your answer to either 7 or 8 is no or qualified, please explain.
