Report of U.F.O. Sighting  
Nanoose Bay, B.C. 95-01-05

This report is submitted to your office as per our operational policy guide lines following sightings of unidentified flying objects.

Please be advised that our detachment received a complaint from the above captioned individual. He [REDACTED] saw an unidentified object in the sky over the Errington, B.C. area on 95-01-05, then again the next night, 95-01-06. Both sightings were consistent as far as position and description are concerned.

The object was seen from the [REDACTED] home at [REDACTED], Nanoose Bay, B.C., [REDACTED]. The object was stationary and remained visible for several minutes.

The object was described by the [REDACTED] as a blue disc, the colour of blue such as the sky takes on during a hot summer's day. There were several small red discs along the bottom edge of the blue disc. There were lights along the top of the disc. A bright, beam of light was seen moving along an equatorial axis on the main blue body of the object. There was no sound emitted from the object.

The [REDACTED] drove around the Nanoose area in search of a better description for the position of the object after having believed at first that it was over Craig Bay in the Nanoose Bay area - they then verified that it was over the Errington area. The object could be seen with the naked eye; however, colour could only be determined with the aid of binoculars.

The sky on the two nights was very clear and the air calm and cold, approx. -4 C. The [REDACTED] appear to be very reasonable and well spoken people, both

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
