Stated he is most able in his field and is respected by all, since he has experienced the problems connected with operating a university from all levels between professor to President. People who work with him hold him in highest esteem. Enjoys high standing in community. Neighborhood favorable. All persons recommended him for position of trust with the Government. On May 3, 1960, Mrs. [REDACTED] Personnel Records, Penn State University, State College, Pa., advised their records reflected ERIC A. She advised Mr. WALKER is considered to be a person of the finest character. His ability in his field appears unquestioned. He is highly regarded at the University and has the ability to foster understanding and encourage enthusiasm amongst the faculty and student body. She advised more detailed information regarding his activities since 1945 would best be obtained through contact with [REDACTED] President ERIC A. WALKER.

On May 3, 1960, [REDACTED] to the President of Penn State University, advised he has been acquainted with ERIC A. WALKER since 1945. He recalled Mr. WALKER came to Penn State University with the Ordnance Research Laboratory, where he was the Director from 1945 to 1952. He was appointed Dean of Electrical Engineering in 1945. His relationship with Dr. WALKER grew on a more personal basis starting in 1949 and extending to the present. He recalled during the period 1949 - 1956 they frequently met at meetings of the Council of Administration since Doctor WALKER was head of the Electrical Engineering Department, and he, Mr. [REDACTED] was [REDACTED] Student Affairs. He was Dean of the School of Engineering 1951 - 1956. For a short period in 1956 he was appointed Vice-president of Penn State University and became President on October 1, 1956.

He advised Doctor WALKER is married to [REDACTED]. He resides with his wife and their two children [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] at the President's house which is located on the campus. He said Doctor WALKER's parents are ARTHUR and VIOLET WALKER, address unknown, Elyria, Ohio. He has two brothers ALLEN WALKER, 45, 318 Harvard Street, Elyria, Ohio, and [REDACTED] coming to Penn State University Doctor WALKER has gained great stature and respect in the community. His contributions to both local and federal governments include serving on the borough council of State College and participation in various government projects, which include the Ordnance Research Laboratory of Penn State University where Doctor WALKER served as Director from 1945 to 1951, during World War II when he served on the Committee on Underseas Warfare; more recently, when he was appointed by President EISENHOWER to be a member of the Board of Visitors U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md. In 1948 he

received the Presidential Certificate of Merit and in 1958 he received the Distinguished Public Service Award from the U. S. Navy. He is presently President of the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities and is President-elect of the American Society for Engineering Education.

Doctor WALKER was born April 29, 1910, at Long Beach, England. He entered the United States on September 10, 1923, and became a naturalized U. S. citizen on September 27, 1937. He is a graduate of Harvard University. He was employed by Tufts University in 1934, and he remained there in different capacities until 1940, when he departed to become Dean of Electrical Engineering at the University of Connecticut. From 1943 to 1945 he worked for the Underwater Sound Laboratory. In 1945 he came to Penn State College, which became Penn State University in 1954. Since 1945 his positions at Penn State University included Director of the Ordnance Research Laboratory, Dean of Electrical Engineering, Dean of Engineering, Vice-president, and finally President on October 1, 1956, when he succeeded MILTON EISENHOWER. A few months after becoming President, he and his family moved into the President's house which is located on the Campus of Penn State University.

Doctor WALKER has always exhibited the highest type of character traits. He is extremely active, athletic, and is the type who is able to maintain a rigorous schedule with seemingly little effort. His hobbies include tennis, squash, golf, horseback riding. More recently he has since becoming President of Penn State University, acquired a pilot's license and enjoys flying very much.

He has in the past demonstrated his loyalty to the United States and has done nothing which would reflect otherwise. He is a most competent man who has performed assignments for the government in the past successfully. He is honest, straightforward, and completely trustworthy. He recommended him for any position of trust with the government.

He advised his closest personal acquaintances include [REDACTED] Engineering and Architecture, and Penn State University.

On May 4, 1960, [REDACTED] for Academic Affairs, advised he has known Doctor WALKER for six years. He

considered him to be a person with the highest type of character. He has never heard anyone utter anything that could be construed derogatory against Dr. WALKER. He is most able in his field and is respected by all since he has experienced the problems connected with operating a university from all levels between professor to president. People who work for him hold him in the highest esteem. He had no reason to doubt his loyalty to the United States and would recommend him for a position of trust with the Government. He has always enjoyed a high standing in the community where he has served on the Borough of State College Council, which is an elective office, before he became President in 1956. He recalled he led a charity drive for the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte, Pa. There could be no doubt as to his ability, since he has completed successfully many jobs for the Government.

On May 4, 1960, [REDACTED] of Engineering and Architecture, advised he has known Dr. WALKER for fifteen years. He recalled Dr. WALKER came to the University as the Director of the Ordnance Research Laboratory and Dean of the Electrical Engineering School. He said he was a person of the finest character, who is honest and fair in all his dealings. He had risen from the ranks of a professor to that of a University President and in so doing gained enough experience at various levels to meet and understand problems encountered there. He is highly respected by those under him. His loyalty to the United States is unquestioned. He is one of the most able men in his field. He would recommend him for any position of trust in the Government. His association with Dr. WALKER included participation in squash and tennis matches over the years. He has found Dr. WALKER exemplifies the highest standards of sportsmanship. He had no doubt that Dr. WALKER would perform any task given by the Government to him in the most efficient and thorough manner.

It is to be noted Dr. ERIC A. WALKER moved into the President's house located on the campus of Penn State University a few months after becoming President on October 1, 1956.

Vicinity of 777 West Park Street

On May 4, 1960, [redacted] Assistant Professor, School of Journalism, [redacted] advised he has resided there only since September 1959, and was not acquainted with Dr. WALKER when he lived at 777 West Park Avenue, State College, Pa. For that reason, he was unable to furnish any information of value regarding him other than to state he is most respected and admired among the faculty.

On May 4, 1960, Mr. [redacted] recalled Dr. WALKER resided at 777 West Park Avenue, with his wife JOSEPHINE and their two children, [redacted] and [redacted] for a two or three year period preceding his moving to the campus of Penn State University in the early part of 1957. He considered him to be a person of fine character who possessed a keen mind. He recalled Dr. WALKER was on the Borough Council during the time he knew him and credited him with being responsible for seeing the road on West Park Avenue was properly paved. When he spoke at council meetings, he usually had something to say which was well thought out. He appeared to be a person of good habits and one who enjoyed the finest of reputations. He did not doubt his loyalty to the United States. His ability in the field of education is well known. He would recommend him for a position of trust and confidence in the Government.

On May 4, 1960, Mr. [redacted] Avenue, has been acquainted with Dr. WALKER as a former neighbor and fellow worker at Penn State University for [redacted]. He believed Dr. WALKER moved into the house he built next to his about 1954-1955 and lived there about three years. Dr. WALKER had built his home and did regret moving from it. He found him to be an excellent neighbor. His ability is well established for he has excellent mind which has enabled him to move quickly to the top of his profession. He found Dr. WALKER to be dynamic and well liked by the faculty. His reputation in the neighborhood was excellent. He believes him to be loyal to the United States beyond a doubt. He had always been active in the community and had been elected to Borough offices in the past before he became President. He possesses great energy and stamina which has helped him become the success he is. He would recommend him for a position of trust with the Government.



On May 3, 1960, [REDACTED] the President of Penn State University, advised he has been acquainted with ERIC A. WALKER since 1945. He recalled Mr. WALKER came to Penn State University with the Ordnance Research Laboratory, where he was the Director from 1945 to 1952. He was appointed Dean of Electrical Engineering in 1945. His relationship with Dr. WALKER grew on a more personal basis starting in 1949 and extending to the present. He recalled during the period 1949 - 1956 they frequently met at meetings of the Council of Administration since Doctor WALKER was head of the Electrical Engineering Department, and he, Mr. [REDACTED] was [REDACTED] Student Affairs. He said Doctor WALKER's parents are ARTHUR and VIOLET WALKER, address unknown, Elyria, Ohio. He has two brothers ALLEN WALKER, 45, 318 Harvard Street, Elyria, Ohio, and [REDACTED] coming to Penn State University Doctor WALKER has gained great stature and respect in the community. His contributions to both local and federal governments include serving on the borough council of State College and participation in various government projects, which include the Ordnance Research Laboratory of Penn State University where Doctor WALKER served as Director from 1945 to 1951, during World War II when he served on the Committee on Underseas Warfare; more recently, when he was appointed by President EISENHOWER to be a member of the Board of Visitors U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md. In 1948 he

A few months after becoming President, he and his family moved into the President's house which is located on the Campus of Penn State University.

Doctor WALKER has always exhibited the highest type of character traits. He is extremely active, athletic, and is the type who is able to maintain a rigorous schedule with seemingly little effort. His hobbies include tennis, squash, golf, horseback riding. More recently he has since becoming President of Penn State University, acquired a pilot's license and enjoys flying very much.

He has in the past demonstrated his loyalty to the United States and has done nothing which would reflect otherwise. He is a most competent man who has performed assignments for the government in the past successfully. He is honest, straightforward, and completely trustworthy. He recommended him for any position of trust with the government.
