but had no further information concerning this matter. During their association WALKER gave no indication that he would be other than loyal to the United States, and [REDACTED] stated he considered him entirely loyal and reliable. He advised he further considers WALKER of excellent character and reputation.

Mr. [REDACTED] advised that he recalls that shortly after the establishment of the Florida Testing Laboratory, which was under WALKER's supervision, there was some talk among the employees that WALKER was "quite a ladies man" but that he, [REDACTED] did not know of any occasion, nor had he ever heard that WALKER "got out of line" in this regard. He stated WALKER appreciated attractive female employees under his supervision, made no secret of his appreciation of this factor, but did not allow this to interfere with his selection of highly competent secretarial and clerical employees.

Mr. [REDACTED] stated that to the best of his knowledge WALKER maintained excellent associates.

Mrs. [REDACTED] stated that she has resided in the Washington, D. C. area since 1945 and has not seen the applicant since then although he has telephoned her on two or three occasions when he was visiting in Washington, D. C. Mrs. [REDACTED] stated that she knew the applicant socially to some extent. She explained that she attended office social functions and laboratory dances that were also attended by the applicant, and that she had been in his home on numerous occasions. She said that she was also socially acquainted with the applicant's wife and his daughter.

Mrs. [REDACTED] stated that in her opinion the applicant was a man of good moral character who maintained respectable associates. She stated that she had never heard or noted anything that would have reflected upon his morals or integrity. She remarked that the applicant enjoyed an excellent reputation among his fellow workers and professional associates, and that she has never doubted his patriotism or complete loyalty to the United States. Mrs. [REDACTED] stated she would recommend the applicant for a position of security responsibility.

[REDACTED] Ordnance Research Laboratory, Key West, Fla., interviewed at State College, Pa., and advised he had known WALKER since [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] Gave favorable comment regarding WALKER's character, associates, reputation, ability, integrity and loyalty to U. S. [REDACTED] highly recommended WALKER for position of trust and confidence. Related that NELSON BUTZ, an employee of laboratory at Fort Lauderdale, Fla., committed suicide after receiving letter from girl in State College, Pa., in about 1945. [REDACTED] advised that efforts had been made to withhold information regarding suicide from parents and girl friend of BUTZ.

[REDACTED] Ordnance Research Laboratory, Key West Florida, advised he had known WALKER since [REDACTED] when they were both employed by the Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory. [REDACTED] stated that WALKER had been Assistant Director of the Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory at the time he began his employment in [REDACTED] and stated that WALKER became Director of the Ordnance Research

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Laboratory when the main office was moved to State College, Pa., in September 1945. He added that he had [REDACTED] WALKER's [REDACTED] since [REDACTED]; however, he had never worked with him personally for more than a few weeks at any one time. He added that during the entire time he had worked for the laboratory he had been stationed in Florida and that his contacts with WALKER had been limited to the times he would see him on visits to Florida or when he, himself, would travel to State College.

[REDACTED] stated that, from what he knew of WALKER, he considered him a reliable person in every respect and a man capable of doing outstanding work in his field. He further stated that he knew of nothing unfavorable regarding the appointee's moral character and that he had never heard rumors that might be termed unfavorable. He stated that WALKER was the type of person who would be friendly with his secretaries and might joke with them in a personal way; however, he did not feel there had ever been anything dishonorable in his relations with any of the female employees.

[REDACTED] continued that WALKER was completely loyal to the United States and that his reputation as an administration and scientist were above reproach. He added that the WALKER family enjoyed an excellent reputation and that all of their associates were honorable and respected people. He stated that he would recommend the appointee for a position of trust and confidence.

[REDACTED] related that NELSON BUTZ, an employee of the laboratory at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, had committed suicide in about 1945, and that he and WALKER had made efforts to keep the facts of the suicide from BUTZ's family and a girl friend in State College. [REDACTED] stated that BUTZ had received a letter from a girl in State College which seemed to upset him in that she had broken off a tentative engagement with him. He stated that BUTZ had taken a number of drinks during the afternoon and evening of the day the letter was received and seemed depressed. On the following morning, [REDACTED] went to investigate as to why BUTZ had not reported to work, at which time he found him dead in his kitchen. He stated that the death was contributed to an overdose of sleeping pills and to gas asphyxiation and was declared suicide by the coroner. He further advised that the facts of the suicide were discussed with WALKER and it was decided that the suicide information would be withheld from the BUTZ family and the girl friend. [REDACTED] added that he knew of no other way in which WALKER could have been connected with the suicide.

[REDACTED] explained that he personally was the [REDACTED] of the Research and Development Board from [REDACTED] during which time WALKER was a consultant and a member of one of the panels of the Electronic Committee. [REDACTED] revealed that he had not known WALKER previously but had met him for the first time at the Research and Development Board. He described WALKER as a completely sound and very sensible individual who is very discreet, particularly concerning matters wherein security is involved. He disclosed that he saw little of

WALKER socially except on a few occasions in Washington, D.C. at receptions and other functions. He related that WALKER ultimately succeeded him as [REDACTED] of the Research and Development Board, which he described as a position of great responsibility.

[REDACTED] disclosed that WALKER has a positive personality and is quite "hard-headed", which character traits sometimes "rub his subordinates the wrong way." He added, however, that WALKER had a good personality and was considered "quite a kidder". He revealed that WALKER is well regarded in scientific circles, particularly in his own field of electrical engineering.

[REDACTED] stated that he never had any reason to question WALKER's moral character or his loyalty to the country. He added that WALKER's associates, for the most part, were fellow scientists of high repute. He declared that insofar as his own personal knowledge was concerned, he would regard WALKER as a good security risk.

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SYNOPSIS OF FACTS: Washington Field Office Confidential Informant [REDACTED] advised *b7c* that WALKER is an unscrupulous individual who would do anything to get ahead. The informant related rumor that WALKER had affair with one [REDACTED] who later left her job to have an abortion. WFO [REDACTED] also states WALKER took several folders of phonograph records which belonged to NELSON BUTZ after the latter committed suicide. WFO [REDACTED] and WFO [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] made complaint that appointee "chased her around the desk." Philadelphia Confidential Informant [REDACTED] states that she has often heard rumors that WALKER "liked the women," although informant had no specific knowledge as to any affair appointee may have had with any woman. PH [REDACTED] advised that WALKER has reputation as a "ladies' man" but did not feel sufficiently acquainted with him to comment further. PH [REDACTED] states that that informant heard many stories of WALKER which suggested that he was some what of a philanderer, but that the informant did not believe such rumors. WFO [REDACTED] WFO [REDACTED] WFO [REDACTED] and PH [REDACTED] also state that WALKER is loyal American who enjoys good reputation in community and feel that he could be trusted in a position of importance.

Washington Field Office Confidential Informant [redacted] of unknown reliability who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that the informant had been closely associated with the appointee several years ago at State College, Pa. WFO [redacted] stated that the appointee is an unscrupulous individual who has often made the remark that he would "do anything to get ahead." According to the informant, he possesses no moral character, is untrustworthy, and deceitful. WFO [redacted] stated that WALKER is an atheist which may give some cause to his way of living.

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The informant related that the appointee came to the Ordnance Research Laboratory at State College from the Harvard Underwater Sound Lab in 1945. WFO [redacted] recalled that a girl by the name of [redacted] who was from Boston originally, also came to State College to be his [redacted]. It is WFO [redacted] understanding that she had previously worked for WALKER in Massachusetts. After she came to State College, it was rumored and generally known at the Lab that the appointee was having an "affair" with [redacted] and then after several months, [redacted] returned to Boston. The informant said that it was rumored that she became pregnant and returned to Boston to have an abortion. After [redacted] left, WFO [redacted] recalls that WALKER became interested in one of the girls in the Ordnance Research Laboratory. WFO [redacted] stated that she believed this girl was from Harrisburg and was married to one of the students at the time but who has since been separated. WFO [redacted] did not know of the extent of the relationship but it was the informant's belief that it was not encouraged by the girl.

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The informant also related an incident concerning [redacted] and her fiance, NELSON BUTZ. It appears that they were both assigned to work at the Ordnance Lab in State College until NELSON was transferred to the Ordnance Lab in Florida. After a period of time had elapsed, [redacted] decided to break the engagement and so advised BUTZ by letter. As a result, BUTZ committed suicide. This fact was made known to the informant through information given to WFO [redacted] by one [redacted] Laboratory in Florida. While NELSON BUTZ was in State College, he had assembled a collection of phonograph records and did not have them sent to Florida when he was transferred. Upon hearing news of the death of NELSON BUTZ, the appointee gathered up all these records

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and the informant stated it appeared he converted them to his own use. This was highly scornful says WFO [redacted] since the appointee did this action several days before members of the BUTZ family arrived to take home his belongings. WFO [redacted] said that she was not sure whether anyone else would have knowledge of this incident.

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WFO [redacted] described WALKER to be a person who is not nearly as intelligent as the men who surround him. WFO [redacted] mentioned that it would not be right for a person of his ilk to receive a position of trust over more deserving and better qualified people.

At State College, Pa.

Washington Field Office Confidential Informant [redacted] a prominent person who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that Washington Field Office Confidential Informant [redacted] had informed him of the fact that [redacted] in the appointee's office, had complained to him that WALKER had made advances toward her and that WALKER had chased her around the desk on one occasion. He stated that it had been decided that [redacted] and that nothing had been brought to the attention of the office since that time that would indicate subsequent advances by the appointee.

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WFO [redacted] stated that he had known WALKER since about [redacted] and that he respected his judgement and ability. He added that the incident mentioned above was the only thing that had been brought to his attention that might be unfavorable regarding WALKER. WFO [redacted] continued that WALKER seemed to have outstanding ability to get along with people and had been highly regarded as an administrator and scientist at the University. WFO [redacted] added that there was no question as to the appointee's loyalty to the United States, his reputation in the community, or the reputation of his associates. He further stated that he would not hesitate in recommending WALKER for a position of high trust and confidence.

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Washington Field Office Confidential Informant [redacted] a prominent person who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that he had been acquainted

with WALKER as a fellow employee at the Pennsylvania State University since [redacted] and had worked closely with him on several projects. He stated that in the spring of [redacted] to WALKER, came to his office and complained that WALKER had been making improper advances toward her and had chased her around the desk in the office. WFO [redacted] stated that he brought the matter to the attention of his direct superior and it was decided that [redacted]

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[redacted] she would not come into personal contact with the appointee. WFO [redacted] stated that the incident had not been known to persons outside his office and that no further action had been taken. WFO [redacted] also advised that there had been no additional incidents involving the appointee which had come to the attention of that office and that the matter had been a closed issue since 1949.

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WFO [redacted] further stated that the above mentioned incident was the only thing unfavorable regarding the appointee that had ever been brought to his attention and that WALKER was highly regarded by officials of the University. He continued that the appointee had above average ability, was completely loyal to the United States and that his associates general reputation on the campus were above reproach. WFO [redacted] also stated that he would recommend WALKER for a position of trust and confidence.

Washington Confidential Informant [redacted] a prominent individual who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that he had known WALKER since [redacted] when he first came to State College [redacted] of the Ordnance Research Laboratory. He stated that he recalled that WALKER had been a difficult person to get along with during the first few years he was on the campus and often had difficulty with members of his clerical force. He stated that he has since become well acquainted with WALKER and had grown to respect his ability and judgment as an administrator. He added that for a period he had questioned the appointee's moral character because of some of the difficulty that he seemed to have with other employees, however, he has since changed his mind and would recommend WALKER highly at the present time.

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WFO [redacted] continued that [redacted] had been [redacted] from [redacted] and that she had left her position in order to be [redacted]

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with her husband in the service. He said that when Mrs. [redacted] returned to the campus, her position had been filled and that he had no position for her in his office. In the latter part of [redacted] or the early part of [redacted] Mrs. [redacted] went to work for the appointee as [redacted] where she was employed for about six months. WFO [redacted] stated that Mrs. [redacted] had never been too friendly with the appointee and that there had been a definite personality conflict between them. He stated that she often talked with him about the appointee and things that she disliked about him, however, he could not recall anything that she had said that would reflect unfavorably regarding his character, loyalty, associates, or reputation.

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WFO [redacted] also advised that on one occasion an O.N.I. agent had mentioned to him that WALKER was a difficult person to deal with in that he had agreed to do a project a certain way and later had written to the Navy Department in Washington, D. C. requesting action be taken that would be much different than that agreed to with the O.N.I. investigator. WFO [redacted] added that he did not recall any of the particulars regarding the information he received from the O.N.I. investigator, however, he did recall that there had been some misunderstanding with WALKER.

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WFO [redacted] continued that his opinion of WALKER had greatly improved in the past few years and that he considered him reliable in every respect at the present time. He stated that WALKER was extremely brilliant as an administrator and scientist, and that his ability was widely recognized. He added that WALKER was loyal to the United States, had a good reputation in State College, Pa., and that his associates were all above reproach. WFO [redacted] added that he would recommend WALKER for a position of trust and confidence.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant [redacted] who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that the informant had been employed as [redacted] by the Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory from [redacted] to the early part of [redacted] when she was transferred to the Florida Testing Laboratory, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, where she remained until [redacted]. She stated in [redacted] that she was transferred to the Ordnance Research Laboratory, State College, Pa., where she worked as [redacted] until she resigned in [redacted]. She stated that her work at

Harvard and at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, had not been under the direct supervision of the appointee and that she had been [REDACTED] the Florida Testing Station during the period she spent in Florida. She added that from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] she had been the appointee's [REDACTED] at the Ordnance Research Laboratory, State College, Pa.

PH [REDACTED] further advised that during the time she was employed in Florida, she [REDACTED] 32 employees and that she had often overheard rumors that WALKER "liked the women." She added that she did not recall any particular rumor and that she only recalled the fact that there had been talk among the male employees indicating that WALKER had interest in other women. She stated that during the time she had known WALKER from [REDACTED] and from the time she had been his [REDACTED] she had never been aware of any affair that the appointee had with any of the laboratory or other women. She further advised that WALKER was the type of person who often joked in a personal way with the girls in the office, however, she did not believe any of the girls had ever been offended or had taken any of his remarks seriously.

PH [REDACTED] further advised that [REDACTED] had worked in the same office with her from [REDACTED] and that she and WALKER had never been friendly. She stated that there was a definite personality conflict between the appointee and [REDACTED] and that there had been numerous misunderstandings and arguments between them. She added that she did not know the reason that [REDACTED] left but she had heard that there had been another conflict and that [REDACTED] had resigned. PH [REDACTED] stated that she had been on vacation at the time [REDACTED] left.

PH [REDACTED] further stated that the appointee was very capable as an administrator and scientist and that she felt that he was worthy of a position of high trust and responsibility. She added that she believed WALKER was a "ruthless person" in that he intended to reach his goals in spite of any obstacle that he might meet. She added that she recalled one statement made by WALKER which had always seemed in character with his ruthlessness where he had said, "I going to get to the top and no one is going to stop me."

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PH [redacted] further advised that she greatly admired the appointee as an executive and felt that his attitude toward other employees and the individual person had changed in the last few years and his present attitude and methods are far better than those of his past. She stated that WALKER was completely loyal to the United States, enjoyed an excellent reputation in State College, Pa., and that his associates are all reputable. She concluded that WALKER was ambitious and possessed above average ability, and was the type of person who could be trusted to do an excellent job in a position of importance.

[redacted] Ordnance Research Laboratory, advised that he had been acquainted with the appointee since the early [redacted] when he, WALKER, was employed at the Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory. He stated that he became closely associated with WALKER in [redacted] when he was hired by WALKER as [redacted] of the Laboratory. [redacted] stated that during the time he has been employed at the Laboratory, he had not had reason to question the appointee's moral character, and stated that he knew of nothing unfavorable regarding his reputation. He stated that WALKER was one of the top officials on the campus of Pennsylvania State University, and that his judgment and executive ability was highly regarded by his associates. He added that WALKER was completely loyal to the United States and that his integrity was above reproach. [redacted] continued that he would not hesitate in recommending WALKER for any position of trust and confidence.

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At Lewistown, Pa.

Mrs. [redacted] advised that she had been WALKER's [redacted]. She stated that from [redacted], she had worked for the appointee in Washington, D. C. while he was on leave of absence from the University and was doing work for the Defense Department. Mrs. [redacted] stated that she had high respect for WALKER as an individual and as an administrator, and stated that she knew of nothing unfavorable regarding his character, loyalty, associates, or reputation. She stated that she had never heard anything about the appointee that might be considered derogatory and said that he was highly regarded by his associates at the University. She continued that she would recommend the appointee for a position of trust and confidence.

At State College, Pa.

[redacted] advised that he had known WALKER since [redacted] when they were both employed at the Harvard Underwater Sound Laboratory and that he had worked closely with him from [redacted] stated that he was leaving the Ordnance Research Laboratory to take work in Boston. [redacted] stated that during the [redacted] he had known WALKER, he had grown to respect his ability and judgment and considered him a brilliant man in his field. He gave favorable comment regarding the appointee's character, loyalty, associates, and reputation, and stated that he knew of nothing unfavorable regarding him. He added that he recalled rumors to the effect that WALKER had been interested in other women, however, he had never seen any evidence to verify the rumors and that he personally did not believe them to be true. [redacted] refused to comment as to the exact nature of the rumors or other persons involved because he did not feel there was any trust in them and could not remember the exact details.

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[redacted] continued that WALKER was well regarded by the officials of the University and was the type of person who could be trusted to do an excellent job in a position of trust and confidence.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant [redacted] a businessman who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that he had no direct knowledge of any misconduct on the part of WALKER involving women at Penn State College, but that he had heard rumor and gossip which indicated that WALKER was not altogether discreet in his relationships with women.

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PH [redacted] stated that WALKER was [redacted] suggested that for complete details the writer should contact PH [redacted] from whom PH [redacted] PH [redacted] advised [redacted] and WALKER would stay at the Lab until late in the evening after the other employees had gone home. He stated that [redacted] told him that [redacted] worked late at the Lab to finish up [redacted] work, however, he strongly felt that WALKER had taken an interest in [redacted] and requested that [redacted] remain at the Lab with him. He said that he felt that his feelings were somewhat justified in that WALKER had a reputation of being a "ladies' man" and when he questioned [redacted] concerning [redacted] apparent

relationship with WALKER [REDACTED] and the appointee. PH [REDACTED] stated that he has no first hand knowledge that WALKER [REDACTED] but that he suspects it in view of WALKER's general reputation. PH [REDACTED] advised in conclusion that he was not well acquainted with WALKER and since he had no direct knowledge of any misconduct on the part of WALKER, he did not feel that he was qualified to comment on his moral character.

Philadelphia Confidential Informant [REDACTED] of unknown reliability and who will not furnish a signed statement or appear before a loyalty hearing board, advised in August 1954, that she was employed at the Ordnance Research Laboratory, Penn State University, from [REDACTED] until [REDACTED] during which period she became very well acquainted with ERIC WALKER. She said that during this period she heard many stories about WALKER which suggested that appointee was somewhat of a philanderer, but that she did not believe such rumors. PH [REDACTED] stated that WALKER and she often worked in the laboratory at night together, which fact may have given rise to gossip concerning their relationship.

PH [REDACTED] stated that "WALKER took more of an interest in her than he should have, however, she did not have an affair with him." She advised that [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] with WALKER because of the fact [REDACTED]

She mentioned that at the [REDACTED] however, it was her opinion that her "long hours at the Lab" was not the only cause of their difficulty. She did not feel that her relationship with WALKER was the sole problem [REDACTED] advised that if WALKER had any affect [REDACTED]. She stated that she never went out socially with the appointee and that WALKER always acted in a gentlemanly manner. She advised that she has not seen the appointee since she moved from State College, and heard from him only on one occasion when he wrote to her and offered to help her find a job in Washington, D. C.

PH [REDACTED] stated that she believed appointee to be of a good character, unquestioned loyalty and good reputation, with the exception of the above mentioned rumors, and said that she would recommend WALKER for a position of trust and confidence. She added that appointee was a person who would never let his personal life interfere with his work, and that at times it appeared that he placed his work above the interest of his family.

This is to advise as to the reasons why the investigation of the individual listed below has taken more than three weeks to complete.

The above investigation was received on 8/3/54 by letter dated 8/2/54 from Mr. George J. Gould, Director of Security, Office of the Secretary of Defense. Walker is a Consultant to the Assistant Secretary for Research and Development, Office of the Secretary of Defense.

This investigation has involved 17 offices to date. Late during the inquiries it was ascertained that there were numerous allegations to the effect that the appointee caused his former secretary to become pregnant which resulted in an abortion. There have been other allegations to the effect that he was immoral and additional investigation has been necessary to resolve the charges made.

The investigation is being closely supervised and the outstanding leads are expected to be covered and reported on by Friday, August 27. It is to be noted that the appointee is presently employed in the position for which he is being considered and, consequently, there is no urgency in getting this individual confirmed. However, the case is being closely supervised and a summary will be prepared upon receipt of the outstanding report.

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[REDACTED] stated that, with the exception of the information contained in her signed statement, she had no other information which would cause her to question WALKER's character, reputation, associations, or loyalty. In volunteering information concerning his ability, [REDACTED] commented that she considered him a near-genius in his field. She said she knew nothing concerning WALKER's activities away from the Ordnance Research Laboratory where she was employed. [REDACTED] said she resigned from her position at the Laboratory at the request of WALKER, and that she has no knowledge of the reason reflected in their records for her departure.

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It is noted that when interviewed, [REDACTED] advised that she has no objection to having information furnished by her utilized in connection with ERIC ARTHUR WALKER.
