





This afternoon I placed a second call to Beverly Gleason to her home in Easton, Maryland. We spoke for about 15-minutes and I asked if she could recall for certain if Esquire Magazine was the first to print her story about Richard Nixon showing comedian Jackie Gleason, her late husband, alien bodies after a golf game while at Homestead Air Force Base in Florida.

Beverly said that she is certain that it was Esquire Magazine that first printed the story, and went on to describe how the article was the front page cover story of Esquire, carrying a picture of Jackie and some text regarding UFOs. She also said that the reporter who did the story still works there, and she could only recall his first name perhaps being "Ben."

She said that in the years after the Esquire report, other publications picked up the story - some of them she thought, directly from Esquire.

Going back to the Gleason/Nixon meetings for golf in Florida, she couldn't remember any specific date they met but said that her relationship with Jackie Gleason was good during that time frame. She said that she had even met with President Nixon herself, meeting him near a pool and having a drink with him.

She said that later, at the time of the Esquire article, her relationship with Jackie was not good.

"I'll be honest with you, about the time the article appeared Jack and I were breaking up," she said. "And when he saw the Esquire article that just finished everything."

I asked her about the reports she had planned to write a book and whether or not she ever prepared a manuscript. She said that she did not have any written manuscript at

any time and nothing otherwise prepared. There is nothing she had ever prepared in writing, she said, to document this first-hand.

"At the time Jack came home after his meeting with The President, he was so giddy and excited about seeing these little men," she said, "but in the years afterward I began to ask myself if any of this could really be true or if he was just telling me that... perhaps having been 'out' with someone?"

I asked her if she could recall any of his words, a more complete description of the 'little men' or any information such as where they came from or crashed, and Beverly laughed and reminded me of how many years ago this was. She then answered by saying: "you would be best off to find that Esquire article, that probably contains my closest recollection of anything he said."

I told Beverly that in addition to doing research, I also was involved in writing and producing television documentaries. I asked her if she would feel comfortable going 'on camera' with this story and said that it would be tremendous to preserve her comments and experience on videotape. She said that she was not interested in going on television and thought the story concerning the 'little men' should be authenticated first. I said that the only real 'authentication' would come if the government announced having the bodies and she said "I guess you're right, but I guess I just don't want to go on camera with this."

I thanked her for talking with me and she again suggested I find the Esquire magazine article.

INTERVIEW with BEVERLY GLEASON

This morning I spoke by telephone with Beverly Gleason McKittrick, an ex-wife of the late comedian Jackie Gleason. I explained to her that I was interested in the progress of her book and if she could talk about Jackie Gleason's claim of seeing alien bodies at Homestead Air Force Base in Florida.

She said that the book never came out as she had 'stopped writing' of it. She said she was 'glad to get out of it' as Jackie Gleason did not seem pleased with her quoting him on the aliens in Florida. She said that there was not much additional to tell as the whole story regarding Jackie Gleason and the aliens, as far as she knew, had already been printed anyway.

"Esquire Magazine interviewed me after our separation," she said, "and I talked about how Jackie told me about seeing dead aliens in Florida. I think it was sometime in '74 when this happened. When I said that it was because he told me."

"After the interview was published, Jackie was upset about the story being public. He called and said he didn't appreciate me giving the interview, and that's when I started to wonder if the story was 'iffy.'

"The reason I became 'iffy' about it is because I wondered if it was really true, I mean... I believed it the whole time. I bought the story hook, line and sinker. But if it was true, then why did he get so upset about it?"

Beverly went on to explain how Jackie came to tell her of his experience.

"Jackie had been out very late one night I did not know who he was with," She said. "He told me where he was that same evening, he said he had been in South

Florida with President Nixon to see some dead aliens there and I believed him, he was very convincing.

"He and Nixon were in contact quite a bit and I'm not sure how that was arranged, but it seems that their meetings were set up by an associate of Nixon's. After he got back, he was very pleased he had an opportunity to see the dead little men in cases, he explained to me what they looked like and he was still talking about it the next day."

Beverly explained that during her interview with Esquire Magazine, she made the statement about Gleason's claim to see dead aliens and afterward things between her and Jackie turned sour.

"We were on the verge of divorce, but everything was okay until it came out in Esquire," she said.

She informed that Gleason never did deny the story

Regarding her announced intention to write a book, Beverly again said that she abandoned the project due in large part to Gleason's objection to her comments about him seeing the aliens.

"I just made that one statement about the UFOs and it appeared in Esquire and I guess a few other places and he didn't like that and I thought, I just can't go through with this. Let him live his life. So I never wrote the book."

I thanked Beverly for talking with me and asked if it would be okay for me to call her back later if I had more questions, she agreed. That concluded our conversation.

Anyway, I decided to try to call the national call-in show to ask about well-founded rumors that Gleason had literally owned one of the largest UFO-related library collections in the world. I did get through and asked, but to my amazement the author claimed not even to be familiar with any books or interest in UFOs on Gleason's part. Some biographer!!!

Back in the 1950s or maybe early sixties, NICAP publicly thanked Gleason for his support of NICAP as a member in the pages of its UFO Investigator. I'm sure that was a stunning surprise to many NICAP members, if not to others, who didn't have a clue about JG's interest in such topics.


Tuesday and Wednesday will be professional/celebrity/amateur play that is expected to attract a large group of paying spectators and raise interest in the championship portion of the tournament.

Some of Jackie's TV shows were spotty in their success. After *The Honeymooners*, he had a live half-hour series on Fridays that featured Buddy Hackett. It was yanked from the screen in midseason. In 1961 he was host of a game show, *You're in the Picture*. It was so bad that Jackie canceled it himself after its debut and went on the air to apologize to the audience for "that bomb," Gordo and I at his side!

Nobody knew the ups and downs of show business better than Jackie. He'd been at it since the age of thirteen after winning an amateur-night contest. He was in vaudeville and carnivals and had worked in nightclubs and on Broadway. In 1940, Hollywood beckoned when Warner Bros. signed him for small character roles. What the movies failed to discover in Jackie Gleason, television found in abundance, an amazingly versatile comedic talent and acting ability which, ironically, took him back to Hollywood in the 1960s for major roles in film dramas as a pool shark in *The Hustler*, a prizefight manager in *Requiem for a Heavyweight*, and an army sergeant in *Soldier in the Rain*.

"When I first went to Hollywood, I made two hundred dollars a week," Jackie recalled, "and I had more fun there than I did in my entire life. It's a whole different climate now. Segregated as hell. There are five-hundred-dollar-a-week actors, and they hang out together. Then there are the thousand-dollar ones, the two-thousand, the five-thousand. And they all hang out with their own. It's so boring. It stinks."

I first met Jackie in 1954 when I was pregnant with Bruce. He was doing his popular Saturday night variety show at the CBS Theater at Broadway and 54th Street, since renamed in honor of Ed Sullivan, whose shows also came from there. Jackie liked the studio because it was only a few blocks from the hotel where he had his offices at 58th Street and Sixth Avenue. Then called the Park Sheraton, the hotel had a notorious moment in 1957 when gangland boss Albert Anastasia was assassinated in a hail of bullets while having a haircut in the barber shop, a scene somewhat replicated in *The Godfather*.

If Jackie especially liked a male guest on the show, he invited him to his extravagant home in Peekskill, a manly, woodsy, and remote spot up the Hudson from New York. Accordingly, when Gordon was booked onto the show, he was asked to go up. Telling me about it on the phone, Gordon became very excited. "Guess what?" he said. "Jackie is going to let you join us."

The tone of it put me off. "Let" me join them? "Who is this guy

Gleason?" I said to myself. Is he a royal personage? Then I understood what was happening. Jackie had intended a compliment. He was allowing me into his all-male bastion.

"Jackie's sending a limo to pick you up," Gordon continued, "and then you'll pick us up at Toots Shor's."

I waited in the car outside for an hour, knowing exactly what was going on inside, the "guys" crowded at the bar, each with another story to tell and then one to top that, lots of yarns about "broads" while Toots kept the liquor flowing. When, at last, Gordon and Jackie piled into the back of the limousine, Jackie leaned toward me and said, "Gordon tells me that you're a great believer in spiritual stuff and that you used it to save his life once. Something about the Ninety-first Psalm? He wasn't too clear about it, so I want to hear it from you. Tell me everything."

Embarrassed and shocked that Gordon had revealed the episode to a man I knew only from television, I had a feeling of being trapped and that the only way out was to tell the story. Jackie listened with rapt attention. "That's amazing," he said. "When we get to my house, I'm going to show you my ectoplasm."

"Your ectoplasm?"

"You'll see," he said, patting my hand as my father had done so often when counseling patience and faith.

The house in Peekskill was a surprise. It was round! Not a straight wall in it. "No corners," Jackie explained. "No place for spirits to lodge in!"

From a shelf in his den, he took down a bronze box with a thick glass lid. Inside lay a glutinous substance that looked like aspic or white Jell-O. He looked at me with the quizzical expression of a child. "If I thought you'd laugh or think I was nuts, I wouldn't be showing you this, Sheel, but that stuff is ectoplasm. A spiritualist captured it for me."

He showed me his library of books on spiritualism, the occult, and UFOs. "I'm kind of a nut on the subject," he bellowed, laughing. "Hey, maybe 'nut' isn't the right word, eh? Think of the fun the columnists and the writers for *TV Guide* would have if they got a load of all this, hunh?" Beneath the laughter was a plea: "I've let you in on my little secret, Sheel. I trust you to keep it to yourself."

Having experienced acute embarrassment after Gordon told fan magazines about my experience with an apparition in the house that Gordon and I were considering buying shortly after we went to

Dressing Room No. 1 of the Miami Beach Auditorium, a spacious room with an immense adjustable lounge chair where "the Great One" could lie back and put up his feet. The conversations were never about the show, never about show business. The subjects were my experiences with ESP, UFOs, the Bermuda Triangle, and all the mysteries of life past, present, and future.

I recounted how Gordon was the only person saved on a flight from Mitchell Field on Long Island to Fort Bragg, South Carolina. Gordo was doing special LORAN training for overseas duty. I stayed with my parents because it was only three weeks and there were no hotels available. Every Friday, a Major Brown flew Gordon and two other New York servicemen home for the weekend and back on Monday morning.

I woke up after the second week, screaming, insisting I had to go down there—now today. My parents said that Gordie is coming at three PM as always! No! No! I insisted. When I got to the colonel's house, Gordo was having brunch and wasn't pleased that I wanted to stay the weekend at the base.

"Something bothered me about the plane, darling. I'm sorry."

We were swimming in the colonel's pool when the officer of the day reported that the plane and all the men were destroyed, having hit a tree at Mitchell Field at 3:15. Gordo and I cried together.

Jackie talked about the many ghosts that were supposed to be haunting Hollywood. Jean Harlow was believed to be one of them, as was Carole Lombard and, most recently, Marilyn Monroe. Among the male ghosts, it was said, Clifton Webb still prowled the rooms of his Spanish-style Beverly Hills house just off Sunset Boulevard. A home on Summit Ridge once occupied by John Barrymore was reported to be visited not only the late "great profile" but by his deceased brother, Lionel, and sister, Ethel.

Might there be something about actors, Jackie wondered, that made them especially sensitive in such matters? "Maybe we have some kind of special connection to the force that drives the universe," he said. "Did you ever have the experience when you're acting that everything around you falls away and it's like you're in some special place?"

"Yes, I have," I said. "Just last week, as a matter of fact, when we were doing the scene in the Italian restaurant." In the scene, Alice and Ralph have just had one of their fights, and Alice has gone upstairs to stay with Trixie. Unknowingly, she and Ralph separately go to an Italian restaurant and are seated in back-to-back booths. "I had the feeling then

that we were the only two people in the world," I said. "Our connection was so strong that I felt suddenly that there were no cameras, no set, no audience. No Sheila, no Jackie. Just people."

"Yeah," Jackie said, staring into space. "Yeah."

During rehearsals for the first show, we were interrupted by the telephone. "Yeah," Jackie said. "Hi, Peter." Sitting up excitedly, he said to the caller, "Wait a minute." Then he wiggled a finger at me. "Come over here and hold the phone wire!" Bemused, I did so. "Okay, Peter," said Jackie into the phone, "tell me who's here with me." He then thrust the phone toward me.

The voice on the line was foreign-sounding. "It is vooman," he said. "She is five feet, eight inches tall, A size eight or ten dress. Very, very beautiful! She has hurt her back. It is an aggravation of an old injury but she should not vurry about it, it will go away soon. Am I correct, young lady?"

"Why, y-yes," I said, astounded not only that he knew so much about me but that he knew he was talking to me and not to Jackie. "Who—who is this I'm speaking to?"

"Peter Hurkos," Jackie said, whisking the phone from my hand. "From the look on Sheila's face," Jackie laughed, "I'd say you were right on the money, Peter."

One of the most famous and controversial psychics in the world, the Dutch mystic Peter Hurkos had been consulted by police departments all over the globe in some of their most baffling cases. Just a few years before he described me to myself on Jackie's phone, he had been called in by the Boston police in their manhunt for the Boston Strangler. He'd joined in searches for missing children and even had been consulted by Scotland Yard to assist in their investigation of the Stone of Scone, stolen from the royal throne.

Peter described himself as a "psychometrist" who could divine facts about people or victims of crimes by handling objects they had touched, by being close to them, or by hearing their voices over the telephone. This amazing power had come to him in 1943 after a fall from a ladder had left him in a coma for three days. Awakening, Peter told his doctor, "What you are thinking, don't do it. Something terrible will happen." It turned out that the physician had been planning a trip abroad. He took it and was killed shortly thereafter.

Recently, in Miami, Peter had aided the police in apprehending a murderer by describing the culprit in detail after handling personal

Jackie Gleason's plans to talk from beyond the grave

BELOVED COMIC Jackie Gleason had made plans to communicate from beyond the grave — and, before his death, discussed what he was going to say to God.

"That (talking to God) would be the greatest thing that could possibly happen to anyone," he said in a recent interview on TV's 60 Minutes.

"I'd say, 'I didn't think you were for real, but now I do.'"

The Great One, a hard-drinking carouser all his life, confessed he might not deserve passage into heaven.

"But if God is what he has been said to be, I'm sure he isn't vengeful," Gleason said. "I'm sure that if you've committed a sin, he's not going to send

The Great One also revealed his previous life — psychic abilities — and how he was taken to visit space aliens

you to hell for eternity." The star of the classic Honeymooners series, Gleason was an ardent believer in the paranormal before his death at 71, say close friends. And they reveal that Gleason plans to keep in touch with his many pals from beyond the grave.

He let many of them know that:

- He was blessed with psychic abilities himself.
- He had lived before as a medieval knight.
- He was taken to visit UFO aliens.

"I guess I have the largest library in the country on psychic phenomena," he once said.

Gleason claimed he even had the ability to travel outside his body — but fought against it and lost the power.

"I didn't know what it was at first," he recalled. "I had these tingling sensations and thought I was dying. I forced myself to get rid of the feelings. Later, after I studied the subject, I realized what had been happening."

From his reading, Gleason said he was able to identify his own psychic abilities.

"I know immediately if someone is sincere," he pointed out. "I know if they're devious toward me or anybody."

Ghosts

"I've had psychic experiences. Not with ghosts or anything, but in the way I know how to remedy problems — say with a stage set — before anyone else even knows there's a problem."

Friends say Gleason used to answer the phone, then amazingly greet them by name before they even spoke.

Gleason, who was married three times and had two daughters, was convinced space aliens exist and believed he lived before as a swashbuckling English duke in the days of King Henry VIII, says his second wife Beverly.

"His life as a 16th-century duke had evidently been just as exciting as his present one," recalled Beverly, who was married to The Great One from 1970 to 1974.

"He'd tell me how he rode into battle, dressed in a suit of gleaming armor and mounted on a snow white horse. Of course, he was always victorious."

"And through his dreams he would recall

how he lived in a huge castle and about all the servants he had and people who owed their allegiance to him."

Gleason was a firm believer in UFOs and swore he personally saw them on at least two occasions.

Beverly will never forget the night in 1973 when the comic returned ashen-faced to their Florida home and slumped into an armchair.

"I've been at Homestead Air Force Base," Beverly said he told her, "and I've seen the bodies of some

aliens from outer space. It's top secret. Only a few people know. But the President arranged for me to be escorted in there and see them."

Gleason was a close friend of then-President Nixon.

Beverly recounted that the comic described the four aliens as tiny, only about two feet tall, with small bald heads and disproportionately large ears.

"It sounds incredible, but I swear it's true," Gleason told Beverly. "I'll never forget it — ever."

Cat on a hot stove

"THE CAT did it!" says a man whose ranch house caught fire while he was asleep.

The offending feline had strolled on the push-button stove top controls and put two burners on full. Then the curtains caught fire.

Gilbert Cabana, 65, was awakened at 5 a.m. by the caterwauling of Screamer, his son's girlfriend's pet cat. He found the kitchen of his Leominster, Massachusetts, home ablaze.

Cabana grabbed the cat and some clothes, and ran out.

Neighbors called the fire department, who doused the blaze and estimated the damage at \$30,000.

An English sighting by a former skeptic was reported on Aug. 1 by D. F. Ogilvy, a veteran flight instructor. About 8 p.m., Ogilvy observed a strange and very large flying object over Hertfordshire. It had a delta shape, but through binoculars he could see it was not an aircraft.

When he called the Air Ministry, an official who appeared to have been briefed to keep quiet told him it was a meteorological balloon that had drifted over from France. In Ogilvy's report he stated this was impossible "because of the prevailing north-easterly airstream."

Through the air traffic controller at Elstree Aerodrome, Ogilvy learned that Southern Air Traffic Control had logged the strange device as an "unidentified object." The Elstree controller also gave him an unconfirmed report that a USAF F-100 jet had vainly tried to climb up and intercept the UFO.

"The object was obviously very large," Ogilvy said. Rejecting the Air Ministry answer, he added, "I was a high-altitude P.R. pilot in the Royal Air Force for several years, and have been a qualified flying instructor for the last 14. I certainly know a 'met' balloon when I see one . . . I may add that 24 hours ago I was a 'disbeliever,' and now have an open mind on the subject of UFOs."

A second U.S. case in which the AF tried to offset a UFO news story occurred on June 18 at Niagara Falls. From 10 p.m. to midnight, a UFO which flashed red, blue, green and yellow was seen maneuvering above the city -- once completely reversing its course. Witnesses included FAA tower operator at Niagara Falls Airport and newsman Bill Nelson, staff writer on the Niagara Falls Gazette. The FAA ruled out ordinary aircraft, and the alternate hovering and maneuvering ruled out any orbiting satellite.

Next day, the Gazette carried a detailed story, including an evaluation by Arthur Young, staff astronomer at the Niagara Falls Planetarium. The UFO, Young stated, could not be any normal astronomical body because of its extreme brightness, maneuvers and speed.

The Gazette reached nearby Lockport AFB at 2:30 p.m. Within 30 minutes, Nelson later informed NICAP, he received a call from Lt. Col. Robert Friend, head of Project Blue Book, Wright-Patterson AFB.

For 45 minutes Col. Friend quizzed Nelson, attempting -- without success -- to convince him the UFO was some ordinary object.

"I know it was NOT a balloon, an aircraft, a temperature inversion or anything but a UFO," Nelson told NICAP.

After the Gazette story, the Associated Press checked with the AF and NASA. Both said they had "no activities that would explain the mysterious lights." After vacillating over a balloon answer, the AF finally released the conclusion that the UFO was a star or a planet.

If the AF had carefully checked, they would have found this explanation impossible, as Astronomer Young stated. Either this answer was quickly made public without checking the facts -- or the AF deliberately released it, knowing it could not be true.

On July 18, an attempted UFO interception by four jets was observed by Joseph Cappels, technical editor for the United Technology Center (a division of United Aircraft.) At 7:25 p.m., Cappels saw a bright disc-shaped object hovering over the area Palo Alto, Calif. Taking a movie camera from his car (Bolex mm., 36 mm. telephotolens) Cappels caught the UFO in several frames. (Film being evaluated by NICAP and Bay Area Subcommittee No. 2, in California.)

In a signed report to NICAP, Cappels said the disc was the size of a dime at arm's length. After driving home, he and a neighbor watched the strange object until four jets appeared. As the jets approached the disc, it tilted up in a short arc, then faded out of sight in an estimated three seconds.

(An AF missile shot, an hour later, caused general excitement because at high altitude its trail glowed weirdly in the rays of the sun, then below the horizon. But this shot had nothing to do with the UFO sighting.)

Lack of space prevents other examples, except these two "hits": June 20, airport tower operators at Cordoba, Argentina, reported a strange object flying "under intelligent control"; May to July 26, several Australian motorists reported UFO

encounters. Two were "chases" which frightened the car occupants; in two other cases, the UFOs had landed on highways, taking off as the cars approached. (Other recent cases will appear in NICAP's documented REPORT, "THE UFO EVIDENCE.")

GLEASON REPEATS UFO BELIEF

In a discussion reported by Bob Consodine in his August 8th column, Jackie Gleason firmly repeated his conviction that UFOs are interplanetary machines.

"This planet," he told Consodine, "is under almost perpetual observation by vehicles and people from outer space."

"Little green men from Venus?"

"I don't know what color they are or how big they are or whether they resemble us in any way," said Gleason. "All I know is that they are there and have killed at least one pilot who tried to investigate them -- a boy flying an F-51 -- and have landed in several places."

Jackie Gleason is one of the strongest believers in the interplanetary answer, and he has never hesitated to make his convictions public. As a NICAP member he has expressed the hope that we will get Congressional hearings. We greatly appreciate his support and his interest in our investigation.

THE ARGOSY STORY

Several members have denounced an article in the July issue of Argosy Magazine, entitled "The Spacniks of Giant Rock". It was written by Max Miller, formerly a NICAP photographic adviser.

This article plays up the usual ridiculous meeting at Giant Rock, California -- a meeting attended mostly by deluded persons, screwballs and suspected frauds who claim contacts with beings from other worlds. Regardless of intent, the obvious result is to alienate the average reader from a serious consideration of the real UFO evidence.

If the writer were uninformed as to the UFO facts, we could accept this as an unfortunate story by a careless reporter. But Mr. Miller has investigated UFOs for years. He knows the massive, factual evidence from hundreds of reliable, competent observers. We consider that Mr. Miller has done a grave disservice to serious investigators, and we hope that our members, whenever possible, will help nullify this article by citing the true evidence.

...iles from central London. It was a luminous ball, seen by me on a clear night, and I watched it pass into a band of cirrocumulus cloud in the zenith and even twenty minutes later it had not reappeared. Also, on July 23, 1954, at 6:25 A.M. (06.25) when a strange red cylinder, with no wake or exhaust, no ports, rudders, or gear passed, ten minutes after the end of a seasonal, sub-stratosphere British Royal Air Force maneuvers, with which it was not connected. It was visible over low hills of Chislehurst, Kent, and passed towards the southern shores of England.

No one knows the intent of the flying saucers or their geographical origin, although one may suspect that they may use the moon or even Mars as a stopover place—in any cosmic trip to our earth. So far as my fairly extensive and worldwide data go I have no evidence that any friendly contact has been made by these flying saucer entities with people of the earth and therefore I have as yet nothing whatever on which to dogmatize.

DONALD E. KEYHOE, retired U.S. Air Force major, author of "Flying Saucers from Outer Space" and "The Flying Saucer Conspiracy."

I HAVE never seen a flying saucer but in 1952 I saw a UFO [Unidentified Flying Object] tracked by radar from the control center of Washington National Airport. I have simply tried to do a straight reporting job collecting authentic and verified reports. The beings who control the saucers believe are attempting to learn all possible details of our civilization, the earth's atmosphere and climate, with the intention of eventually making contact. Whether their motives are friendly, neutral, or hostile I do not know, but so far I have seen no conclusive proof that they are hostile. I believe that the saucers, or some of them, are using Mars and more recently the moon as bases of operation for their reconnaissance of the earth. It is possible the saucers originate from Mars but this has not been proved.

WARD J. RUPPELT headed an Air Force investigation into flying saucers two years and is author of "The Report on Flying Objects."

MYSELF have never seen a flying saucer. An answer to the question of the intent of these flying saucers and their origin would be nothing but wild speculation.

VALD H. MENZEL, professor of physics, director of the Harvard

College Observatory and author of "Flying Saucers."

ANYONE who is prepared to believe those authors who claim to have seen a flying saucer land, to have talked with its occupants, or even to have ridden in a saucer should realize that the documentation is of the flimsiest. When we note that the theories proposed by the saucer occupant strongly resemble the psychoceramic (i.e., crack-pot) theories concocted by uneducated cranks to explain the workings of the universe we may properly suspect the entire works. Other writers, though they may not have seen a flying saucer themselves, list sighting after sighting in an attempt to show conclusively that these sightings could not possibly have a simple explanation in terms of known, natural phenomena.

Certain of these writers have maintained that the Air Force has classified the subject of saucers because the general public is not ready to contemplate the fact of a potential invasion from outer space. Unfortunately, the most concrete evidence for the belief in the existence of flying saucers in the first place is the fact that the Air Force has seen fit to classify information concerning them. I have considered this classification unwise since the saucers in no wise threaten National Security.

I have seen many flying saucers and a great majority of them are reflections from a material object like a distant balloon, a distant plane, a peculiar cloud, a piece of paper, the feather of a bird, or a spider web. Bright stars and planets have accounted for their share. Certain flying saucers are due to ice crystals in the atmosphere or to peculiar effects of refraction. The effects can be startling—even frightening. And yet they are in no sense mysterious if one has the facts of science to work with. I had the good fortune to see one of

the famous green fireballs of New Mexico, in fact the very one mentioned by Donald Keyhoe in "The Flying Saucer Conspiracy." I saw it from White Sands, the night of September 18, 1954, where half a dozen astronomers and their families were having a picnic. We all saw it and agreed that it was beautiful and spectacular—but not mysterious. The greenness comes from the abundant element magnesium. Keyhoe states that the fireball was at 20,000 feet, whereas my calculations indicated that it was at least 350,000 feet above the earth.

Flying saucers are natural phenomena, have been visible for centuries in many cases, and pose no problem. They are not, even by the remotest stretch of imagination, vehicles from outer space.

JACKIE GLEASON, the noted entertainer, reflects the opinion of many other laymen who also are convinced that flying saucers are real.

I HAVE never seen a flying saucer anywhere personally but have read published flying saucer literature. Most of this literature is ridiculous, but amongst the trash there are some undeniable points that cannot be refuted even by the United States Government.

The most concrete evidence that saucers are real is the fact that there was an organization of scientists called "The Rock Hounds," who believed that there actually were flying saucers. They recorded on machines for just that purpose radioactivity beyond normal wherever the saucers were sighted. The entire story is told in a portion of Edward J. Ruppelt's book, "The Report on Unidentified Flying Objects."

As for the intent of the flying saucers and their geographic origin, I am not sure where they originate but it is almost certain that their jumping off place is the moon. I think that their purpose in visiting us is to get geographic information and to find out all that they would have to contend with if they decide to make an absolute communication with us.
