My formal training in physics, backed by a liberal arts education, enabled me to draw deeply from the sweet spring of basic research for many years. When I took leave from disciplinary research and became immersed in analysis of socio-technical issues, it was a most discomforting step. But having taken it, the new challenges were not only enlivening, but also surprisingly susceptible to the problem-solving approaches I had learned in science. The lessons: (1) Training in physics is an effective instrument to learn how to solve many kinds of problems; (2) A change in professional direction about every decade or so is a great tonic. (3) Attacking issues from fresh perspectives is a natural ingredient of creativity.
