







To the cellars of the sea


THEIR BOAT double-anchored against currents from a hole off Rat Cay (above), the team dives during calm periods when the flow changes direction.

A spelunker on land before entering his first blue hole, the author (lowering lights, left) has spent more than a decade exploring these underwater labyrinths.








Like a closed gate, a rockfall 150 feet into a side tunnel at the bottom of a 200-foot-deep blue hole blocks exploration by diver Heinz Bolliger. "We believe this cave might go on for miles," says the author.

SODDEN WITH SWAMPS and covered by wide "bights," low-lying ~~parts~~ largest of the Bahama Islands sprawls for a hundred miles beside a deep Atlantic channel that widens into the Tongue of the Ocean (pages 356-7). A sharp beak on the island's soggy western side broadens the lump of land to forty miles; ~~the islanders live~~ along the drier eastern edge. ~~Beefs~~ near the channel hold most of the blue holes, whose unusually strong currents set them apart from similar formations around the globe.
