

UNKNOWN: A sighting is considered an unknown when a report (from an observer adjudged to be reliable) contains all pertinent data necessary to normally suggest at least one valid hypothesis on the cause or explanation of the sighting but when the description of the object and its maneuvers cannot be correlated with any known object or phenomenon. It is an important fact that the maps fully are the Air Force questionnaires filled and, therefore, the last the number of "insufficient data" cases, the last will be the number of "unknowns". Regardless of this, the Air Force recognizes that it is highly improbable that "unknowns" will ever be reduced to zero, as they are based primarily on human impressions and interpretations and rarely, if ever, on instrumentation and controlled measurements.

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
