

The fifth unidentified case from Warraville, Illinois on the night of 11 August, and the report consisted of a series of flashes which disappeared above the horizon. The object was in flight from the SE to SW and passed from horizon to horizon in 25-30 seconds. No object was visible, just eight evenly spaced flashes. Five minutes later the flashes reappeared with the same characteristics of the first pass. A third occurrence of the phenomenon, again 5 minutes later, was witnessed by the observer's wife. Flight was always straight and the flashes evenly spaced.

The sixth unidentified sighting of the year comes from St. Helen, Saskatchewan. Information was received in a letter of a sighting on the nights of 11 - 14 Aug 1960. Several witnesses witnessed a missile or satellite firing at a height of 11 - 12,000 feet. The object glowed like a small fireball. An identical sighting was made the following night at the same time and location, only this time the object rose over the adjacent mountains, slightly lower than on previous sightings. It was estimated to be at 7,000 - 10,000 feet. The flight lasted four minutes at which time the object stopped glowing. The object was observed through binoculars and it continued on course for an additional minute and then it resumed its initial glow. The flight continued for 30 seconds and suddenly the object exploded into a ball of fire like a fireworks display with five times its previous brilliance. Have you-are a report from a witness who is interested in opening what he saw.

Unidentified number seven of 1960 comes from Ukiahville, California. On 11 September two objects were observed by a witness familiar with all types of aircraft. The sighting took place at 9:15 PM under good visible conditions. The first of the two objects moved like a balloon through most of the sighting, except that it's motion was not established to be with the wind and in the final phase of its observation it moved at terrific speed to undergo a "long" object. The "long" object was in straight flight to the SE and it's arc would have carried it through some portion of the sky where features of an aircraft could have been easily identified. The balloon object's motion did not conform with the characteristics of a balloon and the "long" object was not established to be an aircraft. An unusual report from a competent witness.

8... On 15 September 1960 two objects described as an ear of corn and a banana performed a series of maneuvers near Vanalia, Ohio. Observation was made to the West just after sunset, and there is a possibility that aircraft contributed to the sighting. However, certain aspects of the case do not conform with this analysis. One object appeared to remain stationary part of the time, and both objects changed in brightness and shape.

9... A report of a sighting at 8PM on 6 October 1960 over Philadelphia, Pennsylvania was received from a SIFAP representative of that area. The observation lasted for 30 seconds during which time an object approached the observer for 10 seconds, turned and went away for an additional 10 seconds. The description of the object was that associated with an aircraft towing an advertising banner, yet in this case the duration was seldom less without additional features being noted consistent with this analysis. Have an other report was received from a city of over 1,000,000 population, two possibilities are presented...1) misinterpretation of some conventional object; or 2) hoax, however intent has not been established. There are inconsistencies in the report.
