

the size of a basketball at arm's length. As it moved away it became a dark blue. The witness was a 25 year old youth, alone on a camping trip on the trail. The report was submitted about six weeks after the sighting. The report was accurate, with sufficient information upon which to base an evaluation. What was it!!!!

An unusual observation of four pink wheels was made on 20 May 1963 from New Jersey. There were four pink wheels moving West, evenly spaced, about 1/2 minute apart. They were alike in all respects. Each object was in sight for about one second. These objects were reported as spinning or pulsing and moving very fast. Observation was at night against a background of white clouds. No trail, no sound. Observer looking South. Witness assumed objects to be about 3 - 5 miles distant. Altitude neither high nor low, no attempt to estimate elevation. Witness continued to watch area for an additional 30 minutes and object/objects did not reappear. Witness stated that there was a moon, but could not see it. (No moon on this night, however, there was probably enough ground light to give off reflections on the low clouds.) One witness. Lady. Rescued from last war (age not reported). No starlight activity in area. Sighting was made indoors through a window. Possible reflection from external source, but why only four passed? Cannot evaluate as a reflection without knowing the source or having additional information. Witness accurate. Report considered as complete as possible. No apparent solution. Case Unidentified.

The third unidentified sighting of 1961 was from 15 June 1961 and the attached report gives you all the information that we have. With one exception Satellites are not known, to have a retrograde orbit.

The fourth unidentified sighting of the year comes from St. Gall, Switzerland. Information was received in a letter of a sighting on the nights of 13 - 14 Oct. 1961. Several witnesses observed a missile or satellite flying at a height of 25 - 30,000 feet. The object glowed like a small fireball. An identical sighting was made the following night at the same time and location, only the object rose over the adjacent mountains, slightly lower than on previous sightings. It was estimated to be at 7,000 - 10,000 feet. The flight consumed four minutes at which time the object stopped glowing. The object was observed through binoculars and it continued on course for an additional minute at which time it resumed its glow. The flight then continued for 30 seconds and suddenly the object exploded into a ball of fire like a fireworks display with five times the previous brilliance. Here you have a report from a witness who is interested in knowing what he sees. This object does not have the perfume of an aircraft, missile, satellite, meteor or sightings of fireworks, yet some characteristics of each are present. It would be nice to add brevity and say this was a missile-satellite-meteor-fireworks, but unfortunately the case is called an Unidentified.

For the first eight months of 1960 there were four unidentified's. A blue light, four pink wheels, a retrograde satellite, and an exploding "thing". Evidence of "flying saucers"! Surely nothing presented would stand as scientific proof for a visitation from outer space. The Air Force does not deny the possibility that some form of life may exist on other planets in the universe; however, there has been no evidence submitted to or discovered by the Air Force that proves or even
