It is not always possible to do a deep analysis and describe them as "solid" or "non-solid" or "cellular" etc. The structures, on the one hand, apparently comprise models of matter that in some sense are "homogeneous" (polymers, all the way up to the liquid or gas state). On the other hand, we must inevitably be chemical specialists and not just physicists, in order to describe the structures. For example, operators of a "solid" can be in different energy states. The bodies might be "homogeneous" and associated with different densities and other physical properties from any of the structures we have. One thing is evident: "fibers," "layers," and materials and manufacture within them are bodies having classical structures that do not act as a whole. In this respect, it is not a priori clear that we must insist on the use of the term "solid" with its certain limits of interpretation of structure.
