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Astronomer Dr. La Paz, who made no sightings himself, but agrees on the policy of reporting to a duly constituted panel if he should see any.

Astronomer Dr. La Paz has made no sightings and was not particularly interested in the problem.

Astronomer Dr. La Paz, who already has an established reputation in Life magazine that there appears to be no reason for keeping his name secret. He is the Director of the Institute of Meteoritics, at the University of New Mexico, and is cooperative in the extreme. One sighting of his has been described in Life magazine and also fully in OGI reports. He has made extensive reports about the green fireball sightings in New Mexico in OGI reports also.

The discussion of green fireballs with many astronomers disclosed that most of them were of the opinion that these were natural objects. However, close questioning revealed that they knew nothing of the actual sightings, of their frequency or anything such about them, and therefore cannot be taken seriously. This is characteristic of scientists in general when speaking about subjects which are not in their own immediate field of concern.

Dr. La Paz has seen only one green fireball himself, but has been very active in collecting reports on the others. Because his full reports are in the OGI files, only the salient points will be discussed here. It appears that the green fireballs can be characterized by being extremely bright, most of them lighting up the sky in the daytime, estimated magnitude -10, which is extremely bright. They appear to come in bursts and at one time 10 were observed in 13 days. No wise he associated with them despite their brightness. The

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
