<p align="center">COORDINATION REPORT</p> <p>1. Shape, indefinite and fuzzy. Size, approximately that of a 4000 projectile when undulating red to white each object changed color approximately three times while in view of observer. There were approx. twenty (20) objects sighted within the three minute period of observation. The objects were following in a trail formation, on the same trajectory. They ascended to 1,000 ft and descended to about 500 ft., and they faded from view. No sound/noise detected, exhaust or propulsion system observed. Objects traveling at extremely high velocity, no sound nor apparent maneuvers evidenced. Objects traveling from South to North on the east side of New Brighton Avenue. Under direction contact but no objects picked up. Objects were traveling in groups of four or five, with inconsistent spacing (2-3 sec.) between objects and groups. The red and white light color seemed to be in the tail of object.</p> <p>2. Objects observed at 0830 on 6 June 52 within a three minute period of observation.</p> <p>3. Visual observation from airplane (S-4) traveling on a 90° heading at 150 mph at 5,000 ft. a/c turned to heading 340° which parallel track of objects.</p> <p>4. Location Lat. 45° 10'N; Long 92° 10'W east near New Brighton ground. Objects were approx 5,000 ft above to 1,000 ft from observer traveling south to North at 1,000 ft altitude.</p> <p>5. Observer, Carol J. Richard, Capt., USAF is a rated pilot and has had combat experience as night bombing mission commanding and direct heavy projectiles.</p> <p>6. Weather clear, no clouds nor haze; wind SE at 10 mph.</p>
