1. On 7 June a representative of this detachment (1st Lt Robert C. Jones, AFM0000197) was sent to a point on the front lines to the U.S. Corps sector (N2142). His mission was to investigate reports of an unidentified aerial object observed by ground forces personnel. The object was seen just to the rear of enemy lines in the vicinity of Hill 1260 (N2144). The sighting took the form of a light apparently suspended in the air, although resembling in the same relative way, the light was observed to ascend and descend with a slight lateral movement. The 1st representative studied the object personally on the night of 7 June at approximately 2100 hours and observed it for a period of one hour and five minutes. The light had been observed previously on 10 May and 1 June by U.S. Infantry units in the area. All other sightings took place approximately between the hours of 2100 and 2200. 2. Friendly ground observation post observed a large balloon being raised and lowered by means of a cable at this point on 9 June at 1415 hours. 3. Between the hours of 2100 and 2200 hours on 12 June, a light was again observed at the same point. Prior sightings had been made. During the same period two enemy light aircraft were reported in the vicinity of the light. Both aircraft are believed to have headed toward this light after having flown over friendly lines. It was the opinion of friendly forces personnel that this light is suspended from a balloon and is being used as a check point for enemy light planes. Such an action suggested in that the light was a reference point for enemy ground troops on patrol. 4. That was thought to have been an enemy helicopter was reported in this area on the night of 7 June and is believed to have landed on Hill 1260. After remaining on the hill for one-half hour the helicopter took off and returned to the vicinity of N2142 (N2138). 5. Upon evaluation of the findings established by this investigation the following para 100 was published in daily intelligence summary No. 30, dated 11 June 1954: 30. Recently several reports have been received concerning the sighting of an unidentified object in the air above a primary forward position, changing to red, then to green, and located in the area of N2042. These observations were made on the 28th of May, and on the 4th, 6th, and 7th of June between the hours of 2100 and 2200. In the majority of cases the object was described as being a light-colored round, at altitudes estimated between 1500 to 20,000 feet, and in one instance was reported to move away in a very horizontal path for a distance. This object was observed through a friendly Commanders' scope and suggested the 10000 ft. altitudes being the operating reported that it could not be seen from ground to keep on target. This object was observed on 7 June for a period of one hour and five minutes by a trained air specialist and an Ordnance Team, both specialists, as a result of these observations, a forward observer suggested the area of N2142 on 7 June and saw a balloon being raised and lowered on a cable. (N2142) The object could possibly be a decoy for our own light aircraft, or used as a means of orientation or signals by enemy ground troops in this area. 6.
