George T. Dreher Sightings

Dreher's first sighting began at 0940 PST and lasted approximately one hour. His second sighting took place at 1040 PST and lasted 25 seconds. Both sightings took place from his yard in north Spokane: 119 2nd, 47 37th.

The first object sighted was described by Dreher as a weather balloon and was seen to the northeast (chart ref. No. 0). Mr. Dreher's accurate observations on this object are set forth in the report of Chester Brown which follows.

Dreher's sighting of the second object involved a great number of established because of nature of movement of objects) of gliding objects which he saw circling the "ball-oon". Their movement was that of hovering, disappearing and reappearing, always above the "balloons".

The third object was seen by Dreher as it flashed across the sky in a straight line at 1040 PST. It travelled from north to south, gliding and disappeared into the sun; according to Dreher. As it moved it rotated on its axis be-goning round and then flat and as it turned Dreher claims he saw a hub-like projection or "control box" in the center. Dreher estimated this flashing object as being larger than the B-36's he has seen over Spokane. It was a dull silver in color and glinted in the sun. He estimated its altitude at 20,000-40,000 ft. and at an angle of 60 degrees from horizontal.
