and is circles from 2315 hours, 23 July 1952, until 0330 hours, 23 July 1952. In Brooklyn, LOUIS SPURIA, 135 Ocean Avenue, said he and his wife both saw a bright yellowish object in the sky between midnight and 0330 hours, 23 July 1952. HAROLD A. ROY, a Civil Aeronautics Authority operations specialist, said he sighted two (2) objects about the same time near Waterbury, N.Y.

15. At 2225 hours, 19 July 1952, Mr. ROBERT SPENCE, 142 West 85th Street, New York, called this office to advise that he saw a strange object in the sky at about 2155 hours, 19 July 1952. This object was flashing in a circular motion from the west and toward the East. It was observed for about one (1) minute by Mr. SPENCE and his wife outside their apartment. The object had no blinking lights like an airplane, and differed from a star. It was white and pink around the edges, and its altitude seemed constant.

16. At 0630 hours, 20 July 1952, Mr. HERBIE OKRELL, 704 Madison Place, Paramus, New York, reported to this office by telephone that he saw a strange object in the sky at 2355 hours, 20 July 1952. The object appeared to come from north northwest at a constant speed and was much brighter than any star ever seen. It was about four (4) times the diameter of any star, was of an orange color, and no sound was heard. This object took about two (2) minutes to cross the sky, and disappeared thirty (30) degrees south of the east. The object was also observed by Mrs. OKRELL, and by Mrs. and Mr. HANCOCK.

17. At 1000 hours, 21 July 1952, Mr. P. A. ROCKELL, 242 Mulberry Place, Hightstown, New York, New York Office telephone Plaza 7-1200, a salesman of airplane gasoline to airlines, telephoned this office to report that at 2215 hours, 20 July 1952, while in his yard with neighbors, he observed to the south southwest a very rapidly blinking light. He stated that the object's line of flight was not associated with that of an aircraft, but was darting, erratic, like an insect, and erratic. The light was flying straight when first observed, but went straight up and disappeared. The light was observed for less than a minute. No object of the body, other than the light, was observed. The object was approximately four (4) miles away. No sound was heard. The ceiling was around 20,000 feet, clouds, and stars could be observed. The object was observed for less than a minute.

18. On 20 June 1952, a report was received from Navy sources that a group of high school children at Jamaica Heights, Long Island, had reported that at 1215 hours they saw an object at approximately 20,000 feet traveling in an easterly direction. The object appeared to be round and shiny, and seemed to be wobbling somewhat.

19. On 21 July 1952, the "New York Times" in a story detailed Boston; 23 July 1952, stated that a number of reports of "fizzler discs and other unusual objects" had been reported in New England and as far south as Trenton, New Jersey.
