Orlando, January
23 July 1950

On the evening of June 21, 1950, my son-in-law and my daughter (Captain and Mrs. R. H. Howard) and I were walking home from the picture show. It was about 10:25 P.M. The night was unusually clear and we were observing the stars. We looked up, for a moment, the south star, etc., when all at once there came to our attention an unusually bright object, moving in a way that the stars; it was larger and appeared to be round. At first I thought it was a meteor, since it was moving in a downward direction, but the next instant it was back in the first position. It seemed to be hovering for a few minutes, probably 3 or 4 minutes. I could tell it was moving diagonally, for at first it was to the right of our star and while we watched it moved far to the left of the same star and the light grew dimmer until it was out of sight.

When we first noticed this bright object it was almost overhead, in the eastern sky, was moving toward the north as it appeared to be ascending. Altogether I watched it for about 20 minutes before it disappeared completely from sight.
