On Wednesday night the 21st of June 1952 at about 2300 P.M., while walking home from the depot theater with my mother (Mrs. J. L. Smith) and my husband (Captain L. V. Stuard), we saw a reddish light in the eastern sky. It was really noticeable because of its strong pulsations and greater size than the surrounding stars. When first seen it appeared to be blurring around in the sky, moving very quickly in one direction then in another.

After watching for what seemed to me about 15 minutes it not only went directly north in a straight line and appeared to be alighting for it gradually disappeared. I watched it for about 2 minutes in all. I could not see that it had any definite shape as it was surely a round spot of light. I do not know how high it was beyond the fact that it was certainly larger than the stars. The sky was very still and the sky alone so that it was easy to observe the pulsations of this red light and to feel sure that the motion could not have been caused by wind.
