<p>The phenomenon sighted by Mr. Parks appeared as a group, each object being of a round or oval shape. Although he estimated the distance between him and the objects, he is not positive of the accuracy of his estimation, therefore, making an approximation of the size of the objects impossible. There were between 20 and 30 of the objects, each one of a "dark orange or tangerine" color.</p> <p>The observer noticed no recognizable aerodynamic features about the objects and stated that there was no trail or exhaust. There was a sound emitted by the objects described as being that of a "rushing wind".</p> <p>The objects stayed on their course with no maneuvers and disappeared from his sight into the distance.</p> <p>There were two groups of the objects, one being at a greater distance away but of the same description. The first group passed over at approximately 2135 and the second at 2150. Each group was under Mr. Park's observation for 20 to 25 seconds. The objects were flying in a group but in no defined formation. The first group was estimated to have been $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile away and the second group about 1 mile away, both flying 25° to 30° above the horizon.</p> <p>The manner of observation was visual from ground surface. The observer was sitting in his car watching a Drive-In moving picture at the time. The windows were rolled down when the observer first sighted the objects.</p> <p>The observer was located at the Oaklawn Drive-In Theatre on the Dallas Highway, No. 21. The geographic coordinates of this area are: 31° 36' North, 97° 06', 30" West.</p> <p>Mr Park's car, from which he made his observation, was parked directly in front of the screen and about three rows back in the Drive-In Theatre. He sighted the objects over the projection screen flying on a course from south to north. As stated before, both groups appeared at an estimated $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 mile away from the observer.</p> <p>The observer, Mr. Leslie M. Parks, is an electrician for the Tom Cuff Electrical Contracting Company in Waco. His observations were witnessed and verified by his wife, Mrs. Osella Parks, and daughter, Vera Parks.</p> <p>The only known factor that could have been misleading to the observer's visual picture of the objects was the fact that during his entire observation, he was within his car, therefore, watching the objects through a windshield and immediately above a well lighted projection screen.</p>		
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
