Dear Major Stead:

As per our telephone conversation of yesterday, I shall put on paper my observations in the heavens on the night of April 24, 1952.

At 10:21 P. M. my children sighted the first one. It was the red ball, with a dull red glow. It was sighted in the Eastern sky proceeding West. As it came even with our house it turned sharply to the left and continued South.

The next one sighted, a few minutes later, was high overhead in the Western section of the sky. It appeared as a small white star and was streaking South at a tremendous speed.

The next one observed was the red ball type, coming in from the East. Unfortunately for us it was much higher than the ones sighted previously but following the same identical course that the previous ones had followed. It came on in from the East and when it was even with the house it turned sharply and proceeded South. It was directly over us when it turned and as it made the sharp turn to the South it seemed to flap over on its side and we saw a BRIGHT RED SPOT OF LIGHT, similar to the red lights we observe on our own planes. Also, there seemed to be another dimension. It reminded me of the wind-up musical tops which youngsters play with. This light appeared to be at the top of the ball.

Two other objects were observed very high in the Eastern portion of the sky, going South at the same terrific speed as the first bright one we had seen in the Eastern portion of the sky some twenty minutes before. The first one of these was the bright-star type; the second one was a bright green and it seemed a little elongated appearing like a bright green Easter egg rushing to the South. The bright green color would not be too different to the green lights on a plane should one suddenly detach itself from the plane and go streaking across the sky.
