On 5 May, Robert L. Dumasness and Samuel Langfield, residing at the Marine Institute of Norfolk Naval Station, Norfolk, Virginia, were interviewed and stated in substance as follows: At 0700 hours, 5 May 1952, in Jackson Township in a grassy field with the top down, they observed an object which they believed to be a flying saucer. The object was moving west at approximately 500 miles per hour. Whether the size of the object, nor its distance - nor altitude could be determined. However, it was saucer-shaped and about five times as long as it was thick. It appeared to be illuminated at a slight angle. It gave off a phosphorescent white glow and emitted what appeared to be white discharge or possibly jet exhausts. The object was observed for about four seconds when it suddenly disappeared from view. Dumasness is an aviator of the U.S. Air Force, and Langfield is an aviator of the U.S. Navy who was formerly a colonial aviator. Both stated that in their experiences with aircraft they had never seen any similar object. Dumasness stated that approximately 200 people observed an unknown party at Cecilville Inn, Florida, Atlanta, that same night observed the above phenomena.
