The object (based on disappearance at 25,000') is estimated as follows:

Original sighting - 4,500' away (horizontal), at 8,500' altitude.
At disappearance - 9,200' away (horizontal), at 25,000' altitude.

5. Identifying information on observer: The observer is an intelligent, well-informed high school student, who is, although not well versed in aerodynamics nor in meteorology, in the opinion of the investigating officer, convinced of the authenticity of this phenomena and has been completely honest in her statements.

NAME: Constance Dwyer.
AGE: 16 years.
ADDRESS: 611 East Third Street, Mishawaka, Indiana.

6. Weather.

a. The following weather information was obtained from Meads Field, South Bend, Indiana, which is approximately 4 miles to the northwest of the observer.

Clouds - Thin broken at 25,000 feet.
Visibility - 7 miles.
Temperature - 15 degrees.
Dew Point - 35
Wind - Southeast at 15.
Altimeter setting - 30.14

b. The weather observer on duty at Meads Field on the night of 4 April 1952 informed the investigating officer that he received two telephone calls on that evening reporting unusual objects (or object) in the sky. Receiving calls of THIS nature is unusual. However, when the weather observer looked for the object, he saw what was in his opinion a searchlight reflection on the clouds. The color of this reflection was light silver or white.

COMMENT: The observer of the red object was definite about the fact that the object was sighted in a space where there were no clouds and that in those circumstances a cloud, a searchlight or shining on a cloud would give an effect the reverse of this. At the time of the sighting there was enough light to distinguish clearly the outline of the clouds.

7. Activities at conditions which might account for the sighting.

a. NONE.

(1) The Dodge Manufacturing Co., which lies on a direct line between the observer and the object sighted, and which has lunch burrango, ceases operation of its furnaces at 2000 hours daily. There are no other industrial sites near or about the line of sight. There were no fires in the area and the Police, Newspaper, and radio station received no reports of unusual objects.
