Statement of Observers

I, W/O Gene C. G. below, 32777603, describe the following instances involving certain unidentified objects observed by me on 11 May 1950:

1. One of the objects that I observed resembled a paper plate in shape and appearance and was of a flat white color. The others were too high for them any observer capable of seeing at that altitude and a satellite glow. One of the smaller objects was not continually visible because it seemed to have a "beat" in it. The other small object was continually visible and both seemed to be in a slow formation. The object resembling the "paper plate" flipped end-over-end in a definite direction, changing into the usual 50th speed of jet fighters and expanding about a minute later at a reduced speed. 20 to 30 seconds after the second observation had elapsed, I saw the "paper plate" object make a 90° turn to the south, and that it seemed to approach the two smaller objects, which did not alter their appearance until the second observation. There appeared to be no interaction between the "paper plate" object and the two smaller ones. I did not notice any noise or vapor trails emanating from any of the objects.

2. I made the two observations at 180° and 170°. The first observation last 2 1/2 minutes and the second lasted 2 1/2 minutes.

3. I observed the objects from the ground with the naked eye.

4. I was at the control post at George Air Force Base when I made the observations. George Air Force Base is located 4 miles northwest of Pittsville, California. The largest "paper plate" object passed in a south-wind direction over Pittsville. When I started to fix the object time, it had turned just approaching an air base located south after observation of 90° turn to the right. The altitude was between 10,000 and 15,000 feet. The two smaller objects did not have any direction but remained in the same general direction. They were between 3,000 and 4,000 feet high.

5. There is a high island situated 10 miles from the Air Force at a distance light aircraft altitudes.

6. Weather was clear, with good visibility and little wind in the vicinity.

7. No special activity or conditions which might account for the sighting.
8. No physical evidence of the objects was apparent.
9. No interception or identification action taken.
10. No aircraft in the air in the vicinity at the time of observation.
