

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

I, Mr C. T. Myke, make the following statement concerning an unusual sighting, which is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.

On the night of May 13, 1962, at approximately 2235 HRT, a group of amateur astronomers of which I was one were preparing to return home after an evening of observing from the Furman Campus located in Greenville, South Carolina. At this time, James Richardson, one of the group, called our attention to what I would say were four objects, each the shape of a goose without neck or tail. They were a luminous brown or orange color, possibly translucent and flying in a diamond formation. Distance between each object was about five (5) times the width of each object.

They were flying about ten (10) to fifteen (15) degrees from directly overhead, on a level course heading about 330 degrees. Altitude I would say was below 1000 feet. They were visible for about ten (10) seconds.

Their flight was oscillating in nature, first five (5) degrees up on one side and at the same time down on the other.
