4. The objects (2) sighted appeared to be spherical and "orange and white like the sun" in color. There was no regular formation but one object thought to be larger than the other appeared stationary while the smaller of the two seemed to dart away from the other at a rapid rate of speed and then to reappear in close proximity to the larger. There was no unusual sound or conventional type of propulsion noted.

5. The objects were sighted between 1900 and 1950 and the observation lasted between twenty to thirty minutes. Sunrise was at 1950.

6. The observation was made visually from the ground, elevation approximately 700 to 1000 feet above sea level. Zeiss Jena, 10 x 50 field glasses were used to observe the objects. The observers could not distinguish anything more about the object when using the glasses except that the movement mentioned in paragraph 4, above, was not discernible to the naked eye and could be seen through the glasses.

7. The observation was made from a high bluff, latitude 18°11'40", longitude 87°31'30". The point of observation overlies the city of Sagapee and Sagapee Bay. Distance from observation point to sighted object could not be estimated. Heading from point of observation to object was approximately 170° magnetic.

8. There were five witnesses to the sightings.

Mr. Sigal S. Garcia-Bender, a Puerto Rican business man and lawyer, a man of stability and dependability in his community. Mr. Garcia did most of the observing with the field glasses and it is upon his description that the major part of the report is based.

Mr. E. B. Stipes, an American, ex-air force pilot, son-in-law of Mr. Garcia. Mr. Stipes is also in business in Sagapee and impressed the investigator as a person of sound judgment and integrity.

Miss "Betty" Garcia-Bender, a Puerto Rican college student, 20 years old. Miss Garcia appeared to be a sensible young person, well informed and of mature judgment.

The other two witnesses were Mrs. Garcia-Bender, and Mrs. Stipes. The investigator did not have the opportunity of talking to these people.

It is the opinion of the investigator that all the observers are people of sound judgment and integrity and were not influenced by mass hysteria.

9. The weather conditions at the time of the sightings were described as clear with visibility of approximately twenty (20) miles. Clouds were described as alto-stratus. Heavy weather station 25 miles from the scene of the sighting recorded no cloud formation at the time as E-2. Sighting appeared to be situated near the second layer of clouds.

10. Investigations made on the night following the original sighting revealed no unusual circumstances that can adequately account for these sightings.
