Re-written Tully Report & News of a proposed Expedition in search of UFO information around Australia by John West, private researcher and freelance journalist . . .

In August of 1970, working in close collaboration with UFOIC-Sydney, I went to do a six months' pilot study in the Tully area.

This was to try and determine if it would be feasible to spend 2-3 years in this area at some future date, perhaps starting in March 1972.

I was, at that time, based in Cairns, spending days at many different locations.

I visited the home of Clare Noble in Tully, who I am sure needs no introduction to members of the UFOIC. Her experiences of some few years ago are now legion. I interviewed her over a period of two days and found her fluent and highly informative on the topic of UFO's. She gave me vivid accounts of the happenings that took place during the "flap" period 1965-66. Situated as she is on an elevated position nestling under the lofty Mt. Tyson, the location is ideal. As I stood on her patio my eyes traversed the top of the range. Here, not very long ago, lights could be seen moving along backwards and forwards, up and down, as if searching for something. Clare told me that during the "flap" period of 1965 it was possible to go out on her patio any clear night and see at least two or three of these light sources moving along the ranges. Clare Noble has a unique story to tell, and my impression was that she should have had much more publicity than she in fact got during that particular period when many most unusual happenings occurred in and around Tully. Unfortunately, my visit was all

too brief, but I intend spending more time talking to Clare in the not too distant future.

I moved on to the Pennisi cane farm and the renowned Horse-shoe Lagoon. I met Mr. Pennisi's son upon arrival - a down-to-earth young man in his early twenties, he soon produced many cuttings and photos that related to UFO nests that caused such controversy. At the time of this happening, he told me, he was away and I got the distinct impression that he has a very open mind on the subject and perhaps understandably a little tired of the incessant pilgrimage of sightseers. He kindly drove me the three-quarters of a mile to the lagoon and of course nothing of interest is to be seen now. He pointed out the exact location of the landing site of the UFO's and also indicated the tree that a cine camera had been fixed

LETTER received from member, John D. Laker, RMB 414, Yarrol Road, Kootingal, N.S.W., 2354. 31/7/71.

I have read with great interest your *Newsletter No. 31*. The report by Mr. F. Wilks on Burragorang Valley is interesting, but why does he not finish the account by detailing the phenomena witnessed by Barry French? All too often today we read UFO accounts that make half-statements and leave the reader, as it were, hanging in mid-air wondering whether to believe the article or not. John S. Keel is a good example of a writer who makes mysterious statements that somehow he never quite explains. One wonders at times if Ufologists are trying to keep real or fancied facts to themselves rather than the direct contrary, which should be the widest possible diffusion of information. I am afraid that Mr. Wilks in his article *Ufologists Awake!* is doing this. He makes mysterious mention of explosion reports, plus "a few things we can't openly discuss at this time." Why?? Shouldn't the members be advised through the *Newsletter* of facts as they come to hand? He is in error if he supposes his voice is the only one to "speak out." Ufologists all over the world continue to press on in their investigations. We have seen these quiet times before, and quite likely the pattern will continue. The Albury photo was not of a UFO and it is a pity that as a result, two conflicting reports appeared in the same edition. As I am an intense student of the UFO phenomena since 1958 I have been repeatedly struck by the lack of objective reporting in the periodicals published by organisations similar to ours, but I am pleased that so far we have mostly avoided this pitfall. One final comment; I notice that the *Newsletter* seems to be dealing less and less with the world scene. With the amount of information coming in from overseas, why not put it back where it once stood: a factual report on UFO happenings everywhere?

Excerpt from Long Island Press, August 9th, 1971 :

There are strange craft flying the night skies over Long Island. Either that or a lot of sober-sounding people were seeing things Saturday night and last night. A hot night in August could put spots in front of anyone's eyes and summer has always been the "saucer" season, so the *Press* staff didn't go bananas when Sal D'Angelo of 132-21 81st Street, Ozone Park, telephoned to report a strange object flying low in the sky about 10.05 p.m. Sal said he and about eight other residents of Tudor Village saw the craft. It had a big dome with a rotating rim at the bottom and the rim had flashing red and white lights. In short order more telephone reports of an almost identical sighting came in from a woman at 127th Street and 97th Avenue, Richmond Hill, another woman at 75 Maplewood Street, West Hempstead and two more women in Jamaica. The next call came from Carmine Venticini of Laurelton. He said he and several others saw the object flying very low between 229th and 225th Streets and 138th and 139th Avenue. He said the dome had a red light and there were revolving lights below it. All this induced one veteran editor to hike to the roof of the *Press* building for some personal observations. All I saw, he later said, was a big fat full Moon. Late last night William Honey of Springfield Gardens phoned to say he and his wife and children had seen "it" at 10.55 p.m. in the Atlantic Avenue and Pacific Street area of Brooklyn. Honey said it had a green light on top, red on the bottom, and eight to ten strings of white lights on the bottom in a plane parallel to the Earth. He tried to follow it in his car but lost it behind a building. Neither the regular police nor the Port Authority police at the airports knew anything about it. All the callers sounded sober and intelligent. — SO WHAT WAS UP THERE ?????

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John Fairfax while crossing the Atlantic in a row boat saw some UFO's. He says:

It was about 11 p.m. and I was rowing peacefully in the quiet night without a moon. All of a sudden these bright objects appeared on the horizon. It was hard to tell how far off they were, but they looked as big as lampposts. I remembered lighting a cigarette, and then suddenly going off in a daze, I felt like a stranger, as if I'd been hypnotised by those lights, and something kept asking me to leave and go away, and I kept saying: "No, I don't want to." Then I snapped out of it because the cigarette had burned my hand. I wasn't seeing things; I wrote it all down clearly in the log.

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Planetarium Plymouth. Extracts from article in Jena Review. Special Fair Issue, 1971.

Of the four buildings of the new Nautical College in Plymouth, the Planetarium is attracting greatest attention. Captain R.G. Hughes, the Head of the Nautical Department at the College, suggested in 1963 to acquire such a complex instrument and to accommodate it in a separate building. The optical instrument manufactured by VEB Carl Zeiss JENA is basically a projector which, with altogether 31 objectives, projects the 5000 stars, which are visible to the naked eye on the inside of the 8m diameter dome, which then has the appearance of the nocturnal sky. Other projectors show the moon in all its phases, furthermore the planets, the Milky Way, the constellations and the orbits of the satellites.

The viewers, whose number is limited to 76, regard this realistic nocturnal sky from two rows of specially made seats placed below the cupola in complete darkness and in an air-conditioned atmosphere. The instrument is a sophisticated and effective aid for the teaching in nautical astronomy for the approximately 1000 students passing through the Nautical College each year. . . Complicated astronomical concepts are shown with ease and elegance in a matter of seconds. Although the didactic value of the planetarium is enormous, it is nevertheless an equally great event to see the beauty of the sky above you . . .

NICAP to show in London (U.K.) Photo Fair: Exhibit to focus on Photographic Analysis

An unusually interesting opportunity has been extended to NICAP to participate in an international exhibition on photography. Set to be held this summer at the Institute of Contemporary Arts in London, England, the exhibition is entitled *Unlikely Photography* and will seek "to demonstrate those scientifically based extensions of photography which are new, radical, or unexpected."

NICAP's entry in the show will be an exhibit on the analysis of UFO photographs. The exhibit will be based on an actual case from NICAP files and will illustrate some of the techniques used by NICAP's photographic analysts to determine whether a picture supports or refutes the related sighting report from the photographer.

The title of the exhibit will be "Getting it all together: Analyzing the Unlikeliest of Photographic Subjects: UFO's."

NICAP was invited to appear in the show because one of the 3 basic subject areas to be featured is "Photographic misrepresentations and distortions; photographs which show things that do not exist or which contradict the truth in a meaningful way."

The NICAP exhibit will be prepared and shipped to England this month. Expected to be on hand to assist with its operation are members of NICAP's European Subcommittee No. 1, chaired by London hotel executive Julian Hennessey.

UFO Sighting made by Donald L. Cline, APRO Field Investigator and Western Australia Liaison Officer for Sydney UFOIC — 11th September 1971; 2015 hrs W.A. Time.

Observed brilliant white light through windscreen of vehicle as I pulled up at the intersection of Helena Valley Road and Midland Road, approximately 10 miles ENE of downtown Perth. According to measurements taken later, object first became visible to me as it descended below the roofline of my vehicle, which would have been approximately 30° above the horizon, at an azimuth of 230°. (Where hereinafter mentioned, the word 'descent' refers to the apparent descent of the light toward the horizon — it is unknown if this was a true descent or an effect produced by the object as it moved away from my position at a phenomenally high speed. At no time, however, did the light diminish in its brilliance as would indicate increasing distance.) The light 'descended' to approximately 20° above the horizon, stopped, hovered a few seconds, then proceeded in a northerly direction to 240° azimuth.

Immediately after first observing the object I pulled around the corner and stopped, then viewing the object through my open side window. I observed the object with 7 x 50 binoculars from the time it hovered until it passed from view. I was unable to discern any navigation lights, appendages, exhaust, trail, or anything other than a brilliant white point of light much brighter and whiter than any of the planets visible at this time of year even on a very clear night. Just prior to vanishing from sight, the object appeared to perform a minor zig-zag in course.

**Extract from letter from Mr. J. Burfitt,
8 Griffiths Avenue, West Ryde, NSW, 2114.
Dated August 24th, 1971.**

... For the past six years I have been employed as a security patrolman. This of course means that I work mainly at night. For many years I have been interested in the subject of UFO's and I often look up at the sky while I am working, in the hope of seeing something. I'm certain you will be interested in an experience I had a few nights ago. On Thursday night, 5th August, at exactly 11.40 p.m., I was stopped at traffic lights. I had a good view of the Northern Sky through the windscreen. It has been raining and there was some thin cloud about. The sky immediately in front of me was clear and I could see some stars. Suddenly I noticed a very bright white light and I knew immediately it was not a star. It was about one-eighth to one-quarter the size of the full moon. It was not a steady light nor was it blinking on and off, but rather it had the appearance of a flare — that is, it was sparkling brilliantly and shimmering. I also noticed that it was moving slowly in a south-easterly direction and as it moved along, it would slowly fade to the size of a pinpoint of light and then slowly brighten again to its original size, taking about 10 to 15 seconds to go through the cycle. Suddenly, a small white light dropped from the first light and as it fell, it grew in size and by the time it had stopped falling it had grown to the same size and brightness of the original, the distance between them was roughly 5-6 times the diameter of the lights. After 5 to 10 seconds, the second light began to fade slowly and then went out, leaving the original light, which continued to move slowly in my direction. A few seconds later, another light fell and behaved exactly like the first — growing in size, and floating suspended for a few seconds and then fading. In all 3-4 lights fell from the first light. I'm not certain of the number, because by this time the traffic lights had changed and I was trying to drive to a parking spot to get a better look and watch the behaviour of the lights at the same time. By the time I was able to stop the car and get out, the original light was directly above me, still as brilliant as before, but as I watched it began to fade and finally went out. I waited for a few minutes, but it did not re-appear. The entire sighting lasted between a minute and a minute-and-a-half. Finally, I would like to add I had the impression that there was no solid body behind the light. . .

This investigator then proceeded immediately to a telephone and rang Perth International Airport Operations, who contacted the tower and ascertained that there were no aircraft in the vicinity at the time of the sighting, and that they did not observe the object. Perth Airport is in a direct line from the position from where I observed the object to where the object passed below the horizon at 240° azimuth.

The distance from my position to the object appeared to be only a few miles, but could have been considerably further out over the Indian Ocean. This investigator proceeded to Jandakot Airport, several miles further toward the coast and slightly south of the objects path, and ascertained that Tower Facilities were not in operation after sunset. The speed of the object was such that if it were an aircraft it would have had to be a jet fighter in a diving descent, and if so would not have landed at Jandakot without tower control in any event.

In the vehicle with me at the time of the sighting was my wife, Persis C. Cline, who also observed the object and confirmed my observation independently as to the flight path and manoeuvres of the object.

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Letter from Mrs. R. Stubbs, Sydney, 1.8.71.

My husband has spoken to you by phone about the UFO we both saw last Tuesday night, 27.7.71, at 10.55 p.m. We were out walking along Edgecliff Boulevard when I first sighted two light trails with a flattened ball shape in front travelling very fast. There was time to say "Quick, look up there" and for my husband to see it for 3 seconds. His description is:- Sighted light moving 'North to South', elevation 30°, disappeared behind cloud about the western (lower) pointer to the Southern Cross. White/blue light travelling in a low and parallel to horizon, trailing reddish tail of light. I thought it higher than that, about 60°. What stands out was the large flattened ball shape, trailing 2 streams of light. The speed which it travelled across the sky and the absolute brilliance of the streams of light. I would be more than interested to know if other people saw it that night and same time. Also, if you picked it up on your magnetic field gadget (since seen on TV). My husband and I go for a walk every night, but have never seen anything like this before. Hoping this is of some use, I look forward to a reply . . .

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Excerpts from letter from Mr. Paul Litchfield, Flat 3, 2 Belmore St., Burwood, NSW, 2134. (6.6.71.)

I would like to tell you about a sighting of two objects which I believe were UFO's. I was walking down Albert Street, Strathfield, NSW, towards Strathfield Station at about 6 p.m. on 22nd May, 1969, when I noticed a long cigar-shaped silver coloured object on my left about 1000 ft. high. The length was about the size of a 10c. piece. The object was moving towards the station. Just before reaching it the object made a sharp turn towards the left, where it made a half-circle until it was parallel to Albert Street but going in the opposite direction. The object stopped just above Parramatta Road — I believe, I can't be sure, opposite the station. There it was joined by another object which was golden in colour, disc-shaped and approx. one-third the size of the silver cigar. This golden disc came from the direction of Homebush Station, until it reached the cigar. The two UFO's remained stationary at the same height, approx. 1000 ft., for three minutes. Then both craft banked to the right and disappeared into the sky at a tremendous speed. During all this time there was no apparent noise from these objects — though probably if there was any noise it would have been drowned out by the traffic and trains.

This was not the first sighting of a strange object in the sky. The first was on 22.9.68, when my mother and I made the sighting. It was of a very bright white light with a blue halo round it. This object was clearly visible for about two hours on this date and for the following two months. (*Presume he means same DATE on following two months? — Ed.*) After a period of two hours the object just rose into the sky and disappeared. The object always appeared about 7.30 - 9.30. My mother left a record of this sighting in a note-book which we still have.

Letter from Mr. P.G. Hebron, 80 Dora Street, Blacktown, 2148. Dated 12.8.71.

This is an account of the sighting of two UFO's by my two brothers and I on the night of 11th August, 1971. Before I go into details of what we saw, I would like to point out the fact that I am an aircraft engineer and that what I saw was definitely not an aircraft or rather two aircraft as we know them. At 10.50 p.m. my brothers Philip (21) and Peter (14) were getting into the car after leaving the Blacktown Bowl. I noticed a light in the sky which was moving towards us from the east

Sighting report, Maroubra, NSW, Sep. 1971.

Investigating officers Martin Drawbridge and Barry French interviewed three nurses from Maroubra who reported sighting an object over Coogee Bay between 2 and 2.15 p.m. on Tuesday, 14th September, 1971.

It was a round sphere-like object, orange red in colour, changing to white and occasionally flashing as if reflecting the sun's rays. It travelled in a SE direction and disappeared behind cloud cover.

After a thorough check by the officers first with the Bureau of Meteorology, then with the Department of Aviation Services at Mascot, it was identified as a balloon released from Williamtown Air Base.

The balloon had a reflective device underneath for tracking purposes and was orange in colour. Normally it would have been released at 9 a.m. but was late. Northerly winds brought about its path to Coogee Bay.

travelling in a westerly direction. It was just above the 2-storey building roof line on the opposite side of the road. It resembled the same effect as a high beam car headlight from about 100 yards off, which made it at an angle of about 30° elevation. It was moving at a considerable speed and appeared to be at about 2 to 3000 ft. up. By this time I had brought it to the attention of my brothers, the younger of whom saw a second light appearing over the roof line. They were about 10 seconds between each other. We disregarded them momentarily and drove away from the Bowl, travelling towards them. It was then that they really caught my curiosity and I told my brother to stop the car. Both UFO's had begun to move erratically. It is hard for me to describe this so I shall try to depict it by a diagram.

This lasted a matter of seconds before they resumed level flights. We made for the nearest phone booth, where I acquired your number from the Sydney District Number Service. It took about 5 minutes to raise your wife (apologise for me) after which she asked me to put in this written report. A night flying aircraft is easily identifiable by flashing anti-collision beacons on top and bottom and starboard (green) and port (red) wing tip navigation lights. These did not display these and also an aircraft doesn't appear as a bright sharp light. There was no engine noise accompanying them as they passed over, which immediately cuts out aircraft. I hope this account is of some value to you in your investigations.

However, she does know that Moseley is wrong in his attempts to debunk Adamski and since Adamski has 'passed on' . . . who else will speak up for him. Laura through the years, finding herself not written up, even in saucer magazines, because she supported Adamski, will find herself vindicated, one of these days. Laura has had the MIB call her and knows they were not Barker or Moseley. That much she can say for sure!! Otherwise she does not know.

to. This was triggered by an electronic device and the resultant film was the subject of much discussion. This has been fully related in a previous *Newsletter*. I took a few shots of the area for the record and was glad to be rid of the thousands of mosquitoes upon leaving. I think it would be well worth while spending some time in this particular location and a prolonged stake-out is on my agenda for the future.

I interviewed many people in Cairns, mostly as a direct result of several paragraphs in the local Cairns *Post* newspaper. Sightings are still going on, in the higher ground, and on the more remote beaches and I got more than one account of an "Abominable Snowman" like creature seen in the Kamerunga area, a few miles out of Cairns. I formed the opinion that a prolonged stay in this general area would well prove to be a bonanza and towards this end I have formed plans to set out in November of this year and extend the investigation to an "around Australia" project. This will commence from Sydney and follow mainly Highway One, passing through the most interesting country as far as UFO's are concerned. Plans are made to spend many days at such places as Mt. Gambier, S.A., around Perth and right through the heart of the Kimberley Range in the far north of W.A., then cutting down to Alice Springs and across Queensland to Cairns. I will be accompanied by an assistant and we will be travelling in a four wheel drive vehicle, carrying some elaborate camera equipment and other detection devices.

The object of this particular phase of the investigation will be to collect as much data, new and not so new, and try to obtain some clear close up pictures of the UFO phenomena. We will be recording on tape some of the more interesting interviews with people who have had recent sightings. The investigation has been given the name of UFO-Shadow and we will be displaying an emblem on both sides of the vehicle with a pertinent design. This we think will be of benefit to us as it will encourage some people to make contact with us, that perhaps we would otherwise miss out. Needless to say, UFOIC will be kept informed of movements and progress.

We are endeavouring to obtain sponsors and already we have several interested parties. However, the major finance I am supplying myself. With lots of luck, a little skill, plus the valuable help of all the many interested people in the various areas we may get some valuable photographic evidence. At worst we will perhaps have been instrumental in fostering added interest in the intensely absorbing subject of Ufology. This can only be good to the many UFO groups around Australia and in particular the UFOIC-Sydney.
