




MAJOR CHANGES ANNOUNCED AT CUFORN'S NOVEMBER MEETING

Five major changes were introduced at CUFORN's meeting on Saturday, November 14 at the home of your Editor-publisher.

Although there were only five members and one non-member present, much was accomplished. We started out by announcing that membership dues for 1982 will increase to \$10.00 per year. Part of the reason for this is the large increase in postage rates announced by the Canadian Post Office. Ordinary letters, for example, will cost 35 cents, up from the present 17 cents. We also have the expense of a change in our logo, which means that new stationery, membership cards, membership application forms, and sighting report forms will have to be printed.

Starting in February, meetings will be held every three months rather than every two months. Meetings will be held on Sunday afternoons until further notice. This may allow more members to attend. The next CUFORN meeting is set for Sunday, February 28, 1982 at the home of Alex Dobo, 92 Cameron Avenue, Toronto, at 1.30 p.m.

Participation will be the keynote, starting in 1982. Members will be going on excursions, tours, and skywatches. There will be trips to the McLaughlin Planetarium, the David Dunlap Observatory, and the Pickering Nuclear Power Station. Several skywatches will take place, with members split up into two teams linked by walkie-talkie in the Oakville and Vineland, Ontario areas. Observation points have been scouted in advance in a 'dry run' held in October, 1981. We will also set up a skywatch near the Nuclear Station, which has been noted for sightings in the past.

CUFORN meetings will feature a series of guest speakers starting in February. Our first speaker will be Pat de la Franier, CUFORN field investigator, who also acts in that capacity for MUFON. She is the Director of the Stratford UFO Team, or SUFORT. The topic at this writing is not definite. However, we are certain this will be a memorable meeting.

Future meetings will give members the chance to hear highlights from CUFORN Bulletins. In this way, all our members in the Toronto area will get an idea of what our out-of-town members are reading about the organization. Your Editor will read from selected sections of the Bulletin.

Four colour photographs taken in October, 1980, and February, 1981 were passed around at the meeting. These were taken by an American from Niagara Falls, New York, using a 35 mm camera with a 1000 mm lens. We intend to send one of these to an organization which does computer analysis of UFO photographs. We now have the addresses of three such organizations in the U.S.

Those present had a chance to look at photographs of night advertising airplanes taken both during the day on the ground and at night.

Another interesting part of the meeting was the playing of the tape recording of the two sessions of regressive hypnosis done in Toronto as part of the investigation of the only known abduction incident ever to take place in Toronto. A great deal of background hum in the original tape has been eliminated so members could hear it fairly easily. The hum originated with the psychiatrist's fluorescent lights in his office.

Your Editor also read aloud the section of the Field Investigators Manual on IFO's which were reported as CE1's. The CE2 IFO section will be read aloud at the February meeting.

Parts of the speech by member Bill Moore given at the APRO-UFO Ohio-1981 Convention were read to the members. A summary of the speech's highlights appears later in this issue.

We distributed the list of books available from Bill Moore which readers will remember from our October-November, 1981 issue. One member said he was interested in buying several of these books, and made a note of the address where he could order them. CUFORN gets a percentage of the profits from the sale of each book, thanks to Bill Moore.

CUFORN has set a minimum criterion for membership which is bringing us a high quality of member. However, prior to 1981, our standards were not as high as they are now. This, we feel, is part of the reason for the low attendance at meetings. We briefly went over CUFORN's membership rules at the meeting. Readers who would like to assist us in increasing our numbers both in Canada and the United States should read the following carefully, and when you meet someone who fills one or more of these minimums, get him or her to write to us for a membership application form:

CUFORN members must have one or more of these:

- (1) A minimum of five years of intensive research into the UFO phenomenon, including reading of at least 20 books on the subject.
- (2) Experience in an investigative capacity, such as insurance investigator, newspaper reporter, or police officer.
- (3) A university or college degree, preferably in a science or social science course.

UFO'S IN THE MEDIA

The CE 2 event which occurred at Dayton, Texas on the evening of December 29, 1980, was given major coverage by ABC-TV's That's Incredible on November 16, 1981 at 8 p.m.

The show featured interviews with Betty Cash, Vicki Landrum, and Colby Landrum, all of whom were exposed to a type of ionizing radiation, possibly in the microwave range, when they encountered a UFO during a drive towards their home late at night.

Although there was no time lapse, regressive hypnosis was used by Dr. R. Leo Sprinkle on the show to regress Vicki Landrum back to the time of the encounter. She was visibly and audibly affected as she described what was happening in her own words.

Project Visit's John Scheussler described the investigation for the viewers. The camera focussed on the site of the encounter. All the symptoms, both physiological and psychological, were mentioned. A complete description of the diamond-shaped object, brilliant yellow, and as large as a water tower, as well as the shapes of the 23 helicopters seen circling the object, were given prominence. Scheussler mentioned the denials by the U.S. Air Force that any helicopters were in the area. Scheussler, who is also Deputy Director of MUFON, mentioned that there were other people contacted who had seen the same object within an hour of the incident in the same area.

In summary, this was a balanced, objective segment which did not try to convince anyone that this was anything other than an unknown object. Nobody talked about little green men, for a change.

CUFORN has been unable to track down the source of two items witnessed on television recently. Perhaps our readers can let us know if they have further information.

Sometime during the week of November 27 through Dec.1, 1981, CTV's National News at 11 p.m. broadcast an item about the Soviet Union shooting down a UFO, near the border of a Scandinavian country. Perhaps, it was a story which had occurred years earlier and was mentioned in a book.

The second item supposedly was on CBS-TV's 6 p.m. newscast on either Friday December 4 or Saturday, December 5, 1981. It concerned a CE 1 which involved a regularly scheduled airline's plane which was followed on a flight path into the Los Angeles area in the hours near sundown. The teardrop-shaped object was the size of the airliner and was picked up on radar by the aircraft.

The newscast included an interview with the pilot who showed a drawing he had made of the object and a map of the sighting location. The news item ran for five minutes of the newscast. CUFORN's Larry Fenwick contacted all the news media including Broadcast News which monitors newscasts, and none of them recalled the item. We did not contact CBS News, as long distance phone calls are beyond CUFORN's financial means.

On the evenings of Thursday, May 13 and Thursday, May 20, ¹⁹⁸² the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's FM network show "Ideas" will present a two-part series on anti-gravity. We urge all our Canadian members to listen to these shows and to send us their comments on the show. We will print your letters in the next CUFORN Bulletin. (They will be on at 8.04 p.m.)

CUFORN'S BILL MOORE AMONGELEVEN SUPERB SPEAKERS HEARD AT UFOHIO '81

The Aerial Phenomena Research Organization sponsored UFOHIO '81, a symposium in Cleveland, Ohio this past summer. Bill Moore, our Southwestern U.S. member, field investigator, researcher, and lecturer, spoke about new evidence pertaining to the retrieval of the UFO at Roswell, New Mexico in July, 1947.

Those of you who have read The Roswell Incident will realize that there actually was a flying saucer retrieved. We note that those who have only heard about the book use the word "alleged" when referring to the incident. When an author has interviewed 69 individuals who testify as to the facts, there can be no doubt that the event actually happened. And when the book contains a close-up photograph of a piece of a UFO held up by an American military officer, that clinches it.

Moore told his audience several new items unearthed by him and Stanton Friedman during their investigation of the incident. After he gave a detailed description of the event, he said he had located a former U.S.A.F. major who had been ~~contacted~~ by a "Canadian radio station personality", in New Mexico. ~~The major admitted he had interviewed~~ Barney Barnett who had discovered the wreckage and dead alien bodies west of Socorro, New Mexico on the Plains of San Augustin. Moore said this part of the investigation is still incomplete, and the major has not yet consented to the use of his name.

Moore said that he is attempting to contact several persons whose names were given to him by a scientist. The scientist, who was at both Wright-Patterson AFB and Muroc AFB during the time of the retrieval, told Moore the crashed saucer was first examined by scientists and then the decision was made to ship it to Muroc. Muroc is now known as Edwards AFB, where the U.S. space shuttle landed.

In regard to the latter, a recent book entitled Space Shuttle, by David Onley of Mississauga, Ontario, was publicized on a local radio station in October, 1981. According to a second-hand source, Onley said that the design of the shuttle was partly based on the design of a UFO. Could that UFO have been the saucer retrieved at Roswell and San Augustin? All attempts to reach Onley have been fruitless, as his book was published in England, the publisher has no Canadian link, and Onley is not listed in the Mississauga telephone book, nor could the telephone operator tell us whether his number is unlisted. We do not know the name of the radio station as the listener did not pay attention to the name of the station.

Two speakers talked about their own experiences: Lt.Col. Lawrence Coyne, the helicopter pilot in the U.S. Air National Guard, whose 'copter had a CE2 near Cleveland, and Betty Hill, the famous abductee.

The highlight of the symposium was the speech by Dr. Robert F. Creegan, Ph.D., Professor of Philosophy, State University of New York, at Albany. He discussed the manner in which a less cultured society would perceive a more advanced civilization, in his speech entitled Old Magic and New.

Peter Van Arsdale, Ph.D., Professor of Anthropology, University of Denver, Colorado, addressed the audience on the Sociopsychological Aspects of UFO Research. He was followed by R. Leo Sprinkle, Professor and Director of Counselling and Testing, University of Wyoming, who spoke on UFO Activity and Human Consciousness.

Anatomy of a UFO Window was the title of a speech by Wayne Laporte, who described his own sighting over his home in Charlotte, North Carolina. Laporte is a professional engineer. His occupation naturally led him to investigate a possible relationship amongst local geological fault lines, geo-magnetic fields, former goldmining sites, and UFO sightings.

Stanton Friedman spoke on government involvement in the UFO field in his speech, UFO: The Cosmic Watergate. He is one of the most persuasive speakers in ufology and, as readers know, is the best known exponent of the ETH, or extra-terrestrial hypothesis. The perfect follow-up to his speech was the one by Jim Lorenzen, APRO's Director, whose speech was titled The Extra-Terrestrial Hypothesis: Completing the Jigsaw.

Art critic and veteran ufologist Earl Neff held the audience's attention with his presentation UFO Art through the Ages, while Peter Jordan elaborated on a possibly related phenomenon, cattle mutilations and mystery helicopters, in his talk, The Night Surgeons. He told the audience of his use of four psychics to 'read' slides of mutilated cattle, ground markings, and an unmarked helicopter. Each psychic gave a 'reading' of the slides without prior discussion with the others about the subject matter.

ACCENT WILL BE ON CANADIAN SPEAKERS AT MUFON SYMPOSIUM

Six speakers have agreed to address the crowd at the upcoming MUFON Symposium at Toronto's Westbury Hotel on the long week-end, July 2-4, 1982. Four of them are Canadian citizens, and one is a recent immigrant to Canada.

According to Symposium Organizer Henry McKay, Dr. J. Allen Hynek will speak in conjunction with Dr. George Owen and his wife Iris Owen of the University of Toronto. David Haisell, ufologist, author of The Missing Seven Hours, Director of UPIR, Inc. and Professor of Computer Studies at Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology in Rexdale, Ontario, will give listeners the latest information on Project UFOCAN and its interface with the first provisional international committee for UFO research. The major aim of the committee is to set up an international computer data bank to store UFO data for use by ufologists and scientists involved in UFO research.

We expect that one of the highlights of the Symposium will be the speech by Stanton Friedman. He will speak on the involvement of the Canadian government in the UFO field. Friedman immigrated in 1981 to Fredericton, New Brunswick, his wife's home town.

Another speaker who has confirmed his attendance is Arthur Bray, former RCAF pilot, and former Lt. Commander, Royal Canadian Navy. His topic will be Professionalism in Ufology, although this is a tentative title. Bray retired from the Navy in 1971, after serving 28 years. He was awarded the Centennial Medal for Service to Canada in 1967. He works in management for a non-profit organization in Ottawa.
