

# UFO PROOF PREVAILS AT MUFON SYMPOSIUM

One of the most dramatic bits of proof presented at MUFON's annual symposium was shown by veteran UFO writer-investigator Leonard Stringfield. His speech "Fatal Encounter at Fort Dix-McGuire; A Case Study" dealt with a Military Policeman who fired his .45 caliber pistol at a humanoid at Fort Dix, New Jersey, killing it.

Stringfield obtained and showed the attendees at his speech a copy of the U.S. Air Force Incident Complaint Form which states that the incident occurred.

The Symposium theme, UFOs: The Burden of Proof, was evident in the speeches, which were supplemented with documents and many slides.

Speakers and their speeches included Marge Christensen--"Shifting The Burden of Proof; George Fawcett--UFO Repetitions: A Challenge To Scientific Investigations; Stringfield's lecture; Peter Gersten--The Burden of Proof; John F. Schuessler--The Medical Evidence in UFO Cases; Ted Phillips--Physical Trace Landing Reports; The Case for UFOs?; William Moore--Crashed

Saucers: Evidence in The Search For Proof; Stanton T. Friedman--Flying Saucers, Noisy Negativists And Truth; David Webb--The Influence Of Hypnosis in The Investigation Of Abduction Cases; Budd Hopkins--The Evidence Supporting UFO Abduction Reports.

There were two well-attended panel discussions with question and answer periods. A good microphone allowed anyone with questions to address the panel.

Budd Hopkins also gave a workshop for field investigators. Continuous showing of UFO documentary films and video tapes took place using a large screen TV near the photo display area. Total attendance was in the 250-person range. One free lecture was given on the Friday night--Educating For Critical Consciousness, by Kenneth R. McLean. John Schroeder and Walt Andrus spoke to attendees, giving them a warm welcome to the proceedings.

A new feature-Breakfast With The Speakers proved very popular. Media coverage was sparse. A videotape was made of all speeches and is for sale to anyone.

# CUFORN LOOKS AT MUFON'S '85 MEETING





## CUFORN IN FSR FOOTNOTE

In a footnote to a three-part series in the May, 1985 issue of FSR, entitled "The Soria Abduction: Part II", by Antonio Ribera, CUFORN's work on such cases is mentioned, along with Budd Hopkins book, Missing Time.

It referred to the inability of hypno-therapists to get at deeply imbedded parts of the abduction experience—a hard core which resists probing.

Following a speech in Toronto by Major General George Keegan, former Chief of United States Air Force Intelligence on May 8, 1985, he had some comments about UFOS to make to your Editor.

We met at a wine and cheese reception at St. Hilda's Dining Hall at the University of Toronto after his speech at the Canadian Professors for Peace In The Middle East 1985 Annual Conference at Trinity College, which is part of the University.

I presented him with a copy of a pilfered telex from the USAF Office of Special Investigations in which Project Aquarius is mentioned. He asked what it was without looking at it. When told it had to do with UFOS, Keegan said, "I spent enough years in the Air Force to remember the 'Youfoes', (as he pronounced UFOS) I'm not going to get into that whole ball of wax again."

When offered my CUFORN calling card, the General said, "I'll take anything you have, as long as it doesn't have anything to do with UFOS."

I noted that when I mentioned the words "Project Aquarius" Keegan's eyes lit up and he turned his face away from mine.

His speech was presented in the George Ignatieff Theatre of the University. An announcement about it appeared in the Globe and Mail one week earlier.

# 'THE NEW UFO 'DEPRESSION'

Editorial by Lawrence J. Fenwick

Ever since the release of the motion picture "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" in late December, 1979, the numbers of UFO reports has dropped quite dramatically in North America, where the film had its greatest impact.

Was it a coincidence? I think it was more than just coincidence. There is something much more significant happening underneath it all. What we are experiencing is manipulation, pure and simple.

Given the overwhelming evidence in terms of statistics, we must assume that UFOs are not only real, but represent an extraterrestrial exploration of our planet. Taking that one step further, let us state that the humanoids are at least one million years in advance of us in evolutionary development. Their minds would be capable of manipulating ours en masse or individually at will.

If they are sure that the sightings have conditioned us to the reality of UFOs, the next step would be to get us used to their appearance, if not their motives. But this in itself poses a problem. We are frightened by their appearance in many cases. How should they present their appearance in a more

palatable form? The answer is to use the mass medium most suited, i.e., fictionalized encounters shown in motion pictures.

All they need to do is give the idea of making movies such as "Close Encounters" and "E.T." to a man by the name of Steven Spielberg. They did it by an indirect method. They implanted the idea in the minds of two of his closest associates in his early career. They suggest the idea to Spielberg and makes the films. Now all that is needed is to wait and see the impact the films make.

What happens is that people who have sightings and who have seen the films say to themselves: "Why should I report my sighting to anyone? UFOs are now "acceptable" in motion pictures. Most people believe they are real."

Even those who do report their sightings to the media don't see the report in print or on TV or radio. The newspapers are given an implanted idea: "UFO stories are so common. Why bother to print them any longer?"

So the sightings are there, The reports are not made or if they are, they're ignored. Yet the people are now conditioned to the sight of humanoids in a way which would not frighten them.

The question now remains: What do the humanoids have in store for us in the near future?

# UFOs And The Electronic Media

CUFORN member Bill Moore appeared on ABC-TV's Eye On Hollywood show on Friday, May 10, 1985 at 1 a.m.

The half-hour show is divided into two segments. He appeared on the first one and did a splendid job, assisted by a good director and camera crew, who hailed from KABC-TV in Hollywood.

The announcer began by saying that there would be interviews with UFO percipients. At that point an insert of part of an interview with a CEI observer was heard, followed by film footage from the New Zealand motion picture. Next came footage from Four Corners, U.S.A. at the intersection of the borders of Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Utah. This was run at regular speed and in slow motion.

The famous Catalina Island movie followed. This California movie was taken by professional photographer Leland Hanson. The final film was the Vancouver, B.C. one of December 15, 1981, taken by Hannah Roberts.

The Jimmy Carter sighting report form was shown on camera and astronaut Gordon Cooper's letter to the United Nations reporting his sightings when he was a test pilot in Europe. The last two photos were those from McMinnville, Oregon and Rouen, France, showing the basic similarities of the two UFOs.

The announcer broke in with the statement that the United States Air Force no longer investigates UFOs. A voice and film cut ensued with Bill Moore stating. "Wrong. Totally wrong. Completely ridiculous." Bill said ufologists "have all kinds of documentation to refute that "from the late '70's, early '80's."

Viewers were shown a government document about a military aircraft chase of a UFO in Peru.

The bulk of the segment concerned the Roswell crash-retrieval of 1947. A re-enactment was done with interviews with first-hand observers. Moore described the scene at intervals. The people interviewed on camera were Bill Brazel who described the fragments, Major Jesse Marcel, Captain Walter Haut & Frank Joyce of KOB-TV, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

A newspaper headline was displayed: "General Ramey Empties Roswell Saucer". Moore mentioned the recovery of bodies from the craft. He showed a photo, originally published by Leonard Stringfield, of part of one body, although he failed to credit Stringfield for the photo. The show ended with three interviews with UFO observers in the Los Angeles area.

### GLARING OMISSION

The Globe and Mail of June 8 in its TV Guide section noted that the film, "The Disappearance of Flight 412" was on that night at 8. The description of the film made no mention of the fact that the film dealt with UFOs.

### Strange encounter of a Soviet-UFO kind

**M**OSCOW (AP) — Pilots and passengers aboard a Soviet airliner have reported encountering a starlike ufo which they said escorted them to their destination, a Soviet newspaper reported yesterday.

The newspaper Trud quoted a Soviet scientist who specializes in unidentified flying objects as saying the occurrence was "undoubtedly abnormal."

An Aeroflot domestic flight was approaching Minsk when "what appeared to be a large, unblinking star suddenly shed a thin ray of light which fell plumb down on the ground" from an altitude of 25 to 30 miles, the newspaper said. The date of the flight was not given.

The UFO positioned itself beside the plane at an altitude of 33,000 feet and accompanied it for the rest of the flight "like an honorary escort," the newspaper quoted one of the pilots as saying.

### Lights fantastic

On a night flight from Rostov to Tallinn, Aeroflot 8352 had a strange encounter of the unidentified flying object kind — essentially a display of lights that switched from yellow to white to green. Traffic lights? A heavenly portent of progress on the arms talks? Aurora borealis?

There has been some inconclusive speculation in the Soviet press, enco raged by reports that ground controllers also observed a moving object near the plane. When they dig the missing pieces of that erratic cruise missile out of a frozen lake in Finland, we'd like to know the color of its lights.

**'Strange' twinkling in Calgary wasn't UFO, stargazer says**

CALGARY (CP) — A police officer laughs at suggestions the strange twinkling lights seen in the sky near Calgary early yesterday were unidentified flying objects.

"I've seen a few stars in my day," said Staff Sergeant Tom Barrow, 43. "I saw a few more last night."

Police received the first report of the strange lights about 1.30 a.m. Barrow decided to investigate for himself when two dozen calls were received in the next couple of hours.

Officials at Calgary International Airport confirmed sightings "of strange phenomena" but said there were no blips on their radar screens.

Barrow does not buy witnesses' suggestions that the lights were from balloons, airplanes or craft from another planet.

He was one of about 20 city policemen who saw the lights in the sky north of Calgary. Descriptions of them included "weird blinking stars" and "oblong discs with three levels of spinning lights."

Gene Milone, an astronomer and physics professor, agreed. He said the lights probably were the planets Venus or Jupiter and the star Sirius.

# Interviewing/Interrogation

## An Easier Way That Works

The following are excerpts from the article which may be of use to UFO field investigators.

### INTERVIEW

Conduct the interview as soon as possible after the incident as possible because a person's memory fades quickly. Attempt to gather some background information about the person. Is the person one who has in the past attempted a hoax?

Never do an interview if you are not mentally or physically up to it. Before you start the interview, see to the emotional and physical needs of the interviewee. Calm the excited or emotionally upset witness.

You can do this by a casual, calm conversation for a short time about something other than the facts you want to obtain. Offer them a cup of coffee or if you are not at their residence, show them where the washroom is. This will also eliminate interruptions during the interview.

Select a place where you will

have some privacy, a place away from the telephone and anything else that will distract the interviewee's attention.

Eliminate any physical barriers between you and the person, such as a desk, table, or even distance. Seat the person so that you are either facing them straight on or at a 90 degree angle; in this way you can observe them completely and pick up the person's 'body language.'

Regulate your appearance so that you are at the level of the person you are going to interview. If the person is dressed casually and you are wearing a suit, remove your tie and suit jacket. If there are going to be two interviewers, only one should ask questions at a time. If one thinks of questions to ask, make a note of them and wait until the first interviewer is finished.

Get to know the interviewee and build a rapport with him or her. Let them feel they have some control over the interview, even if only slightly. For example, when you have built your rapport with them, tell them you would like to take a few notes if it doesn't bother them too much, and then just casually take your pad and pencil.

If they have told you the same part of the story two or three times, let them: it a way for them to get all the information out and to jog their memory. Every time they tell the story they usually add some further details.

Do not let them get too far off the track, however. If they begin to wander too far astray, guide them back by asking a couple of direct questions; otherwise, let them tell the story in a narrative form at their own speed.

### Keeping out of touch

Regarding your article on diminishing hope about UFOs and intelligent life in the universe (Are UFOs Bunk? — Feb. 13):

How can scientists so blithely say that "if intelligent aliens were visiting the earth, they would have contacted us by now"? Imagine the historians half a millennium from now discussing the twentieth century. They would be remarking on the lives of people who, merely by living in this century, participated in such events as the two World Wars, the Holocaust, South Africa and the arms race. How savage and barbaric we will appear to them. (One hopes, at least, for some improvement.)

Why (on earth) would an intelligent species from elsewhere in the universe want to contact such a race? If I were an alien, I wouldn't want earthlings to know anything about me.

To get the most out of an interview, listen to the person and paraphrase back to them what you think they said. In this way you will be sure you have the correct information. Never use leading questions, sarcasm, interruptions, and rapid-fire questions. End the interview in a friendly and courteous manner. Summarize the conversation and ask the interviewee if there is anything else they would like to add or emphasize. Ask them if they can think of anyone who may have additional information.

## *Air fare was offered, he says*

I am anxious to correct an error involving myself contained in a letter from Stanton Friedman published in your Feb. 23 issue which only recently has come to my attention. Friedman, challenging a statement earlier made by columnist Henry Gordon, said: "Phil Klass did not offer to pay my expenses from California to convince a Congressional committee about the Cosmic (UFO) Watergate."

Friedman's recollections are flawed. On Dec. 19, 1975, he and I were interviewed on San Francisco radio station KNBR during the period when two Congressional committees were holding hearings on alleged abuses of the Central Intelligence Agency. My recollections are based on a tape recording of the interview.

After Friedman made the claim that the CIA was engaged in a UFO coverup, I said to him: "Stanton, if you have any evidence of a UFO coverup, please come to Washington. If you will agree to present it to the Church and Pike Committees, I'll even underwrite your air fare — if you come exclusively for that purpose. I'll underwrite your tourist-class fare if

you'll agree to make a presentation to them, and if they agree to hear you. I will underwrite your air fare. I think it is that important to the nation — IF there is a UFO coverup as you charge."

Friedman never opted to accept my generous offer, as Gordon accurately reported.
