

# What Does Our Government Know About UFOs?

## A RESEARCH UPDATE BY WILLIAM L. MOORE

Over the past 6½ years, through aggressive means, I and ultimately several close associates have succeeded in establishing a cooperative relationship with a number of well-placed contacts within the American intelligence community.

As a result, certain information has been made available which appears to pertain directly to our government's continuing involvement with the UFO phenomenon. Among this is both hard and filmed copies of documentation, several videotaped interviews and a number of useful leads which have enabled us to independently uncover additional supporting information.

The information contained in the following pages corroborates information provided us verbally during meetings with these contacts. Assurances have been given that additional information can be made available to us over the next several months.

This information is being shared with the UFO community, and through them, ultimately, with the public at large, in anticipation that the resulting

controversy will prove useful in furthering the authenticity of its contents and also in the hope that it will assist in setting the stage for additional information to come.

Recently a number of rumors have circulated within the UFO community to the effect that some sort of major release of information on UFOs is imminent and that I am intimately involved with it. At this time it is only possible to confirm that a careful effort is currently underway which, if successful, could bring about the release of additional information through a major news media source in the near future. This project has presently reached a delicate juncture and no further specifics can be provided at this time.



The following letter is a copy of an original sent to CUFORN recently. Unfortunately, due to a dire need to reorganize our files, we cannot find out who sent us the letter. All that we can recall is that the person who sent it was very interested in exchanging information on Wilbert Smith, one of the pioneers in UFO research in Canada. Smith was an engineer with the Canadian Government's Department of Transport. He ended his career as the Superintendent of Radio Regulations Engineering for the Department. He died in 1962 after contracting cancer. We do not know who Mr. Caswell was.

# Is abduction experience psychological or real?

**S**EVERAL months ago, CBC producer David Cherniack asked me to be part of a team of experts he was gathering for the filming of an episode of Man Alive, a long-running television series hosted by Roy Bonisteel. We were to spend three days at the Bonisteel home near Trenton to discuss recent developments in UFO research.

Cherniack had read some of my writings on the UFO phenomenon and thought I would be interested in the project. I told him that I had quit doing active UFO research years ago, and what investigating I had done was generally limited to cases with possible astronomical interpretations. Still, he wanted me to be involved. I went to the session expecting nothing new, but what I heard and saw was surprising and bizarre, and ultimately deeply disturbing.

UFO researcher Budd Hopkins described his extensive interviews with dozens of "abductees," people who claim they have been taken — against their will — into a flying saucer and examined by alien creatures. On the face of it, Hopkins said, this stuff sounds like the pages of the supermarket tabloids. But the "victims," as he called them, are not publicity seekers, they are otherwise normal people with no history of psychosis or mental disease. Hypnosis was often required to pull details of the abductions from suppressed memories.

Abductees describe the creatures in significant detail in very similar terms — about four feet tall with grayish skin, large heads and huge black eyes — and report undergoing the same types of physical examination. "The amazing part is the similarity of detail in these accounts," Hopkins said, "there is no known explanation for it." Later in the session, I witnessed a hypnosis of an abductee conducted on-camera.

Hopkins maintains that the abduction reports "either represent some new and nearly universal psychological phenomenon, or they represent honest attempts to report real events."

You can decide for yourself. The Man Alive show is being rebroadcast on CBC television Tuesday evening (Dec. 29) at 9:30. It was first aired last April. Producer Cherniack said that particular program received the highest audience rating of any episode in the 20-year history of Man Alive.

When Hopkins presented his findings to me and the others gathered for the filming, I was bowled over. I described it at the time as "the worst possible scenario," referring to my deep disappointment that this apparent black hole of imponderables was where UFO research had finally wound up.


Due to prior commitments I had to leave the Man Alive filming early, but I have since read Hopkins' books (Intruders and Missing Time) as well as discussed the phenomenon with other researchers. Journalist Whitley Strieber, an abductee who wrote a book about his experiences, says he "by no means accepts the extraterrestrial explanation." Neither do I.

I am convinced the abduction phenomenon has nothing to do with intelligences from other planets. Until someone retrieves one of the tiny alien homing devices said to be implanted in some of the abductees, I'm not persuaded that it is a physical occurrence at all.

In my opinion the explanation of the abduction phenomenon is entirely earthbound and generated by human, not alien minds. I do have sympathy for the abductees who seem to suffer very real stress and torment, but this is not how we are going to find out about our cosmic cousins.

It's back to the telescope for me.

# Editorial Comment; Abductee's Implant Found By Machine

There are three comments to be made about the article on the preceding page.

First of all, it is very difficult for anyone to say that they have the complete picture of a particular bit of research unless their own part in it is complete. Astro-nomer Terence Dickinson makes a judgement about the validity of abduction cases but admits he did not participate in the entire filming of the "Man Alive" TV show. He had to leave early. He says he had prior commitments. If he had prior commitments, he should never have consented to be part of the show. This shows lack of good judgement on his part.

He states that the only good evidence for the extra-terrestrial origin of the abduction incidents would be the removal of one of the implants from an abductee.

If the implants are doing no harm, why should an abductee want to have it removed? Just to satisfy the scientists? For many abductees, that may not be sufficient reason to undergo minor surgery. The main reason would be that it is rather unlikely that an abductee would ask a surgeon to remove something which is causing them no pain or discomfort. Surely, Dickinson is aware of the impossibility of this occurring unless the person is in pain. Medical insurance would not cover the cost of the operation. Is Dickinson so far removed from the everyday world in his ivory tower that he cannot see this?

One abductee is trying to find out what has been implanted, however. She is CUFORN member and abductee Betty Stewart Dagenais.

She is hesitant about having it removed permanently, and says, if it is removed for study by scientists, she would want it reimplanted. She says the aliens put it there for a purpose and she says she wants to collaborate with them in that endeavour, whatever it may be.

Betty has given CUFORN a full-colour print-out of the results of a scan by a device which is heat-seeking. The normal ear is shown on one print-out, another shows her right ear with no abnormalities, and her left ear where one can plainly see an oblong shape with four prong-like spokes sticking out.

When you touch the left ear, you can feel cartilage which has grown over the implant, which itself is very small, measuring one 1.5 by 1 mm., smaller than a BB pellet. This corresponds exactly to the descriptions given by abductees in many cases.

Investigation of Betty's abduction has included regressive hypnosis by two hypnotists, one of whom includes Dr. David Gotlib, CUFORN's consultant in hypnosis. Further results will be reported in future issues of the Bulletin.

Meanwhile, Editor Larry Fenwick checked her ears for magnetism by placing a compass next to each ear. The left ear deflect the compass by one degree, whereas the right ear did not deflect the compass.

Betty is getting an x-ray of her ear done on January 29. We hope to publish the results of this soon.

# Portuguese UFO Reports Put Into Computer Catalogue

PORTUCAT is a catalog of reports based on the observation of possible UFOs over Portugal. So far, it contains more than 270 reports.

Its computerized structure is supported by an IBM XT with a CPU clock speed of 6.66 Mhz and a Database type of software.

The Database allows the definition of 3,200 fields per report, each one with a maximum size of 61,000 bytes, supplying almost 30,000 reports per data file. Its versatility is based on the possibility of using customized features.

PORTUCAT stores a short description of each reported case, along with its basic headings such as date, type of possible object, number of witnesses, their names, source of information, and others.

PORTUCAT does not pretend to be a catalog based on final analyses of the filed cases and therefore it does not carry any evaluation or classification, just a verbal comment based on the amount of stored data relative to each case.

Thanks to the flexibility of the Database, PORTUCAT is not a static catalog. Several changes in the design have been made in 1987; the idea is to create a basic structure identical to the standardized "MAYBECAT" created by the late Dr. Hynek and Dr. Willy Smith, with additional bits of information. Cases

are updated according to the information that is collected from Portugal and other countries. 500 more cases will be added in the near future.

PORTUCAT facilitates the tracking of specific cases and patterns translated into graphs which give a better visual description of the subject, but the basic concept is to split the data into bits of information and establish patterns as an auxiliary tool for further research.

PORTUCAT would not exist without the valuable collaboration of Mr. Larry Fenwick, CUFORN Co-Director (Canadian UFO Research Network), Mr. Joaquim Fernandes, CNIFO Director (Comissao Nacional de Investigacao do Fenomeno Ovni), and Dr. Willy Smith of the UNICAT Project.


## **Why reports are filed, unpublished**









A. Ribera's investigation concluded that the crowd that stood in a field at Fatima, a small village in the district of Leiria, some 82 miles north of Lisbon, on October 13, 1917, was waiting there for a miracle, because three children had been assured such an event would take place after a number of meetings with an "Entity" that came from the sky in a globe of light.

The witnesses were shepherds: Lucia, aged 10, and her cousins Francisco Marto and Jacinta Marto, aged 9 and 7.

Among the crowd was Professor Almeida Garrett, of Coimbra University, a scientist, who described the phenomenon in the following terms:

"It was raining hard, and the rain trickled down everyone's clothes. Suddenly, the sun shone through the dense cloud which covered it.

Everybody looked in its direction. It was not dazzling. I don't think that it could be compared to a dull silver disc, as someone said later in Fatima. No. It rather possessed a clear, changing brightness, which one could compare to a pearl. It looked like a polished wheel. This is not poetry. My eyes have seen it. This clear shaped disc suddenly began turning. It rotated with increasing speed".

## **Graphic Artist Has Close Encounter With Brown Triangular UFO Near Toronto; Object Flew At Roof-top Elevation**

A low-flying mysterious triangular-shaped object was seen by Jackie Cosford, 32, of Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada, at 12.45 a.m., on December 26, 1987.

Jackie is an amateur astronomer and full-time graphic artist. She was out in front of her house in the suburb of Toronto when she noticed the object at roof-top level heading toward her house from the northwest. She said it was at a 50 foot elevation, moving at 30 mph, and

she observed it for between one and two minutes. It came within a few feet of the roof-top of her house, and was completely silent. She estimated its diameter at 15 feet. The street lights reflected off its middle and sides as well as the lower surface. She said it appeared to be brown and was a perfect triangle.

It was a clear night with a few wispy clouds, the moon was visible, and the temperature was -3 degrees Celcius (31 F). She said time seemed to stand still.

She was frightened after she realized that it couldn't be a kite or aircraft. She walked into the house and told her husband, David what she had seen.

She said to him "You won't believe what I've just seen." She said she could not understand why an object could move so slowly and yet take one to two minutes to travel a short distance. It disappeared from view as it crossed over her house's roof. Neither she nor her husband went to the back windows to see if they could still see the object. Jackie said she did not know why neither of them did this.

Jackie said the evening was perfect for viewing the stars. There was no wind. She also mentioned that everything seemed to turn quiet outside during the sighting. She was puzzled even more so when, as the object got closer she could not hear or feel it creating any wind in the area.

As far as she knows, there were no neighbours out at that hour, although she has not asked around to see if there were any other observers. CUFORN has not questioned the neighbours about this event, as it is highly unlikely that there would be other observers in the area at that hour of the morning.

The area is entirely residential, all of it being fairly new houses. Jackie said she mentioned the incident to some of her friends. Some laughed; some did not. One person said it was probably a Stealth weapon being tested, an almost complete impossibility in a major metropolitan area.

Jackie had read a few UFO books including both of the ones about Betty Andreasson Luca. She also saved newspaper clippings for the past ten years concerning UFOs and looked them up after her sighting.

### ***Puzzled and afraid -***

Mrs. Cosford seems of high intellect and genuinely mystified by her encounter. She was still somewhat fearful when she was interviewed by telephone on January 5, 1988, by CUFORN's Larry Fenwick.

Sighting report forms were mailed out along with a request that her husband describe his small part in the event. We are awaiting the return of the form from her. She asked us to let her know if we discover any other observers of the object.

Upon questioning, she noted that the object seemed solid and had sharp edges with no appendages or openings and had a smooth surface with one major exception.

### ***Eight or ten bulges***

She saw, as it got within close range above her, that on the underside there were "eight or ten round bulges" which she described as eye-shaped.

Larry Fenwick phoned Downsview Air Force Base nearby and was told they had not received any calls about the sighting.

Jackie's first contact with a ufologist was through a newspaper clipping she found which mentioned David Haisell of Mississauga, ten miles away. She found his phone number. He called Larry Fenwick who, in turn, called her.

We hope to get a drawing of the object from Jackie along with her completed sighting report form. We will publish this in the next issue of the Bulletin.

We will interview her husband and possibly their neighbours.
