



Mum's the word but flying saucers exist

**Above Top Secret: The Worldwide
UFO Cover-up**

by Timothy Good
Macmillan, 592 pages, \$24.95

It's no exaggeration to say that this is the most significant book ever written about unidentified flying objects. In fact I would go as far as to suggest its contents will engage anyone — whether they're interested in UFOs or not. With a foreword by the former British chief of defence staff, Admiral of the Fleet Lord Hill-Norton, *Above Top Secret* is a very serious book, ostensibly concerned with government cover-ups regarding the investigation of UFOs, yet revealing in the process what amounts to conclusive proof that such phenomena exist.

Yes, flying saucers are real — and your government knows it. So why are they keeping you in the dark? Even Lord Hill-Norton has no explanation for this. He writes that "there have been thousands, perhaps tens of thousands, of sightings and encounters . . . by people all over the world whose evidence on any other subject would be accepted without question."

Under the freedom of information laws, British broadcaster and lecturer Timothy Good has assembled government documents from many countries that clearly might relate to the topic if only they were legible. Entire pages are blacked out — "For security reasons" — words are deleted. Apparently information is not so free as one might think it should be.

In the United States, material related to UFO investigations has a security classification higher than that of even the most sensitive defence secrets, including advanced nuclear weapons — hence this book's title.

Good presents his subject matter on a country-by-country basis, as such its scope and thoroughness are impressive. He spent 20 years compiling this material. While information from Britain and the U.S. is the most copious and most startling, the chapter on Canada holds much that will surprise, and even shock, most Canadians.

Back in 1950, Wilbert Smith, a scientist working for the government recommended a research project be set up to study UFOs. In a memo, he wrote, "We believe that we are on the track of something which may well prove to be the introduction to a new technology." Through discreet inquiries made at the Canadian embassy in Washington he had learned, he said, that the U.S. government had considered the matter of UFOs

to be of the most tremendous significance since retrieving parts of a crashed flying saucer near Roswell, New Mexico. "The existence of a different technology (was) borne out by the investigations" subsequently embarked on, Smith added.

The Canadian government was not slow to accept Smith's recommendation. By the end of 1950 Project Magnet had been established, although official sources denied the true function of Smith and his team.

Yet in 1953 Smith filed a report on Project Magnet which stated, ". . . we are faced with a substantial probability of the real existence of extraterrestrial vehicles, regardless of whether they fit into our scheme of things . . ." The government neither endorsed nor rejected this report, emphasizing it merely represented the views of researchers involved, not any official opinion.

Smith, however, went on to receive funding to set up a UFO detecting station at Shirley's Bay, outside Ottawa, with sophisticated registering devices including a gamma ray counter, a magnetometer, a radio receiver and a recording gravimeter. Even on the day the station went into operation a Dr. Solandt, on behalf of the government, was vigorously denying its existence. In fact the building housing the detecting equipment was loaned to Smith by the Defence Research Board, of which Dr. Solandt was chairman!

How far did Smith get with his work? Good quotes a letter written by him in 1959 to a friend: "For your information

every nation on this planet has been officially informed of the existence of the spacecraft and their occupants from elsewhere, and as nations they must accept responsibility for any lack of action or for any official position which they may take."

Unofficially, Wilbert Smith made no secret of his opinion that contact had been established with the occupants of UFOs.

AROUND the world the story is virtually the same — intense governmental interest and stringent denial. Good shows that tens of thousands of additional documents are still being withheld in the name of national security — even after statements like the following one, issued by former CIA director Admiral Hillenkoetter in 1961: "It is time for the truth to be brought out in open Congressional hearings . . . through official secrecy and ridicule, many citizens are led to believe the unknown flying objects are nonsense."

Nearly 30 years later, Good points out, we are still being misled. This remarkable work deserves our closest attention — its contents cannot be dismissed. In fact, the reason behind the cover-up seems almost as mystifying as the information that is being covered up. After all, contact with extraterrestrial intelligences must surely rank as one of the most significant events in human history.

White ball of light flew low in Toronto at night: 3 observers

A visit to a Toronto tire store to buy a new set of automobile tires provided CUFORN with a multiple-witness report of a close encounter of the first kind.

On July 9, 1988, investigator Lawrence J. Fenwick filled out an order form for tires and, when the salesman, Harry Engerer, saw Mr. Fenwick's licence plate was "UFO3", he told of the sighting, later filling out a sighting report form along with Andrew Muirhead, one of two other observers.

The sighting occurred at 10.30 p.m., in the month of August, 1981 in Toronto, at the intersection of Normandy Boulevard and Fairmount, in the Woodbine-Gerrard area, 3/4 mile north of Lake Ontario in Canada. Engerer, then 17, Muirhead, then 16, and a teenage friend Mike Racicot, were lying on a curbside looking at the stars. Suddenly, they saw a "spherical ball of white light, with a glare like magnesium" moving parallel to the maple trees on the street. It was "as large as a basketball held at arm's length," spectacular and, according to Muirhead, "looked solid, with sharp edges and had a glow around it." All three witnesses saw it simultaneously.

It was silent and flew faster than a jet plane, which accounts for the sighting duration of five seconds reported. It was moving south toward the lake, and "disappeared over the lake". It would have passed over Greenwood Racetrack's eastern edge just prior to the last race of the evening.

It was a clear, warm night, with a dull

moon, and a few stars visible. There was no wind, they said.

Racicot's whereabouts are unknown to the other two at this time. Engerer and Muirhead have good hearing; Muirhead has 20/20 vision, Engerer requires glasses for distance viewing as he has 20/25 vision. Engerer was wearing glasses at the time. The area is heavily residential. There is a cemetery on the light's flight path toward the lake. Engerer and Muirhead said they told their families and friends of the sighting the next day. Muirhead's present occupation is that of a die maker. Engerer has a grade ten high school education while Muirhead has a grade eleven education.

"UFO" was a blimp

Eleven-year-old Matthew Petras of the city of Scarborough in Metropolitan Toronto, Ontario, Canada reported a sighting on June 8, 1988 at 4.45 p.m. in the Markham-Ellesmere district, just south of Centennial College. From his description and CUFORN's knowledge it turns out that he reported seeing the Goodyear blimp, which was cruising over the city that day.

Member reports sighting three circular lights; claims close encounter of fourth kind at age five in 1973

One of CUFORN's newest members, Ben Obina, age 20, reported to CUFORN that at the age of 18, he had seen three unusual lights in the sky while he was walking near his home in the Toronto, Ontario suburb of Thornhill.

The date was October 31, 1986; the time: 9 p.m., and the duration was ten seconds. We will let Ben describe the incident in his own words: "I was basically startled, when I observed three objects resembling stars moving at a fair rate of speed across the night overcast skies. They were circular in shape."

"The objects were opaque, and seemed self-luminous. They passed below the clouds and moved faster than a plane. I was curious as to what they were. I had been interested in the UFO subject before my sighting." (ED. NOTE: He feels he may have been abducted at age 5)

The night was cool, with the temperature at five degrees Celcius, or 42 degrees Fahrenheit. The moon was bright, There was only a slight wind.

He said the lights moved in a straight path, although he did not say in what direction the lights moved. He was alerted to the lights by their movement in the sky. He said they had sharp edges. He also noted that there were a few stars visible through the broken clouds. He pointed out that the sky was largely overcast with only a few breaks in it.

The area is a growing residential district of mainly middle-class people. Ben is a high school graduate and now attends university. He lives at home with his parents, whom, he says would not approve of his being involved with ufology. So he has not given CUFORN his phone number or address. He uses a post office box to receive mail.

Ben went on to say that "this is a UFO sighting, quite different from the 'contact' experience that I had when I was five."

Ben has very good hearing and good vision. He ended his account by telling us that his prior knowledge of UFOs comes mainly from reading books about the subject. CUFORN has not chosen to explore his earlier 'contact' experience at this time as it might involve us contacting his parents. Perhaps when he has moved out on his own, we will fully

investigate his report. He says he is willing to undergo regressive hypnosis, if we feel it is needed.

In the meantime, we hope to meet Ben in person, possibly at a CUFORN meeting.

Two videotapes highlight of CUFORN winter meeting

For the first time in two years, CUFORN held a meeting for Toronto area members on February 20, 1989, at the apartment of Co-Director Lawrence J. Fenwick. One of the main features was the showing of the videotape of the October 14, 1988 television show, "UFO Cover-up? Live!".

Ten of our 18 local members were in attendance. Four non-members were present, and one of them was a former member, Betty Biswas. The other 3 were Kevin Unger's girl friend; Henry McKay, MUFON's Ontario Director; and George Hathaway, a Toronto scientist.

Following the showing of the video, which was provided by Raymond Borg, Stan Haswell showed his videotape of the AVRO disc in test flights. This was actually a movie taken in Toronto at the test facilities of DeHavilland Aircraft. The film was narrated well. It showed the disc with the words "U.S.A.F." on it maneuvering over tarmac and slightly hilly terrain. The 15-minute film is a classic in itself. The disc flew short distances and was no more than a foot above the ground. It exhibited a slight wobble due to its inherent instability.

The evening concluded with a short discussion of the "UFO Cover-up? Live!" show, with various members giving their opinions of it. Member-abductee Betty Dagenais held much of the spotlight later on, describing some of her experiences.

CE1: Cone-shaped light shed "skyrocket sparks," "broke up," as R.C.A.F. veteran, three others gazed on frozen Ontario lake

A silent orangish-silver, cone-shaped light was seen by three adults and one child on a frozen lake in Central Ontario, Canada on January 1, 1989 at 9.15 p.m.

One adult was Jim Church, 64, a salesman with grade 12 education, who lives in Toronto, and is a veteran of three years in the Royal Canadian Air Force. He has good hearing and vision and his prior knowledge of UFOs came from television.

Jim's daughter, Bev Church of Nepean, Ontario, a suburb of Canada's capital, Ottawa, was another witness. She is 29, a legal assistant and community college graduate, has good hearing and vision, and her prior knowledge of UFOs came from TV, motion pictures, and other persons discussing the subject with her.

The third adult was Ann Varty of Haliburton, Ontario, while the child was six-year-old Kim Varty of Haliburton. Ann, Jim and Bev filled out sighting report forms. Jim was interviewed on the telephone by investigator Larry Fenwick early in January.

The sighting occurred near Deer Lodge, on Lake Kashagawiganog. This is just ten miles southwest of the town of Haliburton, 50 miles east of Bracebridge and 108 miles north-east of Toronto. Map coordinates are around 45°N and 79°W. The area is heavily wooded and has only a few tourist lodges on the lakeshore. Coincidentally, Larry Fenwick and his family stayed at Deer Lodge in the summer of 1948. He has two small oil paintings of the shoreline.

The total duration of the sighting, according to Bev, was five minutes, whereas Jim said it lasted 2½ minutes. Ann saw it for 3 seconds.

The four observers were walking on the frozen lake when Kim saw the light and pointed it out to the others. It was opaque, and looked solid, with a smooth textured surface. Bev at first thought it was a Cessna aircraft whose

edges looked fuzzy. In contrast, Jim noted that the edges looked sharp. Ann said the edges were fuzzy.

250 feet elevation

Jim said it was the size of a basketball if held at arm's length, while Bev compared its apparent size to an orange. It was first seen ¼ mile away at 250 feet above the lake.

Jim stated that the light was "glowing but not bright enough to light the surrounding area. It moved ¼ mile in ten seconds, then 300 yards in 1½ minutes at 10 mph." It emitted sparks from its lower surface, "like sky rocket sparks" which "came down half way to the ice surface. "In a matter of two to three seconds, it was no longer visible," he said.

The light was 20 feet in height. "It moved toward us in no time," he said. It was self-luminous, passed in front of tree and was watched continuously by three of the witnesses. Jim said he first saw it at a 45 degree angle, and last saw it at a 30 degree angle above the horizon. It moved below the clouds at the time it was visible.

"It seemed to be coasting across the sky between the trees and the cloud-covered sky," Bev said. "It looked metallic." She saw the light for five minutes, saying she thought she had missed about one minute of its appearance to the others. Bev said the light "broke up". It came from the south-west at a 70 degree angle and moved to the south-east. She last saw it at a 70 degree angle before it vanished.

Bev described the incident thus: "When Kim and I realized that we were seeing something very strange, Kim and I yelled to Jim and Ann to look up. We heard Jim and Ann yelling and we ran to them. As we ran to them, our backs were to the object. The object was floating across the sky. I thought it might be a small plane and

its motor had died because there was no sound. Parts of the object were lit. Then it seemed to be breaking up like an explosion with no sound. Parts of the object fell to the ground aflame. The parts that fell looked like globs of fire. I couldn't see exactly where the flaming parts fell because the trees blocked my vision as they fell down. A minute or two later the object disappeared. There was no more light."

CUFORN asked her for her reactions to the observation: "I thought this was very strange and it might be a plane breaking up or something entering the atmosphere and breaking up." Ann said she was "frightened."


Jim summed up his reaction to the incident: "I was amazed at what I had seen in a span of 2½ minutes at most." *****

Jim said he had reported the sighting to Downsview AFB in Toronto. They told him to give the report to CUFORN and gave him our phone number.

The weather that night was cold--5 degrees Celcius(24 degrees Fahrenheit). The sky was overcast with a dull moon showing through the clouds. There was no wind.

Given the shape of the light, we have ruled out an aircraft. Since there was no wind, we have eliminated the possibility of a balloon. Since it is a remote area, we discount a hoax balloon. We doubt that it was a hoax, having spoken to Jim and knowing his background. This is not an earthquake fault zone so it was not an earthquake light. We are left with the conclusion that what they saw was a UFO, not necessarily from another planet, merely something unknown to the observers and the investigators. *****

Allow me to introduce myself. My name is William "Bill" Steinman. I am a free-lance investigator into the subject matter pertaining to the crash/recovery of saucers and bodies, the Aquarius Project, and the "alien/government" interaction.

You probably know of me via my book, UFO Crash at Aztec, America West Publications, 1987.

I just finished reading a transcript of an interview by Tom Mickus, with you on November 6, 1988. During that interview you made quite a few statements which coincided with my own research. The statements that intrigued me the most were as follows:

1. The William L. Moore portions.
 - a) his being used by MAJI as a pipeline to the public.
 - b) his possible abduction and programming.
 - c) his statement concerning the religious implications in the UFO mystery.
2. The religious implications
 - a) Anti-Christ (1990).
 - b) The Mid-East Situation.
 - c) Harbinson's books.
 - d) the constant deceptive lies by the aliens.

I know the name of the scientist who was in the photograph with Eisenhower. I am the one who first found out his connection to the "meetings at Wright-Patterson AFB". This was obtained via a taped telephone interview between Stan Friedman and Dr. Robert I. Sarbacher which took place on December 12, 1983. Sarbacher stated that the fellow who attended all the meetings was an electrical engineer who was head of a major college in Pennsylvania, and wrote a book on electrical engineering. From those clues, I located Dr. _____.

Stan Friedman knows who he is; because I told him that I found his name via his tape, and located the Dr. Stan called the Dr. in early 1984. I wrote to the Dr. four times and received two replies. I called him, off guard, in 1987, when he told me, "Don't get involved", "there is nothing you can do about it", and "You are fighting windmills." He did

3. Jerold D. Miller, civilian scientist of the Air Force Office of Technology, Kirtland AFB. (His name appeared at the bottom of the Aquarius telex) (ED. NOTE: the telex was reprinted in the CUFORN Bulletin, Nov-Dec., 1983) He is a very religious man and stated that the Book of Revelation in the Bible contains the answer to the UFO problem.
4. George Nicholas- old blind man-son of a scientist who worked at Wright-Patterson in the late 40's- stated that the Anti-Christ and Book of Revelation held the key to the mystery.

I can go on and on with different persons such as John Lear, Linda Howe Tommy R. Blann, John Reynolds and etc who expressed the religious ties to the phenomenon.

The Ultimate Solution To The UFO Phenomenon

There do exist above top secret saucer bases in remote portions of the United States (and around the world), in which this unholy and immoral alliance are developing a very advanced technology, based on Unified Field Physics, genetic engineering, and biogenetic breeding in preparation for the ultimate "materialization" of the "Dark Forces", when the "Mystery of Iniquity" is finally culminated in the "Anti-Christ", or "Ahriman" ("Incarnation of Satan").

Soviet-born MUFON consultant phones twice from England quizzes CUFORN Co-director

Your editor has been in touch with a man who is somewhat of an enigma in himself. He enjoys playing "mind games," The man is Henry Azadehdel, Ph.D., in his 30's, and lives in Nottingham, England. He is a MUFON Consultant for physics and a research specialist in abduction cases.

Dr. Azadehdel's affiliation with MUFON was announced in the January, 1989 issue of the MUFON UFO Journal. It appeared in the Director's Message, by Walt Andrus. According to British member Mark James, he owns two businesses in Nottingham and recently visited Mr. James driving a car with diplomatic licence plates. I will have more to say about this at the end of this article.

Armenian in England

Henry, as we will refer to him in the rest of this item, is a native of Armenia in the Soviet Union, has spent 25 years in ufology, and has lived for only a few years in England.

He has been telephoning many people in North America, asking many questions about ufology. William L. "Bill" Moore told me Henry phoned him and asked questions. His attitude, said Mr. Moore, was rather mysterious and belligerent. Mr. Moore said he was intrigued by Henry.

Henry phoned your editor twice, on December 26 and December 28, 1988, from England. Each call lasted about a half hour. When I asked where he was calling from, Henry refused to answer directly. He just said that he could be calling from Toronto or "I could be calling from next door or anywhere". He proceeded to ask about 25 questions each time he called, and when I asked him a few questions about himself, he was evasive or vague. Bill Moore noted that Henry had a German accent. I could not place his accent. He knew me as Lawrence J. Fenwick.

I did not know he was a MUFON Consultant

when he telephoned me. So I asked him if he was a member of a UFO organization. He replied that he "represented a group involved in ufology, including one professor in the U.S.A." He did not name the professor. Since MUFON has more than one professor in its membership, that seems to rule out MUFON as the group he was referring to in the call.

He said he did not know how long I've been in ufology. He said I've met Leonard Stringfield twice, whereas I've only met Len once. When I asked him what motivated him to get into the UFO field, he said it was "curiosity." I asked him if he subscribed to any UFO journals. He said he did not. That's curious if he is a MUFON Consultant. He did say that he'd "heard about Just Cause." He said he relies on his memory for everything he knows about ufology.

He said Phillip Klass is missing and that Klass lived in Europe. Neither statement is true as far as I know, although many ufologists might wish that Phil were missing.

I'd received a dubious document entitled Operation Apotheosis in the mail. Henry said it was a phoney document. He asked me what I know about the Dulce (New Mexico) papers.

Other questions were: Do I know what DI-55 is? What is Operation Blue Fly? Do I know Dr. J. Tuzo Wilson? What have I heard about any Canadian abduction reports? Have I heard about implants in and scars on abductees? Have there been any recent UFO reports in Canada? Do I have any information on the Philadelphia experiment? Have there been any Canadian crash-retrievals? Do I have any information on Larry Warren who was involved in the Rendlesham Forest landing for repairs? What are the names of CUFORN's British members? Do I know John Lear? Do I know Bill Moore?

Is Henry a Soviet spy? Is it illegal for a foreign diplomat to own businesses in England? Henry of MUFON remains a mystery so far. We need a Sherlock Holmes to solve the case.

UFO CONSTITUTION & ORGANIZATION

One Man's Opinion

Ufology today is like the 50 American states without a central government - it won't work.

UFOs have been sighted for thousands of years. Since 1947, UFO activity has multiplied tremendously. Many UFO groups have been formed since then. Now, with the tremendous amount of UFO information coming forth today, the need for a central UFO organization is essential for the consumption of all UFO information.

Select leaders from the various UFO groups throughout America should be called together to create a temporary UFO congress. The congress would form a UFO constitution, obviously with an individual bill of rights to protect individuals' personal integrity in disclosing such UFO information, whatever that information may be.

The UFO constitution shall cover all areas of the UFO phenomenon, broken down into various categories.

All state representatives will be known in their states as state directors and subdirectors, as required under the UFO constitution, to accumulate, investigate and research all UFO information and forward such UFO information to the Central Committee to be filed and recorded for future reference indefinitely.

All other rules and regulations concerning the UFO phenomenon shall be resolved by the UFO congress. The UFO constitution shall be approved by the several UFO groups throughout America that are represented at the UFO congress.

All information and historical material, such as Biblical UFOs and non-Biblical materials, shall be kept and recorded for future reference. A newsletter and/or magazine publication shall be printed monthly, bimonthly or at least quarterly for members as well as nonmembers.

Membership dues required and donations accepted by members and nonmembers. Members shall be given a membership card for proper identification.

State subdirectors shall assign and schedule regular UFO meetings, perhaps once or twice per month, for discussing new UFO information and UFO revelation experience by all members alike.

The Central UFO Organization should promote advance research into 1) astrometry, 2) astronomy, 3) astronautics, 4) astronavigation, and 5) astrophysics.

The Central UFO Organization should seek financial support (grants) from non-UFO organizations for assistance in research to find a viable solution to bring together a permanent relationship between intelligent beings (of all kinds) from other worlds throughout the universe and human beings on earth, for a reasonable exchange of ideas, technology and everlasting goodwill between our civilizations.

This American Central UFO Organization should seek to join all other nations on earth to form one super world UFO organization. It is no longer a secret that we human beings on earth are not alone in the universe.
