CONNECTICUT: AN OVER-PRICED CONFERENCE

So how did you spend the weekend of November 11 and 12th. Well, if you were smart, you were probably drinking beer and watching football. For myself, I decided to head to the East Coast to do some gambling, not in Atlantic City, mind you, but in North Haven, Connecticut, the no-man's wasteland mid-way between New York City and Boston.

I was there to attend the much touted "The UFO Experience", sponsored by Omega Communications, an organization run by John White, noted fringe author. My main objection to this conference is the price. In order to attend, one must have paid either \$120 over a month in advance, or \$150 at the door. For a conference such as this, the price was outrageous and it became readily apparent that White's motivation was not philanthropic, but strictly commercial. This fact was further brought home to me by the ridiculous fees charged even for third-party presenters, such as Arcturus Books which declined to attend due to the cost. But, you say, isn't the profit motive what made this country what it is? A fair profit, yes, but not a rip-off. It's people and organizations like him which make a good argument for being a Communist, but even that is no longer in vogue these days.

Before I get to the substance of the meeting, a few words are in order with regard to the site chosen by Mr. White. He lives in Connecticut, so it's understandable that he would not want to inconvenience himself. Being that it is

where it is, I can understand why he would want something in the general vicinity, but North Haven? Who ever heard of North Haven? This place is a road-side stop, with one hotel, and more than enough sub-standard eateries to keep everyone's arteries greased up for life. I will always remember North Haven, since it was there that I had some of the worst seafood in my entire life.

White chose this place because of the cost. You see, the Ramada in North Haven

is a run-down place, lacking all the amenities you normally expect in an \$80 a night place of lodging. The staff was inexperienced, with the switchboard operator not even knowing how to put through a collect call. There was no heat in the hallways, and there was no coffee shop, with the one restaurant having closed down early at night. There was a bar, but it was poorly designed and played pathetic music. I felt sorry for the locals. To top it all off, the damn ice machine didn't work!

The sound system didn't work. How such a blunder could have been made speaks volumes about John White's organization which, ironically, has the word 'communications' in its name. Having to strain while listening to the speakers is unforgivable. Even worse, the problem was never fully rectified for the full two days. For that offense, Mr. White should have refunded some money.

pay per speech

Unbeknownst to those attending until they arrived, it was possible to pay for individual talks at \$15 a crack. Instead of paying \$120 or \$150 for the entire two days. If I had known this, I could have saved myself probably \$75. John White should have made people aware of this fact.

Now for the conference itself. The list of speakers was, for the most part, good. The people attending, 95% from the NYC-Boston area, were likewise a good mix. It was for these two reasons that the conference turned out to be a success for me. More interesting than the speeches themselves were the backroom conversations and discussions which accompany almost any such gathering. This conference was no exception.

Among the people I had the privilege of speaking with were Bill Moore, Jerry Clark, Walt Andrus, Betty Andreasson, Whitley Streiber, John Keel and Bill Knell. They were the reason I attended. I had some good exchanges with several of these individuals, most notably with Bill Moore.

Unlike others, I've always tried to maintain a balanced view with regard to Bill Moore and his actions in trying to unveil the government cover-up. His method is certainly unorthodox, but definitely not without precedent. I was impressed with his speech in Vegas, and was further impressed with what he had to say in North Haven.

He is a remarkable individual, and one whom we shouldn't ignore. He has made more progress in this field than most of his detractors combined. Sure, his cards aren't all on the table just yet, but he is getting closer to the truth all the time. Towards this end, Bill Moore deserves our support, but this, of course is my own humble opinion, and one which I realize is not widely applauded, although I offer no apologies for my holding it.

Moore's speech

As for the speeches, here are some of my thoughts. I attended most of the speeches, although not all. One of the most noteworthy ones was by Bill Moore. Although suffering from a cold, Bill managed to elaborate on issues raised in his Vegas speech, and did a fairly good job of updating us on the MJ-12 documents research. As Bill elaborates in his recent issue of "FOCUS", the upcoming Friedman report on the authenticity of three MJ-12 documents is that of, "one strong, one weak, and one leaning positive but still open to question." These relate to the Eisenhower briefing document of November, 1952, the Cutle Twining memo of 1954 and the September, 1947 Truman memorandum, although not necessarily in that order.

John Keel's lecture was interesting, but somewhat off topic since he got sidetracked from discussing the MIB material. John is full of anecdotal information, and seems to have the ability to see UFOs almost at will, which may be something in itself. Nonetheless, his presentation was entertaining, true to his style.

Kenneth Ring's talk was also interesting, although he admitted that his data and conclusions can be appropriated by almost any group wishing to advance certain theories. Basically it had to do with the fact that UFO "abductees" (along with people who've had Near-Death-Experiences (NDEs) are "electro-sensitive" along with the fact that they've been abused as children.

best attended talk

Whitley Streiber had the best attended talk of them all, and perhaps one of the most interesting. Whitley came across as quite believable and, possibly because of the release of his film seemed to be stressed out. Evidently, he is walking a thin line of sorts, as exemplified by his rapid speaking and lack of tolerance of any negative press. He lashed out at the Wall St. Journal for saying that he "had sex with

aliens", and labelled the press as a "bunch of prostitutes".

Streiber also criticized the UFO press, notably "UFO" Magazine which printed some rumours recently which had particularly irked Streiber. One example was the one about 2,000 children being abducted in Westchester County (New York State) and presumably being used by the aliens for nefarious purposes. Whitley made a few phone calls to several agencies after receiving frantic phone calls from concerned parents, and found the rumour to be unsubstantiated. If I remember correctly, the Westchester remark was repeated in an article by Don Ecker with regard to human mutilations at the hands of aliens, a subject discredited by most serious UFO researchers.

Later, the Streiber outburst spilled over into the halls for all to see. Vicki Cooper, editor of "UFO" Magazine, approached Whitley in the hall and wanted to talk about his allegations. Streiber, still very much angry, shrugged off Cooper's hand, and said "No!", not wishing to talk with Cooper on this matter. As Whitley departed, his wife Anne engaged Cooper in some embarrassing tit-for-tat, with nothing ultimately getting resolved. In Cooper's defense, Streiber seems to be acting particularly childish about this whole affair, and no doubt has become overly sensitive with regard to criticism. As he made clear in his speech, the "visitors" are continuing to see him, with the most recent incident occurring a scant three weeks before the conference.

One presentation on the next day, Sunday, was a waste of time. Ellen Crystall, from New York State, claimed to have hundreds of photos of UFOs and so-called "Tesla fields". Well, her pictures were especially disappointing, showing no convincing evidence of anything, save film emulsions and other photographic anomalies. Ellen Crystall was a prime example of what's wrong with UFOlogy...an inexperienced, unstable person trying to pass themselves off as a UFO researcher.

Vicki Cooper's talk, "The Media and UFOs-Coverage or Cover-up?" was mildly interesting, if not hastily prepared. Several times she was taken to task by the audience for both her information on the U.S.S.R. sighting, and the way she herself handled the UFO issue in her talk. Nonetheless, her honesty and sincerity

in trying to cover the subject were apparent, and she should be supported for what she is trying to do via the pages of "UFO" Magazine. Due to the previous night's Streiber volleys, Vicki was compelled to spend much of her time rebutting the allegations.

UFO on videotape

Towards the end of the conference, there was an especially interesting report on the part of Walt Andrus of MUFON. Apparently he had just come into possession of a copy of the home videotape made by a Japanese citizen earlier this year regarding an overflight of a UFO near his property during the daylight hours. I had seen this piece of video, albeit a few seconds of it, earlier in the summer during a weekend CBS News report at the conclusion of the nightly news hosted by then anchor Connie Chung. I remember then that the tape was quite remarkable, and seemed to indicate an important sighting. Unfortunately, none of the UFO publications picked up on this story until MUFON had one of its representatives in Japan obtain the video in question along with a tape recorded interview (translated) which Andrus showed side by side during the impromptu video presentation near the conclusion of the Omega Conference.

Strangely, we never saw the close-up pictures of the UFO, since the videotape was acting in a most peculiar fashion. What happened during the showing was that the video player seemed to shut off for about 20 seconds during the crucial part of the videotape when the UFO came into view. This happened several times, and the end result of the whole affair was that the viewing audience never got to see the UFO in question. One of the technicians found that there was some sort of electromagnetic pulse on the tape which shut off the machine at a certain point, thus explaining the strange sequence of events. How it got on the tape was a mystery to Walt Andrus.

So the conference had its highs and lows. One of the low points was discovering that Walt Andrus had both his briefcase and at least one of his display photos on Gulf Breeze stolen. This was done while the John White crew was selling their books and news letters. Andrus' briefcase, which was put

behind the Omega booksellers desk, seemingly "disappeared". Curiously, no books were stolen, indicating to me that perhaps there are some criminals working in the John White organization.

As I said, the conference was a success in terms of meeting certain people, and getting apprised of current developments in the UFO field. I don't credit this to John White, but rather to the people who attended his conference, or who I should more properly say, were victimized by this conference.

In closing, if I have some advice for those who want to get across Customs without being searched, although it can be risky. Just say that you were(are) attending a UFO conference and either A) you will be rushed through quickly since you must be telling the truth with such a crazed response as that, or B) you will be detained at the checkpoint while the Customs officer relates his or her UFO sighting of 14 years ago. The former occurred on our way out of the U.S., the latter occurred on the way into the U.S., much to the consternation of the drivers of the vehicles lined up behind us. Either way, it works.

HOW UFO OBSERVATIONS CAN LEAD TO IMPROVED FLIGHT TECHNOLOGY

Today, the human race stands at the beginning of an impressive technical development which will enable it to reach the stars.

The way to the stars is, to be sure, paved with good intent, but at the moment, it is difficult to reach. There is a lack of knowledge to permit us overcoming the seemingly immeasurable distances existing in the universe. Perhaps we could get this prospective knowledge more quickly if we use for this purpose a phenomenon which has confronted us for a long time. This is the so-called subject of UFOs. Those who investigate this phenomenon in detail will know that these objects possibly have an extraterrestrial origin, which is one hypothesis among a great variety of hypotheses. Some of the visual aspects of UFOs may permit us to get knowledge of the future and to make important discoveries. A detailed observation of these objects is indispensable.

The physical description of UFOs in the past decades gave rise to vehement discussions. Often, expectations concerning aspects such as the many colours and the metallic look of their surfaces were discussed, but they could not be demonstrated.

This article will try to explain why so many colours are described in the observations of UFOs.

The varied colours of UFOs- which, as you know, reflect the exterior form of the object as a "light circle" or "halos"-have, in my opinion, only one possible interpretation: namely, an energetic interaction of the object with the terrestrial atmosphere. It is likely that one principle is used which is already known to our terrestrial science. UFOs may use mechanisms which cause the ionization of the surrounding air layer when they are activated.

At a certain ionization level, first of all, rare gases in the air begin to shine. In the observations of UFOs, nearly every colour is described by the eyewitnesses. The scale of colours reaches from blue-violet through green-yellow up to orange-red. Mixed colours and the existence of all the colours also are mentioned in the declarations of the eyewitnesses.

electron movement

Now we come to the physical description of the phenomenon: the light observed by the eyewitnesses is evoked by atomic processes in the air layer surrounding the UFO. The light is produced in the atoms. When the atoms are energized by a sufficient clashing together or with other elementary particles, one or more electrons of the atom fall outside their energetic level, or they move completely out of the atom. When falling back to their starting level, they deliver a certain quantity of energy in the form of photons. These photons, having the character of particles and waves, each possess a specific energy and wave-length. Within the visual range of the light a number of photons with the same frequency are observed as single clear spectral colours from violet up to red.

Due to these movements of electrons, energies are produced which are characteristic of each chemical element. Spectroscopy enables us to identify each element by a characteristic array of photons. For astrophysicists, this knowledge is of greatest importance because they can determine the structure and the composition of stars and galaxies.

This knowledge also makes it possible to establish the different processes which will stimulate elements to emit energy and also which elements take part in these processes. If, for example, a mixture of gases is confronted with a certain quantity of energy (thermally or electrically), only certain

atoms within these gases will emit energy when the delivered energy reaches the required level. Some gases are stimulated easier than others. The atoms are not solely dependent on the energy delivered to them as they act of their own free will. The threshold which has to be exceeded in order to release processes of emission is called potential of ionization. It is that minimal quantity of energy which is necessary to transport an electron from its basic level into the next higher level.

ionization of air

Because the terrestrial atmosphere consists of a mixture of gases, which contain a lot of single constituents, the above mentioned laws can also be used here. UFOs interact with the atmosphere and so ionization occurs in the surrounding air layers during discharging of high energies. This demonstrates a point which has yet to be investigated as it does not seem to be understood by today's scientists.

UFOs may be technical structures which bear a slight resemblance to aircraft or rockets. The novel means of transport has reached a technical level unknown to us so that our modern aircraft and rockets look like inventions of the Stone Age.

silence noted

Eyewitnesses say that these objects have another aspect aside from their multiple colours, i.e., their silence. As this is also observed at speeds above the sonic barrier, it is especially remarkable. Of course, in many cases whistling and droning noises are heard. But these are restricted as a rule to close observations and are not similar to the noise of today's rockets or aircraft engines.

silence, colours linked

The variety of colours of UFOs and their silence at high speeds are, in my opinion, connected. My reasons are:

The shiny appearance of the surface of UFOs is not caused directly by their surface but rather by the surrounding air layers. This is caused by an electrically based ionization of rare gases in the atmosphere. The range of colours begins at minimal energies of discharge with the colours as mixtures of blue and blue-violet, continues during an increase of the ionization potential, through

green and green-yellow up to red. This means that with a minimal energy of ionization, first the rare gas xenon is stimulated. The emitted light is luminous blue. By increasing the energy, the other rare gases are also stimulated. Colours such as blue-green can be explained by the spectral line of the element neon. Neon also comes into play for the clear green as well as for orange-red (at a higher potential of ionization). Argon and krypton also show characteristic colours.

Now the question is: does a UFO discharge such quantities of energy into the surrounding atmosphere? The answer to this question can be discovered by today's scientists and technicians.

The veil of mystery is lifted at the moment when these objects - the flight capabilities of which sometimes seem inconceivable - reach the speed of sound and the essential reduction of the driving energy needed for flight, by discharging electricity into the atmosphere. This connection can be confirmed by referring to an American experiment.

During the sixties in the United States of America, they tried to reduce sonic booms from supersonic aircraft. For a long time the Americans worked on several methods. In the middle of January, 1968, they found an explanation. The scientists Cahn and Andrews working for Northrop Corporation revealed it at a press conference. During their trials, they discovered that the discharge of electricity into the atmosphere in front of the aircraft could ~~deaden~~ the sonic boom and also reduce the aerodynamic friction. The discharge displaced the air molecules from in front of the aircraft and forced them to glide around the body of the machine. Consequently, the back-up of air molecules onto the front of the aircraft was avoided. In experiments, the scientists reported that supersonic aircraft delivered electronic flashes of 30,000 volts.

It should be emphasized that a blue light arose around the aircraft, reflecting its profile. Also, at night in clear weather, it could be seen from the ground. Detailed reports were published in scientific journals.

The question arose almost by itself: Have the experiments of 1968 a connection with the UFO phenomenon? It appears to me that the supersonic experiments of 1968 demonstrated one fact: The discharge of electricity or



PSYCHIATRIST REPORTS RECENT DAYLIGHT DISC IN TORONTO

Psychiatrist Ron Charach, 38, of Toronto, Ontario, Canada recently reported his daytime sighting of a UFO in that city. Since he reported it to CUFORN on October 27, 1989, he could not recall the exact shape as the event occurred in the time frame of between mid to late June to early July, of 1989. His recall being uncertain, he made the two drawings seen here on the right.

It happened between 8.30 p.m. and 9 p.m. at the corner of Bathurst Street and Burton Road, which is five blocks north of St. Clair Avenue West. There is a large park at St. Clair and Bathurst which contains a large water reservoir. This was the site of

energy generally results in an improvement of flight characteristics. Possibly this technique is improved upon by UFOs so as to permit high speed flight without noise. Additionally, a reduction of the driving energy needed for movement is observed due to these discharges of energy into the atmosphere.

In interaction with the atmosphere, the various colours occur unintentionally as a result of ionization of the rare gases. As a final result, we can see that the lighting of the atmosphere around UFOs, their silence during high speed flight and the intended reduction of expended energy during movement are connected. Of course, this statement is only a hypothesis. It lies in the hands of competent scientists to research this interesting field of interactions in more detail and to demonstrate the valid connections.

This knowledge could contribute to a better understanding of UFOs. One of our most important tasks is to pay more attention to these aspects of UFOs. By observing UFOs, we can get information which is of immense importance for our technical development. For this reason, future investigations into this specialized area should be carried out.

a reported landing in the 1970's, observed by at least two people.

The 1989 sighting had a duration estimated at 10 to 15 seconds. The sky was clear, temperature mild, and the observer says his vision and hearing are "good."

Here, in Dr. Charach's own words, is what occurred:

"I was taking my customary early-evening walk, crossing Bathurst Street, and heading up Burton Road when I suddenly caught sight of something moving very swiftly through the sky, about 500 to 1,000 feet above me. It was seen at a 45 degree angle, and, if I recall, having the appearance drawn in diagram A or B, with a dull metallic look to it (or perhaps a smokey-white)."

"I remember thinking it must be some kind of military vehicle, perhaps one that was top secret--like a stealth bomber, etc. and I wondered which airport it might be heading for; (it was heading north-west). Only a bit later did it dawn on me that nothing I have ever seen crossing the sky (other than shooting stars) appeared to move that quickly."

He compared its size to a baseball held at arm's length. He said the finish on it was "dull, metallic, greyish". Its shape was "elliptical, ovoid or as in diagram B." The edges of the object were somewhere in between fuzzy and sharp. The UFO was a solid object, he said. He also noted that there were no pedestrians in sight, just automobile traffic. He told his wife about the UFO after he had a "vivid dream about the sighting" He also told a pilot who was his neighbour and two fellow psychiatrists.

When asked what alerted him to the UFO, he said "I can't say. Was I coincidentally just looking upward?" He said the UFO at one point was out of sight when it moved behind some buildings. "What jumped out at me most was the speed of the thing."


a vivid dream

In early October, 1989, he said, "I had a very vivid dream, in which ten people or so all had seen what I saw, and were struggling to draw an accurate diagram/blueprint of it. I remember hoping they

got it right. After this dream, I told my wife about the sighting."

"Then, the Sunday past, (October 22), I had a strong urge to phone the authorities (after a news item about UFO sightings in the Soviet Union). After some determination on my part, I was able to get the phone number of CUFORN. "

He was asked to describe the dream in more detail. "In the dream, the blueprint/diagram people were struggling to reproduce from memory went something like:



"I remember thinking it very important that they got the side appendages right."

These are labelled "A" and "B" in the drawing here (above) "Perhaps they were wrong about those appendages--I can't recall what the intense feeling there was--other than they should get it right."

Dr. Charach was asked by CUFORN's Harry Tokarz if he might like to try to remember more about the sighting under regressive hypnosis, but he said he had never heard of the technique, but was willing to try it. We were surprised that he had no knowledge of regressive hypnosis at all.

As many people who report seeing UFOs do, Dr. Charach asked for more information about them. CUFORN sent him, at his own cost, a large amount of data, some of which dealt with regressive hypnosis of abductees and the psychological tests administered to abductees by psychiatrists involved in the investigation of reported abductions.

Although it is generally not known by the general public, there have been three psychiatrists who have reported being abducted aboard UFOs. All of these were reported to ufologist Budd Hopkins in New York City. According to Hopkins, one American astronaut was also taken aboard. He did not reveal the names of these people. And regressive hypnosis expert, Dr. Leo J. Sprinkle of the University of Idaho has reported his own abduction.

UFOs cause stir in Sask. town

REGINA (CP) — Residents of Langenburg, Sask., are craning their necks to gaze skyward more often these days after reports of a strange flying object hovering silently in the air round the town.

"Everybody is talking about it," said RCMP Sgt. Herman Fogen, who is investigating the sightings. "Everybody is looking for some positive proof this really is a UFO."

A group of high school students and two teachers first reported seeing a brightly lit object near the town of 1,400 on the night of Oct. 11.

Two days later — on Friday the 13th — a similar object reportedly paid a morning visit to a farm 10 kilometres south of the community, in southeastern Saskatchewan near the Manitoba boundary.

"I am convinced there is something strange happening in the area," said teacher Bob Markham, who said he watched the strange object for 10 to 15 minutes after students alerted him and another teacher.

Fogen said he has no reason to think the reports are a hoax or disbelieve the witnesses. He said he is compiling statements and will forward the results of the investigation to the National Research Council.

"According to the paper we read the Russian people are talking to aliens so there's no reason we shouldn't be able to see them at least," said Fogen. "We're going to interview all the kids, get statements from them and put them all together and see if we get something consistent."

Rose Neumeier, 39, said she was sitting at her kitchen table talking on the telephone shortly after 10 a.m. Oct. 13 when she saw a huge, silvery object suddenly float over her farmyard or between two and five minutes.

"There was sort of a flash of light and at first I kind of hauled it off to a passing car on the road," she said. "But the light was sort of stationary. It

was there and I looked up and saw it. I was scared at first and curious. You're transfixed and you're just sort of looking."

The object, about nine metres long and three metres thick, hovered about 30 metres in the air no more than 15 metres from the house, said Neumeier. She said it looked like two pie plates face-to-face and had a flat top and a bottom like corrugated steel. Brilliant light was reflecting from the joint between the top and the bottom.

"It made no noise at all," said Neumeier. "The cattle weren't disturbed, the dog wasn't disturbed. If I hadn't caught the flash of light I probably wouldn't even have noticed it."

"It just kind of rose in slow motion. It went north of the yard, kind of curved through the hayfield above the field, then circled out over the barn and the corrals and went back across the pasture and off through the trees."


Neumeier said she didn't report the sighting to police — Fogen asked her about it after hearing a second-hand report — because she didn't think anyone would believe her.

"All I know is I saw something I can't explain," she said.

Markham said the object he saw from one or two kilometres away had red lights on the bottom and a light on top that flashed on and off every 15 or 20 seconds. He said the object was about 200 metres in the air floating in a field just beyond some grain elevators.

"All we saw was a bright flashing light on top and a red light on the bottom," said Markham. The students reported seeing the object swoop down on a town park at about 7 p.m. while they were skateboarding.

The reported sightings are not the first in the area. In 1974 a farmer claimed he saw five aluminum-like flying machines hovering in a field. Five circular depressions in the grass lent credence to the story.



'They've returned' Langenburg man says of UFOs

For Edwin Fuhr, the Langenburg UFO flap means "they've" returned.

Fuhr was swathing in his rape field 15 autumns ago when he came upon what looked like a goose blind near a small slough.

As he got closer to the "pothole," he realized it was no goose blind.

"There were five of them. They scared the hell out me."

The swather stopped. He couldn't get it started.

So he just looked on in fear as two saucers five metres in diameter, and three slightly smaller ones, hovered half a metre off the ground in front of him.

They had the classical shape popularized in the 1950s movies: "They looked like upside down saucers, with lips, and domes on the top."

"There was nothing holding them up. They were just revolving."

Fuhr says it was about 9:30 a.m. that Sept. 1 morning, when he first encountered the crafts.

He watched them for an hour

and a half, and his descriptions are vivid.

But somewhere, he lost two and a half hours.

Fuhr has no memory of events between 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., when he recalls seeing the saucers leave "in step formation, one at a time."

He recalls a feeling that his body had received an electrical jolt.

Reporters, Mounties, the FBI and UFO researchers from across North America flocked to Langenburg to interview him and study the pothole, says Fuhr.

An American government researcher told him he'd receive a copy of the report he compiled on the sighting, but Fuhr says he got nothing.

"Afterwards, they said it was mushrooms I saw," he said.

"I've never seen mushrooms hat fly, and I've never seen them eave a pool radioactive."

Fuhr says he saw the colored lights in the sky two weeks ago. At the time, he thought they belonged to a distant airplane.

He's no longer the only man in Langenburg with a story about UFOs.

CUFORN Follow-up

Al (Toby) Powaschuk in Wynard, Sask. He said he would try to get a full report from the observers. We are awaiting his report.

Are the aliens checking us out?

At least a dozen people say they have spotted UFOs in the Langenburg district over the last two weeks, with one man making their viewing a nightly ritual.

"I've seen them every night since last Wednesday night," says Colin Rosin, a 36-year-old insurance agent in the community about 80 kilometres south-east of Yorkton.

Rosin and his daughter Jade were talking about UFOs during their half-hour drive to Jade's organ lesson in Esterhazy last week when the nine-year-old spotted something in the sky.

Rosin stopped the car and the two got out.

"It went coasting across the highway, right above our heads. There was no sound at all," said Rosin.

The craft sported flashing,

colored lights and was as wide as the length of a single-engine aircraft.

Every night since, Rosin watches similar objects as they move high above his home.

"I saw three last night and five the night before."

Rose Neumeier was talking on the phone and peering vacantly out the kitchen window of her farmhouse in the mid-morning of Oct. 13, when she spotted a UFO above the shed in her back yard.

"Holy shit!" was her reaction to seeing the oblong object hovering 10 to 15 metres above the shed.

"The top of it was flat, like if you took a pie plate that had grandma's old pie in it and turned it upside down," said Neumeier, who calls herself a UFO skeptic who's now a lot less skeptical.

"The bottom was kind of rounded and around the centre

was a very, very, brilliant light," she said.

Paul Goddard, 12, and four elementary school friends were skateboarding in the town park on the evening of Oct. 11 when they noticed red, yellow, white and blue lights moving toward them at a height of about 100 metres.

"It sort of came down when we saw us. It seemed to come to stop and then it took off."

The boys ducked down in the grass, fearing abduction.

"I didn't really want to go out 'cause people say they go up and it seems like an hour and it's really a week."

Langenburg RCMP Sgt. Herman Fogel says there were no aircraft scheduled to be in the area at the time of the sighting but some small-aircraft pilot don't file flight plans.

More Ontario reports

Other UFO reports in recent days have come from Kenora, Ontario, where Chris Rutkowski of Winnipeg, Manitoba is investigating, and from Gormley, Ontario, Toronto and Scarborough, Ontario-CUFORN cases.

Ferwick spoke to Edwin Fuhr, unaware of the possibility that he was an abductee. We will again contact Toby Powaschuk and try to arrange a new investigation of the 1974 incident. There is a possibility that he was abducted.
