

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# Abductee's father was first to propose genetic abduction theory

A new book has been published about the Betty Andreasson Luca abductions, entitled "The Watchers, The Secret Design Behind UFO Abduction", authored by Raymond E. Fowler. The publisher is Bantam Books, who issued the book in April, 1990. As of this writing, it is the opinion of many ufologists that the book is the best one published in 1990, and possibly the best book written on the subject of abductions.

Fowler quotes Dr. Richard Neal, Jr., on pages 237-238 as stating "there is some type of ongoing genetic manipulation"... "within various family generations."

CUFORN's investigation of the "Jack T." abductions in Ontario and Quebec actually

were the first to present this theory. "Jack's" father mentioned it to us during the course of our probe of the case. It was his idea. Readers can verify this by re-reading the articles on the case which appeared in FSR, Vol. 29, Number 3, 1984, p.9, and in the second of the two-part series on the abductions which appeared in the MUFON UFO Journal, Number 184, June, 1983, p.5.

Perhaps Dr. Neal came up with the idea on his own. Readers may also note that Dr. Neal, as a MUFON Consultant, may have read the CUFORN articles in MUFON's journal and could have subconsciously incorporated it into his writing on the matter.

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# MUFON UFO symposium featured speakers from three countries

Nearly 700 people attended the 1990 MUFON UFO Symposium held at the Pensacola, Florida Hilton Hotel from Friday, July 6 to Sunday, July 8. Unfortunately, your editor was unable to attend. Therefore, we present in this issue and the next a series of articles summarizing and reviewing the proceedings by several CUFORN members who did attend. You'll not find much in the way of photographs of the Symposium in the Bulletin. A series of circumstances prevented us from obtaining pictures.

We decided to start with a list of the speakers and their topics to give you an overview of the event. So here they are:

On Friday, the usual cocktail party gave attendees the opportunity to meet each other.

Saturday's first speech was by NASA astronaut, astronomer and author Brian T. O'Leary, Ph.D. His topic was "UFOs, Extraterrestrials and the New Science." O'Leary flew in from Phoenix, Arizona to make the speech.

CUFORN Consultant in Regressive Hypnosis Dr. David Gotlib of Toronto spoke next with the theme "Who Speaks for the Witness?—Medical and Ethical Issues in Abduction Research."

"The Differences Between Perceptions of UFology in America and Europe" was the subject of John L. Spencer's speech. Spencer is an author and researcher from Harpenden, England.

Donald R. Schmitt, MUFON's Wisconsin State Director and Director of JAHCUFOS, who hails from Hubertus, Wisconsin, spoke on "New Revelations From Roswell".

Publisher Carey Baker of Rainsville, Alabama had as his topic "The Fyffe, Alabama Experience".

Barry H. Downing, author of "The Bible and UFOs" and a minister, spoke on "ET Contact: The Religious Dimension".

Edward and Frances Walters of Gulf Breeze, Florida spoke at 7 p.m. on Saturday, with the title of their speech being "The Gulf Breeze Sightings". Gulf Breeze is a suburb of Pensacola, Florida.

Author-ufologist Budd Hopkins gave the final Saturday speech. The full-time painter had as his speech "UFO Abductions in the Gulf Breeze, Florida Area".

The evening concluded with a panel discussion and a question and answer segment. Panelists were Brian O'Leary, Dr. David A. Gotlib, John L. Spencer, Donald R. Schmitt, Carey Baker, Rev. Barry H. Downing, Budd Hopkins, and Ed and Frances Walters. The evening concluded with announcements by MUFON Florida State Director Charles D. Flannigan.

Sunday's talks and speakers were: "The Rainbow Declaration and Human Destiny in the Cosmos"—John E. Brandenburg, Ph.D., Physicist; "Red Skies: The Great 1989 UFO Wave in the U.S.S.R."—Antonio Huneus; "On Mass Panic and Other Famous Myths"—Robert L. Hall, Ph.D., Sociologist; a last-minute speech by Stanton T. Friedman, nuclear physicist-ufologist, and a panel discussion by the speakers with questions and answers. Donald M. Ware and Walter Andrus, Jr. were also part of the panel.

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# MUFON's 1990 symposium was a "resounding success"

EDITOR'S NOTE: Co-Director Harry Tokarz owns a talent agency with branches in Toronto, Ontario, Canada; Southfield, Michigan ( a suburb of Detroit); and in southern Florida. He will be reporting on UFO activities in all three areas.

The 1990 MUFON UFO Symposium, held in the sleepy Gulf coastal town of Pensacola, from my point of view, was a resounding success.

It appears that over 600 people pre-registered for this event, unlike previous years when many attendees came on a last-minute basis or arranged their travel in advance and registered when they arrived.

The main attraction, Ed and Frances Walters, authors of the celebrated book, "The Gulf Breeze Sightings", oddly enough, may have been overshadowed by a wealth of information contributed to the symposium by such notables as Anthony Huneus, Carey Baker, Don Schmitt, and, of special significance, Budd Hopkins.

Although Hopkins appears to be a regular at various conventions, I believe this is the first time he related some entirely new and significant data to his ongoing research into the core of abduction cases. Worthy of note, he firstly advised that one of the key areas in which he has withheld data over the years, was his collection of ciphers or hieroglyphics described by witnesses under hypnosis. Some significant correlation has been made with respect to this, which he plans to reveal soon.

On another level, Hopkins revealed that he has recently come across several cases, one from the Gulf Breeze area, wherein the witness(es) were experimented with by the aliens in order to elicit specific emotional responses. He described an alleged hybridization case where the "offspring" of the human/alien encounter were presented to the "normal" offspring of the natural mother, in some bizarre scenario, in order to see if the two races could mingle.

In another case, a black panther was presented to a young abductee in a series of tortuous tests to elicit emotional responses, even to the point of having the animal die in front of the hapless subject. Sounds absurd? Yes, but these are profound experiments being administered by an obviously highly evolved civilization, who may be puzzled by the emotional component of homo sapiens.

## "new directions"

Budd's research into these areas is indeed likely to lead to a breakthrough soon, so for those of you who want to break new ground, I suggest you look to his present data and attempt to expand on it by creative thinking. Remember, the questions asked in these cases may now have to take a new and most unlikely direction in the future.

Of great interest was Don Schmitt's dissertation on his follow-up on the much-touted Roswell incident. In fact, Stanton Friedman expressed personal surprise to me after hearing of Schmitt's and Kevin Randle's successful location of 12 military policemen who personally guarded the crash site in 1947.

Carey Baker, a folksy, likable southern gentleman, gave one of the most down-to-earth (if one can use the liberty), yet intriguing examinations of the Fyffe, Alabama sightings of 1989-1990. To everyone's surprise, these events apparently are still unfolding, and the main witnesses are presently undergoing a "Pandora's Box" of paranormal after-effects. CUFORN member Tom Theofanous is presently investigating these events at the personal invitation of Mr. Baker. Apparently, the townsfolk will not speak to anyone from the press, having been "burnt" previously for their obvious sincerity. We hope to hear from Tom following his investigation.

Least, but certainly not least, Ed and Frances Walters presented a most respectable case history of their now nationally-known

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sightings, and, although no new revelations were made, I was most impressed by their sincerity and humbleness. Ed told me that his experiences ceased as of May 1, 1988, and it couldn't be too soon, but many residents of Gulf Breeze have continued to spot unusual anomalies in the area. In fact, one sighting was allegedly made Saturday night, July 6 at Shoreline Park by none other than Debby Toomey, the principal abductee in Hopkins book, "Intruders".

In all, the event was indeed a worthy one, completely in line with Walt Andrus' policy to inform those who wish to be informed--a resounding success all round. I sincerely hope all CUFORN members will attend next year in Downer's Grove, Illinois.

## **Most MUFON speeches were dull; Suggestions for future research in ufology**

My opinion of the 1990 MUFON Symposium is that it was an interesting social event, (1) but some of the speakers did not meet my (2) expectations.

Although there were a few surprises such as Carey Baker, Antonio Huneus and Donald (3) Schmitt, generally speaking, most of the (4) speakers were rather unexciting, primarily due to their speaking style.

The Walters speech was the most disappointing because most people know their story (5) and he spent most of the time defending himself against the double exposure theory of the critics of the photos.

Overall, I think the UFO field lacks a team approach on a national or international basis. Most of the 600-700 attendees at the symposium seemed to be more interested in their own cases rather than concentrating on specific projects that could give us definite answers to the phenomenon.


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### What needs to be done in this field:

- (1) We need more teamwork on specific cases.

- (3) Find out what the "eccentrics" in the UFO field have to contribute.
- (4) Rather than spending a lot of time wasted on criticising stories of cases, we should be spending more time analyzing the cases in depth.
- (5) Any concerted effort by a team of investigators must be objective, persistent, dedicated, and not seeking monetary rewards.
- (6) Do away with the paranoia associated with UFOs such as MIBs. Separate the paranormal field from the UFO phenomenon until we can prove a direct physical connection.
- (7) Stop paying attention to people like Phil Klass, because it just gets them more publicity.

On this page and the next, we present photographs taken by Edward Walters of Gulf Breeze, Florida. These photos are copyrighted by Walters and were included in the book, "The Gulf Breeze Sightings", written by he and his wife Frances.

The photographs were part of a series of 40 taken during his 18 encounters. One video-tape was also taken. He used a Polaroid camera and a special three-dimensional stereo camera designed by MUFON investigators who arrived on the scene in the midst of his sightings.

Double exposures have been ruled out by investigators such as optical physicist Bruce Maccabee. A model UFO recently "found" in his former house did not resemble the UFOs in the photos.





Ed Walters and his wife held a series of parties for local teenagers in their house. One boy, who was addicted to drugs, was banned from attending these parties. In revenge, the boy, Tommy Smith, came forward with a story that Walters had asked him to send the local newspaper some photos that Walters had faked. Smith said he refused after consulting his father.

The model UFO mentioned on page 6 was obviously planted by either debunkers who bribed the new owner of the house or by U.S. government agents who wanted to discredit Walters. Much was made of a \$200,000 publisher's advance payment to Walters for the book. Advances in that price range are not unknown in book publishing.




To the Editor:

Though I have read a number of books by UFO researchers, I have read few arguments against the position that our "visitors" are the product of some ancient civilization, and/or that argues against the idea that these humanoids possess an intelligence superior in all ways to ours. I think that there is room for such an argument - at least with regards to the "greys."

I am not a UFO researcher, simply a student, perhaps an abductee - I'm not sure. Regardless, such an argument occurred to me. It's a conjecture based on a casual observation of our own social development.

There are, of course, pitfalls in trying to ascribe human social attributes to an alien culture. Still, I think that my position is constructive.

It seems to me that many major advances that we have seen in technology over the years have been granted, in large part, by accidental scientific discoveries.

Now, by writing that, I in no way mean to discredit the many great minds that we have been both blessed and cursed with.

Yet, haven't we seen radical changes due to what amount to accidental discoveries?

What if some civilization out there was simply fortunate enough to accidentally discover an area of physics that humans haven't discovered yet--an area that gave this mystery race the key to faster-than-light travel?

Based on my simple knowledge, suddenly this hypothetical "people" could travel interdimensionally, could travel through time, and could of course travel great distances in no time, because that area of physics is the same area that speaks of wormholes, quantum jumping, and like possibilities.

The members of this civilization would be able to do all of these things even

though--and this is the spine of my thesis--they could still be quite backwards in other ways.

Look at us. We've made awesome changes in our world through science, while continuing to be quite slow in social development.

Faster-than-light technology would usher in a great time of learning and change--probably some good and some bad would come of it.

# *There ought to be a law*

In the fall of 1989, at a lecture given to an audience of nearly 400 people in New York City, Whitley Streiber announced what had been found in the MRI scans made of my brain and skull area. He described an object, a little smaller than a dime, located behind the nasal cavity and just below my right eye. It showed quite clearly in the scans. It appears to be in the shape of a star with a hole, or dark spot, at its center.

Streiber stated that the doctors he had shown it to were particularly interested in the shape of this object as it related, not to all the many visitations I've had over the last 20 years, but to the fact that my name, Estrella, given me at birth, means star in Spanish.

I accept that this may be a mere coincidence due to that shape being a practical form to hold an object in place. Although the kind of visitations I was having at that time, which took place in Florida at approximately the same moment they paused in Gulf Breeze, were so specifically communicative that I wonder if coincidence is the only possibility. The first of these visits was initiated by me. This had never happened to me before. They were very responsive.

In August of 1989, I had relocated to a remote part of Vermont and the visitations continued. In January of 1990, I was asked to be interviewed about this and the brain scans, in a local Vermont paper. I agreed, and the article came out that month.

I was a little worried about how the local folks would take the information, but, after a month or so, I

was convinced nothing bad would come of it. I was wrong. So instead of writing the elaborate details of my visitations, the implant and possible communications with the visitors, I will tell you what stops me from doing so, and of a far reaching, if not a final, solution to this problem.

## *legal dispute*

Shortly after the article was published, I found myself in a dispute with my room mate over the rental agreement. It became necessary to protect myself legally, citing breach of that agreement as my defence. Then a few days ago my lawyer called to inform me that one of her witnesses was going to challenge my credibility, if not my very sanity, in a court of law, because I'd said I had interacted with UFO occupants. In addition to this, one of her friends had come forward with the information that she had been telling her people I was mentally ill and on medication for it. All this was fueled by the interview I'd given.

Now I have a statement from my doctor indicating I am of sound mind and definitely not on medication for mental instability. It is unlikely that I will lose my case with or without the UFO issue being raised, but it did catalyze an idea I'd been turning over in my mind since May, after a friend of mine got fired just two weeks after appearing on national TV about the subject of abduction. It occurred to me that there is an amazing opportunity staring us in the face. We may have come a long way, but not far enough, in my opinion.

## *real protection*

I have a proposal for you, the hundreds of thousands of people out there who have seen or interacted with some species of unknown origin; a proposal for the viable researchers who have gathered all of us into their computers. It is time we got some real protection from discrimination in the form of a law which states that we cannot suffer job loss, harassment, or discrimination of any kind because we happened to see

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something odd and choose to talk about it.

Over the past 20 years, I've watched and in some cases helped, friends of mine get laws put on the books, in the United States, to protect endangered species, environments, and people of various skin colors and religions. It's not an impossible thing to do. In fact, with as many intelligent, effective, and adamant people as are found among us, it may be just the thing to do with all the data and hard evidence we've accumulated.

**gain respect**

For once, heads of state would be forced to view our evidence within a context which, by law, they cannot ignore or ridicule. The "serious" news media would have to cover the story with the same respect afforded any group of such magnitude demanding protection under law. We would not be attempting to prove the existence of UFOs and their pilots. We would be seeking protection from discrimination, thus gaining the attention and benefits of civil rights protection groups.

In the process of getting a law proposed, we would have a platform upon which to display our evidence, and verify the numbers of individuals who have witnessed this phenomenon. We would also get, quite legitimately, into the history books. And during the whole debate, employers would definitely think more than twice about firing one who has just seen a UFO and talked about it.

I can remember a time when sexual harassment in the work place was not a defensible concept. I remember when my friend Richard O'Barry, author of "Behind The Dolphin Smile" and ex-trainer of Flipper, was arrested for trying to rescue an abused dolphin on the first Earth Day in 1970. O'Barry has single-handedly gotten laws put on the books in the U.S. Surely, a group as large and resourceful as we can do the same.

The most important beginning of this law is to come up with a good name for it. Once you have a name, then you find one or

two folks, out of several thousand, who have lost their jobs shortly after making statements about UFOs. After tending to a few logistical details, presto, you're walking up the Capitol steps with a lot of reporters from the serious press. Once inside, you bring on an almost endless line of credible witnesses with all kinds of hard evidence in tow.

The incidents of my character assassination and of my friend losing his job should be documented for the record, but would not be my first choice for implementing law. We need more drastic examples; people who have been told outright that they were fired over a UFO incident. I am confident we have such cases on file.

What happened to my friend and me served as a catalyst for this idea. I know that every single person who reads this has been, or would be, very cautious about who they tell about their UFO encounters. This should not be the case. We should be free to concern ourselves with who and what the visitors are and what the heck they plan to do with us. In relation to the staggering numbers of us who have encountered the visitors, there are very few who are certifiably mentally unbalanced. How can we effectively address these important questions if we're worried about our boss or neighbors? We've tried everything else. Let's stop asking for credibility. Let's demand a law.

# JOHN R. SALTER JR.-MEDICAL EVIDENCE

A Short Statement By John R Salter, Jr. of Grand Forks, North Dakota, U.S.A.

Dated February 6, 1990.

At 10:55 a.m., Saturday, February 3, 1990, at our home at Grand Forks, I was working with a screwdriver whose blade is sharp and narrow. Things slipped and the blade cut significantly into the tip of the finger next to my thumb on my left hand. Eldri was with me when this occurred. I swore colorfully but immediately told her that it "won't really bleed." The reason I could say that seriously -- it was a deep cut, a regular little gash right at the tip -- was that nothing on me has really bled since the 3/20/88 UFO encounter. (See my reports on this, especially the expanded one of December 19, 1989, which covers the whole experience and its basic ramifications to date). As has been the case with other cuts since the March '88 experiences, my blood -- extremely dark and rich-looking -- welled to the surface and clotted immediately, in such a fashion that a small nubbin rose a bit over the surface of the skin. (I'm reminded of an outside water faucet, pointing up, whose water freezes beyond the level of the faucet's mouth). This was observed, immediately after it all happened, by my son, Peter, and my daughter Josie, ages 20 and 10, respectively. There was absolutely no bleeding in the "running sense." Peter took a number of photographs of all of this. At about 11:20 a.m., I rinsed the nubbin off and, again, with nothing bleeding, a healthy dark scar formed immediately, essentially at skin level. A few minutes later, I was typing with no difficulty. Within the hour, the scar grew smaller and smaller and things just faded away into normalcy. A small mark persisted, after the scar disappeared (by early in the afternoon), but nothing of any significance. This progression of events -- from a significant cut to an insignificant mark, immediate clotting and no real bleeding (in the running sense), very fast scarring, and fading -- all follow what has been, for me, the standard progression since 3/20/88.



# Abductees and investigators will speak at UFO conference

A dozen UFO researchers and abductees will tell of the latest developments in ufology at the fourth annual international conference on "The UFO Experience" on October 13-14, 1990, at the Holiday Inn (formerly the Ramada Inn), North Haven, Connecticut, U.S.A.

Former NASA astronaut-in-training Brian O'Leary, Ph.D., will speak on "UFOs and Inner/Outer Space." The astronomer and professor of space sciences and physics at Cornell, Princeton, Cal Tech and the University of California at Berkeley, will be the featured Saturday night speaker.

Abductee Travis Walton of Arizona, author of "The Walton Experience", will tell of his five-day abduction by alien beings in a UFO. His story has been filmed in the U.S. under the title "Fire in the Sky."

Abductee Edward Walters and his wife Frances of Gulf Breeze, Florida, will show slides of the UFOs which appeared to them near their home from 1987 to 1988. Ed and Frances are co-authors of a book describing their experiences, entitled "The Gulf Breeze Sightings." It has been adapted for television and will be broadcast as a mini-series in 1991.

Stanton Friedman of Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada, a nuclear physicist with a Master's degree from the University of Chicago, will tell of the latest findings in the crash and military retrieval of a UFO in July, 1947 at Roswell, New Mexico, U.S.A.

Jacques Vallee, Ph.D., ufologist and author of six books about UFOs, will describe his research in a slide-illustrated talk, entitled "Dimensions of the UFO Experience."

The author of "Earth Lights Revelation," Paul Devereux of England, will speak about his research into unusual energy

effects at prehistoric sites.

California researcher Ann Druffel will report on her UFO research, specifically into cases where people intended for abduction have been able to resist their abductors. Her talk, entitled "How To Resist UFO Abductions" includes techniques used for resisting abduction. She is the co-author of "The Tujunga Canyon Contacts", a 1980 account of a series of abductions in the Los Angeles area.

Journalist-ufologist Antonio Huneus will speak on "Red Skies: UFOs Behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains."

Former Omni Magazine UFO Editor Harry Lebelson will speak on "Broken Silence: Military Testimony about UFOs."

Fred Max is a professional hypnotist from Cheshire, Connecticut, who works closely with area internists and psychiatrists and has lectured on hypnosis and behavioral medicine at various universities. He will describe hypnosis, explain how regression works and then demonstrate it, using two abductees, Betty Ann Andreasson Luca and her husband, Robert Luca.

Gene Phillips, J.D. is founder and president of the Ancient Astronaut Society. His slide-illustrated lecture is called "Ancient Astronauts-UFOs and Early Human History."

John White is Conference Chairman. He is the author of 14 books in the field of consciousness studies, with publication in eight foreign languages.
